### NEA Ignores Racial Issue In Resolution

PORTLAND (AP) — The resolution committee of the National Education Assn. (NEA) submitted recommendations Thursday which ignored demands of some members that the NEA take stands on two racial questions.  
This virtually assured a floor fight at Friday's closing session of the NEA annual convention here.  
The committee submitted draft resolutions at an open hearing Tuesday which long-time NEA members said turned into one of the most prolonged and argumentative in their memory.  
The committee draft expressed "the conviction of the association that all problems of integration in our schools are capable of solution at the state and local levels by citizens... working together."  
Myron Lieberman, Norman, Okla., proposed a substitute which would condemn teacher employment practices based on race. Members who spoke in support of his proposal said that integration of teachers was lagging behind integration of students.  
Lieberman told a reporter later he won't bring his motion to the convention floor Friday, when resolutions are to be adopted, if the committee did not include it in its final report. The full convention could override the committee, although it has seldom done so in the past.  
"Things have changed in the past year," Lieberman said, referring to a statement by a committee member at the hearing that the draft resolution was the same as was adopted by the NEA last year.

### Major's Wife Tells Of Double Slaying Following Forgery

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A petite, 32-year-old wife of an Air Force major told sheriff's deputies today she stabbed her elderly landlord and his wife to death when her check forgery scheme backfired.  
Deputies said Mrs. Blanche Jacobs, mother of three, spent three days trying to conceal the deaths of her "close" friends, then told her husband, who took her to police. Mrs. Jacobs walked into police headquarters last night and announced, "I want to report a double murder," police said.  
She was accompanied by her husband Maj. Eugene W. Jacobs, 35, who said he had doubted the bizarre story she blurted out to him some time earlier.  
Authorities checked and found the bodies of Andrew J. Robinson, 74, and his wife Maude, 73, side by side in the bathroom of their bathhouse at Groveport home. Their bodies showed multiple stab wounds.  
L. Ellsworth P. Beck of the Franklin County sheriff's office said Mrs. Jacobs gave him a statement admitting she killed the couple last Monday when they learned she had forged a check against Mrs. Robinson's bank account. That check and two others forged by Mrs. Jacobs totaled \$1,149, Beck said.  
Mrs. Jacobs lived next door to the Robinsons. Jacobs, who is stationed at the nearby Lockbourne AFB, described the Robinsons as "very close" friends.  
Mrs. Jacobs sobbed intermittently as she told how she cleaned up the blood-spattered Robinson home the day after the killings and dragged the bodies into the bathroom, Beck said.  
The lieutenant said Mrs. Jacobs tried to give neighbors the impression that the Robinsons had left town. When she realized she couldn't continue to conceal what had happened, she told her husband, Beck added.

### Douglas Co. Had Sixth Greatest Car Registration

Douglas County, at the end of 1955, had the sixth-greatest registration of motor vehicles among counties of the state, figures just released by the Secretary of State reveal.  
It stood in the same ranking in registrations of passenger vehicles and buses, the breakdown shows.  
At the end of the year, 38,007 motor vehicles, including 32,270 cars and 3,435 trucks were registered. In each category, the county followed Multnomah, Lane, Marion, Clackamas and Jackson counties, in that order.  
Roseburg stood 10th among county seats in total registrations with an estimated 5,538. That figure was arrived at by percentage of county seats' populations in 1950 to the counties' populations applied to total vehicle registrations in the counties.  
Thus, Roseburg's vehicle registration was 15.38 per cent of the total county registration. In 1950, Roseburg had 15.38 per cent of Douglas County's population.  
The city also stood 10 in the number of car and truck registrations.  
In each case, Roseburg followed Portland, Salem, Eugene, Medford, Klamath Falls, Pendleton, Corvallis, Bend and The Dalles, in that order.

### Ira Helgerson, 81, Passes Wednesday

Ira Helgerson, 81, of Glendale, died early July 4 at a Roseburg hospital following a lengthy illness. Helgerson was born at Serfville, Wisc., July 8, 1874, and moved to Oregon 65 years ago.  
He was a retired shoe repairman and had operated shops at Glendale, Myrtle Creek, Myrtle Point and Florence. For the past 13 years he had lived at Glendale. He was never married.  
He is survived by two brothers, Charles Helgerson of Portland and Henry Helgerson of Florence, and one sister. Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the Olivet Presbyterian Church in Glendale with the Rev. Wayne Wattman officiating. Interment will follow at the Glendale Masonic Cemetery. Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek, is in charge of arrangements.

### Pre-July Fourth Explosion Heard

Although fireworks boomed over several parts of the county Wednesday in celebration of the Fourth of July, one explosion the night before was unscheduled and sheriff's deputies are still investigating.  
The explosion took place about a mile south of Oskama near Union Gap, according to Sheriff Ira Helgerson. He said dynamite had apparently been set off in a roadside ditch. He said it appeared to be the work of juveniles. He reported that about 75 feet of blasting cable had been found nearby. The explosion flattened the ground around it, but did not leave a hole.  
Last year, similar explosions rocked areas near Roseburg and Sutherlin. Several youths were arrested as a result.

### Glide To Budget Funds To Light Football Field

The Glide board has tentatively agreed to include \$10,000 in next year's budget for lighting installations on the high school ball field.  
The decision was reached after the board turned down a plan by the Glide Kiwanis Club campaign for funds Tuesday night. The disapproval came after it was learned that the campaign would call for the student body of Glide High School to take an active part in the fund-raising operation.  
In the expectation that the amount will be approved by voters next year, the club said it would go ahead with securing and peeling poles for the lights. They will be 90 feet long, and the Glide Lumber Co. has agreed to transport the poles to the school grounds without charge.  
The Kiwanis project had called for installation of a lighting system for the football field and baseball diamond.

### FINED, JAILED

Roy Leon Morgan, 42, of Kirby, Ore., was fined \$145 and sentenced to serve 10 days in jail Tuesday after his arrest by state police on a charge of drunken driving. He pleaded guilty to the charge.

### MORSE AT HOME

EUGENE (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse, who arrived in Oregon by air Wednesday, was at his farm home near Eugene Thursday. He plans to stay until Saturday, when he will fly back to Washington. Morse has scheduled no speeches on this visit. He plans, however, to talk to advisers about campaign plans.

### Rebels Call General Strike Over Algeria

ALGIERS, Algeria, (AP) — A general strike ordered by nationalist rebels slowed normally bustling Algiers to a crawl Thursday. French authorities ordered a heavy crack-down on strikers.  
Virtually all Moslems stayed away from work in this city of about 600,000, whose population is divided almost equally—Moslem and European. The nationalists had called the strike for this 126th anniversary of the French occupation of Algiers, threatening to shoot anyone seen on the streets.  
The French alerted troops, called out extra military patrols and put helicopters on standby to keep watch over this administrative capital.

### Pendleton Girl Killed In Highway Accident

PENDLETON (AP) — Barbara Morrow, about 18, was killed about 12:30 a. m. Thursday in an accident on Highway 395 midway between here and John Day.  
State police said they were informed that the car in which she was riding missed a curve. Barbara's sister, whose name was not immediately available, and E. R. Spath of Long Creek, other occupants of the car, both were injured and taken to a John Day hospital for treatment.  
The accident occurred 30 minutes after close of the period in which Fourth of July holiday fatalities are tallied.

### SHOPPING CENTER PLANNED

PORTLAND (AP) — Another large shopping center is being planned in East Portland, this one a four-block area in the Hollywood district.  
Businessmen disclosed they had arranged a \$1,250,000 purchase of the property for the center, which will be bounded by Halsey and Broadway streets and N. E. 41st and 45th avenues.

### More Evidence Indicates Two Planes Collided

GRAND CANYON, Ariz. (AP) — An army helicopter crew Tuesday recovered what appeared to be further evidence that two big airliners collided before crashing into the Grand Canyon, killing all 128 aboard.  
The copier flew out of the canyon with a piece of a cowling from the wreckage of a United Air Lines DC7.  
Brought out with the cowling was another piece of metal bearing a red stripe which Trans World Airlines officials said was similar to a stripe on their Superconstellations.  
Main wreckage of the DC7 and a Superconstellation which went down presumably at the same time June 30 was located Sunday less than a mile apart.  
Meanwhile, progress was being made toward recovery of remains of DC7 victims.
