It begins to look as if Ted Williams wasn't just batting the breeze the other day when he said the Boston Red Sox were ready to make their move in the American League race.

It was Williams, going four-for-five to hike his batting average to .374, who touched off a two-run, two-out rally in the seventh inning as the Red Sox clipped Washington 3-2 last night. Luke Delock, the big man in Boston's bullpen, came through with another splendid relief job, giving up only a pop-fly double over the last four frames.

In the only other AL game scheduled, the second place Chicago White Sox scored seven unearned runs and backed into a 9-3 victory over Detroit, trimming the Yankees' lead to 3½ games.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—The manager arrived by dog sled and the almost-midnight sun provided the lighting Monday night as the Pacific Coast League Seattle Rainiers whipped the Anchorage All-Stars 12-6 in the first appearance of a professional baseball team in Alaska.

The pre-game festivities were as exciting for the visiting players as the game was for the 3,000 fans. A real eskimo, a beauty queen, band music and a downtown parade were part of the celebration which preceded the tilt.

Two Alaskans hit home runs, as did three Rainiers. The first hit made in the territory by a professional was a line-drive homer by Art Shult, Rainier outfielder.

Coach Bill Brenner and utility man Jack Lohrke did the pitching for the Rainiers and gave up 14 hits. The pros picked up 18 hits off Alaskan pitching.

It was Rainier manager Luke Sewell who rode the dog sled to the field. The team flies to Fairbanks today for another game in the long Alaska twilight.

Electrical Storm Drives Obsidians From Thielsen

EUGENE (AP)—A sudden electrical storm Sunday drove 36 Eugene Obsidians and tenderfoot climbers from the pinnacle of Mt. Thielsen, near Crater Lake National Park.

A snow storm which accompanied the thunder and lightning made descent of the 9,122-foot peak a cold, wet experience, but no one was injured.

The Eugene mountain climbing club was conducting its annual tenderfoot climb for new members. All the group reached the base of the mountain's pinnacle but some of the climbers made the rope ascent up the 100-foot pinnacle before the storm hit.

Some of the climbers said their hair stood on end from the electricity in the air. One close lightning strike made rocks "hum."

Astoria Firm's Bid Low On Smith River Dredging

Palmberg Construction Co., Astoria, was low bidder for the job of dredging 131,400 yards of material in Smith River, according to the Port Umpqua Courier.

The project will enable lumbermen in the area to ship their logs out by river, although it will not be finished in time for this season's logs.

The work will provide a 6-foot channel 100 feet wide from the mouth of Smith River up to the North Fork, a distance of 15.8 miles, and a channel 4 feet deep and 75 feet wide from the North Fork to Sulphur Springs Landing, another five miles.

The project is authorized by the River and Harbor Act of 1918.

Government estimate for the work was \$73,602. The Astoria firm's low bid was \$87,720.

Complaints
State of Oregon through the State Highway Commission vs. Gerald Moore, Helen M. and Sidney Beavers, Homer and Marion Tucker. Plaintiff requests jury to determine compensation for 40 acres allegedly needed to construct a public road for access to and from material sites. Beavers and Tuckers claim some rights to property.

Arthur C. and Mary A. Laubach vs. Edward W. and Rebecca E. Bennett. Plaintiffs ask payment of \$24,500 allegedly still due on a \$32,000 property sales contract made Oct. 3, 1935. Plaintiffs also ask \$2,500 attorney's fees and repossession of property if demands are not met. A circuit court order was signed forbidding the defendants to dispose of livestock involved or any other personal property.

Pass Creek Sawmill Inc. vs. John J. and Ruth N. Rogers. Plaintiff claims the defendants agreed to sell certain timber, but they refuse to allow plaintiff to go on property to remove it. Plaintiff claims about 75,000 board feet of logs felled, bucked and yarded are on the property. Plaintiffs ask injunction and \$500 attorney's fees.

K. R. Linder vs. R. E. Davis. Plaintiff charges that between Dec. 1, 1954 and Aug. 31, Richfield Oil Co. delivered merchandise in amount \$5,866.08. Plaintiff says claim was transferred to him. Asks payment.

H. W. and Bessie Bond Hermann vs. Lester O. Erickson and James W. and Cora Clifton. Plaintiffs claim ownership of certain property and ask that title be quieted.

State Industrial Accident Commission vs. Harold G. Powell. Plaintiff commission asks \$908.33 and \$80.83 penalty for unpaid contributions to workman's compensation.

Carl J. Arvidson vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. Plaintiff asks that jury be empaneled and that he be awarded 100 per cent loss of function of arm as the result of a Jan. 6, 1953, accident at the Ballard sawmill of Roseburg Lumber Co. Plaintiff claims he received no permanent partial disability and only 45 per cent loss of function of an arm. Plaintiff says he was hurt when he stepped from an inclined plank and his foot slipped causing back injury.

Plaintiff asks jury be empaneled and that he be allowed additional total temporary disability and permanent partial disability of 100 per cent loss of function of an arm as the result of an accident at Umpqua Plywood Corp. Feb. 18, 1953. Plaintiff says he was employed as a feller and trucker and was hurt on his way home from work when his car and a logging truck collided. Claims suffered fractured skull and lacerations. Says was allowed 45 per cent loss of function of an arm.

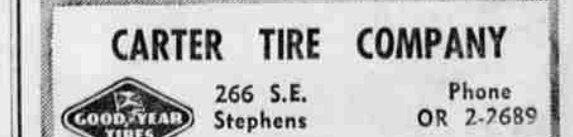
