Helicopters Attempting To Reach Crash Scene

tion at the site of the TWA crash, which is the easiest of the two to reach. A spokesman said the wind and unpredictable air currents would hamper the operation and might limit grim work to about three hours a day. There was no estimate of how long it would take.

Both planes were en route east from Los Angeles. The Constellation carried 64 passengers and crew of 6; the DC-7 53 passengers and 5 crew members.

The wreckage was found on two jagged buttes at the southeastern tip of the canyon.

The buttes are a two-day hike over perilous terrain. The only way to get there sooner is by helicopter.

Capt. James Womack, a helicopter pilot who flew to the crash scene yesterday with two other men, had this comment: "There's not a hell of a lot down there that anyone's going to get out."

Events leading up to the twin crash were a fantastic series of coincidences.

The flights began on a sunny morning in Los Angeles. The planes took off three minutes apart, the Super Constellation first, then the DC7.

At Daggett, California, on the Mojave Desert, the CAA reported, The TWA pilot asked to change his altitude from 10,000 to 11,000 feet. Before the CAA could tell him the pilot said he would change his flight plan to visual-flying 1,000 feet on top of the cloud level.

The CAA approved and informed the TWA pilot that the United craft was at 21,000 feet. An official said he did not know if the DC7 knew of the flight change but that notification was not necessary because the TWA craft was supposed to be flying in the clear.

The two liners were next heard from over the Arizona-California border about 200 miles east of Los Angeles.

The Constellation, bound for Kansas City, checked in at 10:55 a.m. To the south, the DC7, en route to New York, reported it was over Lake Mohave on the Colorado River at 10:58.

The next and last message heard from either plane came from the DC7 at 11:32 a.m. It said: "We are going..."

According to flight plans, both pilots were supposed to check in over a spot on the Painted Desert, some 20 miles west of Grand Canyon village, at precisely the same time, 11:31 a.m.

It later was learned that the DC7 was to maintain an altitude of 21,000 feet and the Constellation

Two New Deputy Sheriffs Hired, Byrd Announces

Two new officers have been hired in the Douglas County Sheriff's Dept., reports Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

The new additions to the department are H. James Donnelly, 22, of Drain, and Louis Suiter, 33, Roseburg.

At the same time, Sheriff Byrd announced that Gene Wyatt, resident deputy in the Canyonville district had resigned to enter private business. He will be replaced at Canyonville by Lyle Dickenson, who was transferred from the Roseburg office where he had been working for several months. Dickenson came to the sheriff's office recently from the Roseburg police force.

Donnelly started his tenure on the county force today as a newly married man. He was married Saturday. He had lived in Drain three years. He also has had 3½ years of service in the U. S. Navy and two years at the University of Oregon.

Suiter is returning to the department. He was a deputy most of last year before quitting to go into business. He will temporarily serve as a night deputy, according to Byrd. Donnelly will take over duties in the Roseburg office.

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Gov. Harriman Blasts At Ike In Iowa Tour

Three Democratic presidential hopefuls flung weekend criticism at President Eisenhower — whose supporters continued to hold firm — today to the unconfirmed assumption he will again be the Republican candidate.

Gov. Averell Harriman of New York issued the sharpest blast during a Farm Belt tour of Iowa, Minnesota and North Dakota.

Harriman said in Des Moines Eisenhower was "a great soldier but he is not qualified for the presidency." He said the President understands neither the farm problem nor critical factors in the cold war.

"He hasn't read a book," the New York governor said. "He doesn't read the papers. He doesn't read anything except what they put before him. So, he just doesn't know what's going on."

In New York, the Republican state chairman, L. Judson Morhouse, retorted: "Any candidate has the right to make a jackass of himself, but no candidate ever availed himself so completely of the dubious privilege as Mr. Harriman did in Iowa."

Morhouse said Harriman "as usual, was not speaking for the people of New York State." He predicted New York would give Eisenhower a million vote re-election margin," especially if Mr. Harriman is the Democratic candidate.

Adlai Stevenson, the unsuccessful 1952 Democratic nominee and generally conceded front-runner for this year's Democratic nod, joined other Democrats in rapping the administration for giving a reporter access to minutes of top-level Cabinet meetings.

The material was furnished to Robert J. Donovan of the New York Herald Tribune for his recent book, "Eisenhower: The Inside Story."

Stevenson called it "further evidence of the administration's reliance on advertising and public relations techniques."

Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, a third Democratic aspirant, tangled in a televised debate with Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.).

Kefauver said the administration had added nothing new to the foreign policy developed in the preceding administration of President Truman.
