Street Camping Prospector Claims Mineral Rights, Backs Claims With Shotgun

KLAMATH FALLS — A grim-faced uranium prospector sat in the doorway of a tent he pitched on a street in Klamath Falls Friday and with a shotgun to back up his words, defied police to carry out eviction threats.

The prospector, Earl Sheridan, who says there are valuable uranium deposits under the street, claims mineral rights in that area because he is an heir of the late George Nurse, founder of Klamath Falls.

Sheridan added that in 1869 Nurse, who erected the first building in the community which then was known as Linkville, dedicated certain land which he owned for establishment of streets. However, Sheridan continued, Nurse reserved the mineral rights.

The uranium hunter has retained State Sen. Harry Boivin as his attorney.

"I intend to sink a shaft right here at Ninth and Main streets," Sheridan declared as he fingered the triggers on his shotgun. "If we have to go to the United States Supreme Court to uphold my claim, we'll do it."

Sen. Boivin, when asked to clarify the situation, said: "I believe my client is on firm ground. We have documents to prove Mr. Sheridan is an heir to the late George Nurse. Although the city's founder donated land for street purposes, he kept the mineral rights."

"This situation has been faced by other communities. For example, in Oklahoma private operators are maintaining a heavily

producing oil well right in front of the State Capitol. In another area, oil wells controlled by private interests are operating on the grounds of a State University. Down in Los Angeles there is an oil well right in the middle of a street."

Police Chief Orville Hamilton, who was roused from sleep at 4 a. m. Friday by an irate Main Street business man who reported Sheridan had pitched his tent and was digging through the pavement, dispatched Police Sgt. Odell Olson to investigate. Later, after a conference with City Attorney Henry Perkins, Hamilton said:

"Personally, and off the record, I think this guy Sheridan is legally wrong. I understand he is going to stay in that tent night and day until this thing is settled."

Hamilton revealed that he tried to enforce the city parking ordinance against Sheridan.

"We found out that the parking ordinance doesn't say anything about tents in the streets," Hamilton explained. "It looks like we will have to sit tight and wait for the city attorney to complete his investigation."

Senator Boivin would neither confirm or deny that he planned to appear before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg later in the day and ask for a restraining order against the city to prevent interference with the mining operations.

House Passes Defense Production Act Measure

WASHINGTON — By a three vote margin, the House Thursday passed and sent to the White House a hotly disputed compromise bill extending the Defense Production Act for two more years.

The roll call tally was 200-197. Lined up against it were both Democrats and Republicans from industrial areas who unsuccessfully opposed a section giving congressional "encouragement" to dispersal of defense industry to nontarget areas throughout the nation.

OVERRIDES OPPOSITION

WASHINGTON — The Senate Judiciary Committee Friday overrode Southern opposition and approved President Eisenhower's long-stalled nomination of Solicitor General Simeon E. Sobeloff to be a judge of the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals.

However, the committee agreed not to report the nomination to the Senate for at least a week.

Secondary Boycott Law Ruled Unconstitutional

PORTLAND — The Oregon law against secondary boycotts in labor disputes is unconstitutional, Circuit Judge Alfred T. Sulmonetti held Thursday.

He said its provisions are so broad that they breach the constitutional guarantee of freedom of speech.

The judge contrasted the act with the federal Taft-Hartley Law. He said that while the federal law bans secondary boycotts as such, it contains a provision protecting freedom of speech and of the press. The Oregon law has no such guarantees, he said.

The ruling was in the case of Kenneth L. and Roberta A. Waymire, who are building houses in nearby Clackamas County. Sulmonetti denied their petition for an injunction against the Portland Building Trades Council and several individual unions from picketing them.

A portion of the Oregon law was ruled unconstitutional by another Multnomah circuit judge in 1948.

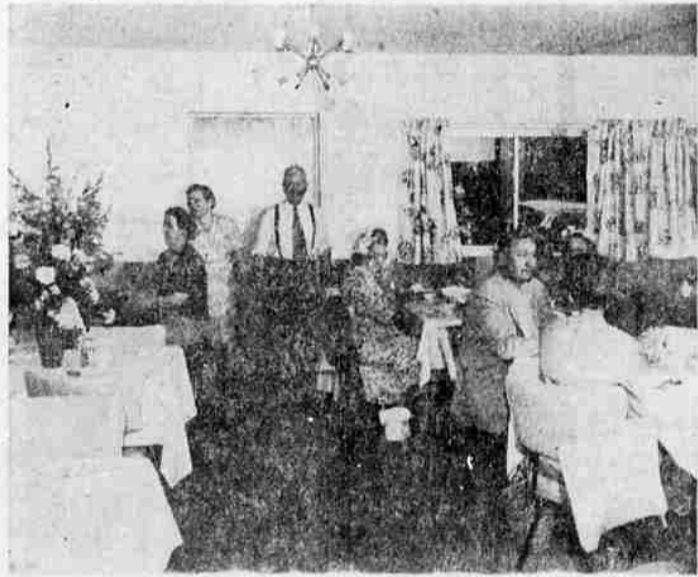
