

Red Cross Slates Annual Meeting Here On July 12

The 39th annual meeting of the Douglas County Chapter, American Red Cross, will be held July 12 in Roseburg.

Featured speaker will be Mrs. Celia Day, registrar at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. Mrs. Day is a former Red Cross hospital aide. She is a member of the Red Cross board. Her topic will be announced later.

Among items of business at the session, which will be held in the home of Mrs. Roy Bradley, RC canteen chairman, is the election of board members and officers. It will follow the dinner and a program.

A special feature of the meeting is a narration of colored slides showing 1935-36 activities of the chapter. Miss Helen Casey and Miss Alice Ueland are in charge of the program.

Total Of 4,299 Books Circulated During June

A total of 4,299 books were circulated to 1,130 patrons served by the Douglas County bookmobile during the month of June.

The first month of service by the wheeled library ended June 29. When bookmobile Librarian Charlotte Hyre totaled up the count this week, she termed it "really remarkable and climbing steadily."

Each person checking out a book (or books) applied for a library card. The breakdown found 2,328 children and 1,971 adults signing for cards.

The bookmobile staff visited its regular stops twice during the month with the exception of the Tiller-Drew stop, which it made once. By stops, Miss Hyre said circulation for the month was:

Marine Sergeant Is New Assistant Recruiter Here

Marine Corps S. Sgt. Charles S. Lawson began work Monday as assistant recruiter at the Marine Corps recruiting office in Roseburg.

Before getting his present assignment, Lawson had been stationed at Camp Lejeune, N. C. This will be the first recruiting assignment for S. Sgt. Lawson, who has been in the Marine Corps for over five years. He is a native of Fort Worth, Texas.

S. Sgt. Lawson will assist T. Sgt. Barney Shanks who has been at the Roseburg recruiting station since August, 1955. T. Sgt. Shanks recently re-enlisted for four years. He has been in the Marine Corps since 1940.

S. Sgt. Shanks announced that complete details on the 7th Oregon Beaver Platoon are available at the recruiting station. Enlistees in the new platoon will leave Roseburg on July 16. Recruits can sign up for two, three and four years.

3 Young Oregon Heroes Named By Gov. Smith

SALEM — Three young Oregon heroes have been nominated by Gov. Elmo Smith for national recognition by the Young American Medal Committee of the U.S. Department of Justice.

The nominations are for congressional awards for outstanding acts of bravery during 1955. The governor's nominees are Donna Wampole, Garibaldi; Jimmie Whiteman, La Grande; and Lynn Pettit, Lebanon.

Donna, 12, rescued six children from a burning home in the rural area of Tillamook County on May 8, 1955. Her name was suggested by Elsie DeCook, editor of the Tillamook Headlight-Herald.

Young Whiteman, 14, is credited with saving a 17-year-old companion who had slipped into the swirling waters of the Grande Ronde River June 6, 1955. Fred Schneider, manager of the La Grande Chamber of Commerce, suggested Jimmie for the award.

Lynn, 12, saved a six-year-old boy from drowning when he discovered him in four feet of water at the Lebanon community pool last July 19. His deed was suggested for recognition by Mrs. Arthur P. Christensen, Lebanon.

Final awards will be determined by the committee with the approval of the U. S. attorney general.

Smith said he had already received two suggestions for 1956 nominations.

75 Japanese Okinawan Students Demonstrate

TOKYO — About 75 Japanese Okinawan students and women demonstrated before the U.S. embassy here Tuesday, shouting "Yankee go home" and "don't steal Okinawa."

The first part of the four-hour protest was orderly, but in the later stages they locked arms in a snake dance, elbowing police and brought a riot call. No one was hurt.

Okinawa's residents, supported by some Japanese quarters, have demanded abandonment of U.S. plans to pay lump sums for indefinite, long-term leases on the big American bases on the island.

Music will be provided by Wayne Wagner. The Elks Youth Activity Committee and the Youth Center committee of Roseburg are sponsoring the dance.

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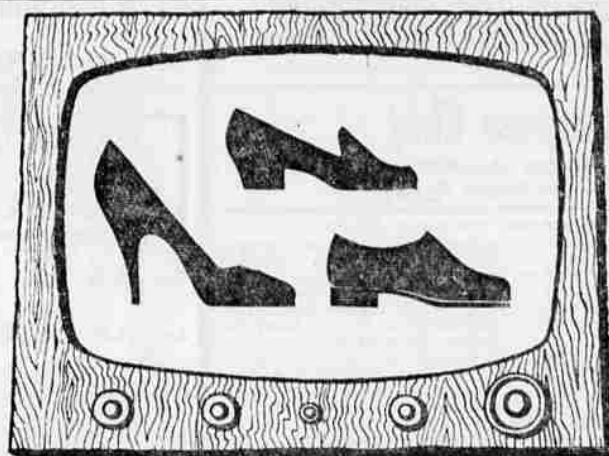
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
