

Long Suppressed Will Of Lenin Called For Joe Stalin's Expulsion

MOSCOW, U.S.S.R. — The Soviet government Saturday published the will of V. I. Lenin in which he called for the expulsion of Stalin as secretary of the Communist party.

The will has been suppressed for 33 years. It has been published abroad but never before has it been published verbatim in the Soviet Union.

Kommunist, rule book of world Communism, published the text of the will which described Stalin as a rude, rough-mannered and capricious. In it Lenin said Stalin could not be entrusted with a post as responsible as that of secretary of the party.

Publication of the will was the latest step in the official process of degrading Stalin before the Russian people. Coming from Lenin, revered founder of the Soviet Union, it was the most authoritative condemnation of the late dictator yet published in the Soviet Union.

Lenin wrote the will in the form of a letter to the 13th congress of the Communist party. The letter was dated Dec. 23 and 24, 1922. It carries a postscript dated Jan. 4, 1923.

It was in the postscript that Lenin urged the party congress to remove Stalin and replace him with someone "more patient, more

loyal, more polite and more attentive to his comrades."

The will also referred to Leon Trotsky, favorably and unfavorably. Publication of this portion was well-nigh sensational from the Russian point of view since no praise of Trotsky has appeared in the Soviet press since Stalin exiled him in 1927.

In his will Lenin expressed fear of a split in the party due to bad blood between Stalin and Trotsky. He said Stalin "had concentrated in his hands immense power and I am not sure he will always be able to exercise sufficient care in using this power."

Lenin criticized Trotsky for his self-confidence but added—in words that must be startlingly revolutionary to Soviet eyes and ears today—that Trotsky was "the most capable member of the present Central Committee."

Lenin warned the differences between Stalin and Trotsky could lead to a split in the party "and if our party does not take steps to prevent it the split could happen unexpectedly."

Observers immediately raised the possibility these first published favorable words about Trotsky might lead to eventual rehabilitation of the old revolutionist, who was assassinated in Mexico 16 years ago.

Library Board Members Ask Salaries For Librarians Be Restored In County Budget

Library board members from six Douglas County cities met in Roseburg Friday and unanimously voted to petition the county court and budget committee to grant the original county library budget request. They represented Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin, Roseburg, Oakland, Yoncalla and Reedsport.

The budget had totalled \$91,937.88 when presented to the county budget planners. It was nearly \$12,000 slimmer when approved. Biggest chunk sliced was some \$8,000 for librarians' salaries in county branches.

After the cut was made, the Douglas county library board requested the sum be reinstated. Earlier this month, a similar request came from a Reedsport delegation. County Chairman Gordon Carlson explained the board's

STEEL DISPUTE DEADLINE NEARS

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Scattered Fighting Still On In Poznan

Isolated Groups Still Battling, Says Reports

BERLIN, U.S.S.R. — Polish army artillery was turned on grim workers holding out in Poznan's anti-Communist bread revolt Saturday, a French businessman reported.

Two Portuguese businessmen, arriving at Frankfurt, said they had heard reports that 400 to 600 people had been killed.

Lucien Delain, of Megdon, France, arrived by automobile at Helmsdorf on the frontier between East and West Germany and said he had seen the artillery firing spasmodically when he left Poznan at 9 a.m.

"It took an hour and a half for Polish police to escort a group of foreign ears through the military patrols in and around Poznan," he said. "I saw artillery concentrations on the outskirts of Poznan and from time to time I could hear them firing on the center of the city."

Earlier, other travelers from the embattled Polish industrial city had reported fighting continued Saturday, though the Polish gov-

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Weary Senators Pass Foreign Aid Measure Friday

WASHINGTON, U.S. — President Eisenhower could count a substantial victory today in Senate passage of a \$4,562,000,000 foreign aid authorization bill but his mutual security program still faces a series of tough congressional hurdles.

Ahead lay first a compromise of this bill, and then House and Senate battles over actual appropriations.

The senate passed its version of the legislation 54-23 last night and sent it to conference with the House.

The Senate beat down every attempt to put in amendments opposed by the administration, including two big "across-the-board" cuts in the \$4,562,000,000 program recommended by its Foreign Relations Committee. Instead, it added 99 millions for two special programs. The amount is still about 340 millions below Eisenhower's request.

Courthouse Landscaping Contracts Let Friday

Contracts were let Friday by the Douglas County Court for landscaping of the front lawn of the courthouse.

The winning bid for a sprinkler system in the lawn was made by Gerretsen Supply Co. of Roseburg. The bid was \$1,575.05.

Home Cherkwin of Riddle was awarded the shaping and lawn replanting contract on his bid of \$779.48. Five bids were entered, two including the sprinkler system and three others for the lawn only.

Work on the landscaping will begin as soon as the street widening operation by the city is completed in front of the courthouse.

Right-of-way Clearing Power Line Bids Called

Bids on right-of-way clearing and access road construction for the Umpqua River-Reston section of the Alvey-Reston 230-kv transmission line will be called for at 2 p.m. July 13 by the Bonneville Power Administration.

Length of the project is approximately 18.8 miles. The right-of-way is 125 feet wide.

Work includes the construction of 119 stations of 12-foot access roads with ditches and improvement of 10 stations of access roads besides clearing and removing danger trees.

BID CALL ISSUED

A bid call for grading and drainage of 7,452 feet of Whistlers Bend Road No. 223, from Happy Lane to the North Umpqua Highway has been issued by the Douglas County Court.

The bid opening date was not specified.

Nixon Says Deeds, Not Words, Needed From Communists

MIAMI, Fla. — Vice President Nixon said Saturday the current uprisings in Communist Poland "eloquently illustrate" the "modern type of colonial imperialism the Communists have imposed."

In a speech prepared for the 39th annual convention of Lions International, Nixon re-emphasized U. S. insistence on a "deeds, not words" approach by the Soviets in their protestations of peaceful intentions.

The Vice President prepared to leave after his talk for a 10-day trip around the world, including official visits in the Philippines and Viet Nam.

Nixon's prepared text made only passing reference to the two days of rioting in Poznan, Poland, where witnesses said more than 30,000 workers staged demonstrations demanding more food and better living standards. Warsaw radio said 38 persons were killed and 270 wounded, but other estimates of the dead ranged up to 100.

Much of Nixon's talk dealt with Russia's professed desire for peace, but he said her performance offered "no guarantee that will allow us to relax our defensive preparations."

Nixon said the free world is faced with a "painful dilemma" in rejecting "so-called peace moves" by the Soviets. In doing so, "many nations may consider us as warmongers." On the other hand, "if we accept... uncer-

They were accompanied by Eisenhower's personal physician, Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, and Maj. Gen. Leonard D. Heaton, Walter Reed commandant who operated on the President. Mrs. Heaton also went along.

The President planned to spend at least two weeks here convalescing. By happy coincidence, he got out of the hospital in time to celebrate with Mrs. Eisenhower Sunday the 40th anniversary of their wedding. Today is the Heaton's 30th wedding anniversary.

Arriving at the farm, the President looked a bit pale but waved cheerily to a few score tourists who waited at a refreshment stand near the entrance.

67 Building Permits Issued During June

A record number of 67 building permits have been issued through County Building Inspector Charles H. Bonioli's office this month.

Valuation of the buildings also reached a record high of \$496,459, Bonioli reported at the monthly meeting of the County Planning Commission Thursday night.

For the fiscal year, the county has issued 392 permits on buildings with a total valuation of \$1,617,999. Proceeds from building permits for the fiscal year are \$5,745.

The two largest permits issued in June were \$160,610 for a six room junior high building at Glide and a two-room addition at the Deer Creek School, and \$55,000 for the Presbyterian Church at Tri-City.

No Change In Deadlock Is Reported

NEW YORK, U.S. — Steel wage negotiators met for three hours Saturday and reported "no change" in a deadlocked effort to avert an industry wide strike at midnight.

The meeting ended at 1 p.m., just 11 hours before the walkout of 650,000 workers was scheduled to start.

"No change," John S. Stephens, chief industry negotiator, told newsmen in response to questions as to whether there had been any progress.

The negotiators said they would meet again at 4 p.m.

David J. McDonald, president of United Steel Workers, said the companies still were persisting "in attempting to force an unacceptable 52-month contract with reduced benefits upon their employees."

With the negotiators working into the final hours before the strike deadline, the furnaces of the steel mills were being cooled, and production in the vital industry halted.

"The United Steel Workers of America does not want a strike," Donald said in a typewritten statement.

"The union is ready, as it has been throughout, to negotiate a reasonable settlement. The steel companies, however, still persist in attempting to force an unacceptable four-year, four-months contract with reduced benefits upon their employees."

"Time is running out. Yet a settlement can still be concluded before the deadline if the steel industry will pursue a path of reason, rather than the road to reaction."

"The union wants a just and fair settlement. It wants no more; it will take no less."

Monroe, Miller Rites Solemnized After Fatal Crash

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. — Marilyn Monroe and Pulitzer Prize playwright Arthur Miller were married quietly at City Hall here last night.

After City Judge Seymour Robinson read the vows and Miller placed what apparently was a borrowed ring on his bride's finger, the couple sped off to "parts unknown" for their honeymoon.

The simple single ring ceremony was witnessed by Miller's cousins, Morton A. and Florence J. Miller. Only a few hours before, the 34-year-old bride had been shaken after witnessing an automobile crash that killed Princess Mara Sherbatoff, 48, New York bureau chief for Paris Match, a French magazine.

Miss Sherbatoff was hurled through the windshield of a car that went out of control and struck a tree while following the couple down a winding country road near Miller's farmhouse at Roxbury, Conn.

At the sound of the crash, the new couple stopped their car and ran to the wreckage. Miller carried Miss Sherbatoff, bleeding profusely from a severed neck artery, to the side of the road, and helped remove Ira Slade, 18, driver of the car from the front seat.

The couple then dashed to Miller's place to summon an ambulance.

The accident seemed to heighten Miller's determination to avoid news coverage of the wedding.

"I'm not going to tell you where or when we are going to get married," he said moodily. "If the press do not leave me alone, we will leave here for parts unknown."

And, a short time later, they did just that.
