

### Reds Fear New Polish Uprising Among Workers

BERLIN (AP)—A West German businessman just returned from Communist Poland's riot-torn city of Poznan said Friday the Reds fear a new workers' uprising.

"Armed patrols are constantly cruising through the streets of Poznan," he reported. "They're armed with machine pistols, and use motorcycles, jeeps and trucks."

"Every important building is guarded. If youths try to gather in small groups, the police immediately move in and disperse them."

The businessman, who asked not to be identified, left Poznan Thursday by car and arrived in West Berlin Thursday night.

He said rebel-hunting units of the Polish army were combing every village within 30 miles of Poznan.

"They are looking mostly for youths, because it was the young people of Poznan who rioted," the businessman said. "I understand the authorities have arrested about 3,000 persons already, and most of them are youths."

The rebellion, which cost an estimated 200 to 300 lives, broke out June 28 and wasn't suppressed until two days later.

### Shepilov Urges Contacts Between U. S. And Russia

MOSCOW (AP)—Russia's Foreign Minister Shepilov says increased contacts between the Soviet Union and the United States are "most important" and that he is looking forward to meeting Secretary of State Dulles.

At his first news conference for Western reporters, the new foreign minister said he expects to visit the United States in November for the U. N. General Assembly. Referring to Dulles, he said:

"I am very interested in contacting him, among others, because all such contacts help improve the general situation."

Shepilov's meeting with Western newsmen was an informal conference at a reception for visiting U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold.

"There is a broad basis for normalization of relations between the United States and the Soviet Union," Shepilov said. "We should seek to make use of this foundation to make rapprochement a reality."

### Sweet Home Boy Killed In Truck Collision

SWEET HOME (AP)—Loren Harold Schouweiler, about 14, Healdsburg, Calif., was killed and his brother injured in a collision with a logging truck about nine miles west of here Thursday.

His brother, Marvin Dean Schouweiler, 16, was driving the car when it was in the sideswiping collision with the truck. The car then careened 25 feet down a bank to a railroad grade.



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### Prague Paper Reports Police Smash Fire Plot

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—A Prague newspaper reported Friday that Czechoslovak Communist security police smashed a plot to set fire to Prague's big Pankrac prison and seize the radio station and central post office.

The newspaper report said the armed plotters were captured and "liquidated in a single day." It added that in capturing two of the leading plotters there was gunfire in which a security policeman was killed.

The story of the plot was published in Prace, official organ of the Czechoslovak trade unions. The article was titled "day by day in combat against enemies of the state." It also related the capture of various other alleged spies and subversives and charged that all were in the pay of American and other "imperialist intelligence services." No dates of these actions were given.

Prace said the gang which plotted to fire Pankrac—Czechoslovakia's biggest prison on the outskirts of the capital—and seize the radio and post office nearer the center of town was composed of former private business people and former Czechoslovak army officers. It did not state how many were involved but said the leader was a man named Jirasek.
