

Roseburg Team Nabs Legion Title With 1-0 Win

Umpqua Salmon Run Best On Record

The yet-uncompleted spring run of chinook salmon in the Umpqua River has surpassed all previous runs on which records have been kept, according to William E. Pitney, biologist for the Oregon Game Commission.

With perhaps two weeks to a month to go yet in the migration, 7,089 salmon — higher than any terminal count on record — passed over the counting board at Winchester Dam through June 30.

It is the third straight year that a surge of new fish has been observed in the Game Commission's restoration program on the Umpqua. In 1954, the total was 6,613, or more than 1,700 more than in 1953. Last year, the count was 6,266.

It's probably that the run is about 90 per cent complete, gauging from foregoing years. Since 1946, when records first were kept, about 85 to 90 per cent of the migration was complete through the end of June.

The 7,089 are adults only. In addition, 1,219 jacks have been observed.

Between June 15-30, 875 adults and 247 jacks were counted at the Winchester Dam.

Summer steelhead are running in below-average numbers in the river. Through the end of the month, 575 steelhead were counted. Last year at the same time, 888 fish — 25.9 per cent of the total run — had passed over the counting board by June 30.

Roseburg denied the plate in the top of the fifth with the one and only score of the contest.

McClellan, Camas Valley's contribution to the local nine, was the batting hero of the day when he pounded a rousing triple to deep right field as leadoff batter in the first.

Pitcher Smith, batting in the ninth position made the first out of the frame and then leadoff batter Larry Bissonette, from Douglas High, blasted a sharp liner to second, and McClellan was off and running at the crack of the bat to score. Bill Oerding made the final out of the inning.

Miss Opportunities

Roseburg missed several good opportunities to score during the early portion of the game. In the first, Bissonette missed tagging up on Oerding's long fly to right.

The second stanza saw runners on first and second with no outs as Roseburg again failing to dent the plate.

McClellan went down by the strikeout route, and Smith was out for stepping on the plate while attempting to sacrifice. Bissonette retired the side, grounding out short to first.

Medford Legion Coach John Kovenz sent his lefty, Jerry Tyler to the mound in an attempt to silence the heavy bats of the visitors and had it not been for the one big blow by McClellan, his strategy might have worked.

Only Five Hits

Roseburg batters were able to get but five hits off his slants.

The win for the locals is their first step towards a repeat performance in the state Legion finals. They are slated to begin inter-district playoffs the latter part of next week.

The Bears clinched the league's "first half" pennant Wednesday night with a 5-0 shutout victory over Salem in the second game of an Independence Day doubleheader.

Salem won the opener, 5-3, but the nightcap victory gave the Bears what they needed to lift the pennant out of the reach of runnerup Eugene.

So it will be Yakima versus the field when the seven-team league starts a fresh campaign in a new season next week. The loop splits the season Monday to give the last-place clubs a fresh start. The "second half" winner will meet Yakima in a playoff in September.

Spokane, deep in the cellar, warmed up for the new season with a double victory over Wenatchee Wednesday. The Indians topped the Chiefs, 2-0 and 8-3 to make it three out of four in the present series.

Tri-City and Lewiston split, Tri-City winning the opener, 13-9 and the Broncs the second game, 6-5. Eugene was not scheduled.

Dick Young neatly spaced eight hits as Yakima tucked away the pennant in the night cap at Salem. Young struck out five and walked none in posting his 12th victory of the season. The bears saluted the game away with a four-run outburst in the third.

Bill Walsh went the distance for Salem in the opener. He allowed eight hits including Herm Lewis' second-inning homer.

An Independence Day crowd of 2,138 watched Spokane take two from Wenatchee.
