

Two Northwest States To Get \$224 Million

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon and Washington are eligible for nearly \$224 million dollars in federal aid for highway construction over the next three years.

The highway bill signed by President Eisenhower last week would give Washington State \$119,600,000 and Oregon \$104,200,000 in federal money over the three-year period.

Because the states must put up an amount equal to 10 per cent of the federal allocation for roads in the new interstate system and match on an equal basis the allocations for the other three types of aid, Washington will be called upon for \$19,130,000 and Oregon for \$14,530,000 if they wish to obtain their full federal allocation.

Effective with the current year, which started July 1, allocations by categories over the next three years include (in round numbers): Oregon: Interstate, \$15,900,000; \$23,100,000; \$27,200,000; Primary, \$6,300,000; \$6,600,000; \$6,600,000; Secondary, \$4,500,000; \$4,500,000; \$4,600,000; urban, \$1,600,000; \$1,700,000; \$1,800,000.

Washington: Interstate, \$18,900,000; \$27,300,000; \$32,100,000; Primary, \$6,100,000; \$6,400,000; \$6,500,000; Secondary, \$4,100,000; \$4,200,000; \$4,400,000; urban, \$3,100,000; \$3,200,000; \$3,300,000.

Possible Rail Strike Seen On Union Pacific

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — H. W. Corbett, vice president of the Order of Railway Conductors and Brakemen, said Tuesday he is awaiting final authorization from the union president for a strike of some 500 men against the Union Pacific Railway.

Corbett said the president, R. O. Hughes of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, is reviewing the issues and is expected to make his decision by Friday or Saturday.

The strike would affect traffic over the Union Pacific between Salt Lake City and Butte, Mont., and from Green River, Wyo., through Portland, Seattle, Yakima, Spokane, Moscow and Lewiston.

3 Men On Raft Given First Aid Out At Sea

NEW YORK (AP) — Three men on a raft were given first aid 1,000 miles at sea Thursday by the U. S. Navy transport Callan.

Headquarters of the Military Sea Transport Service (MSTS) here said the Callan received a distress call from the raft L. Egare II at 2:30 a. m.

The ship's doctor, Lt. J. D. Murphy, reported the raft three-some in generally excellent health and provided medication for temporary digestive upset.

The raft left Halifax, N. S., May 24, heading for Europe in the North Atlantic drift current. Aboard are Henri Beaudout, Guston Van Ackere and Marc Modena. The MSTS had no further information concerning the voyagers.

In another broadcast Thursday, Radio Moscow said the Kremlin's desanctification of Stalin still is

the main topic of discussion among the Russian people and has won their "unanimous approval."

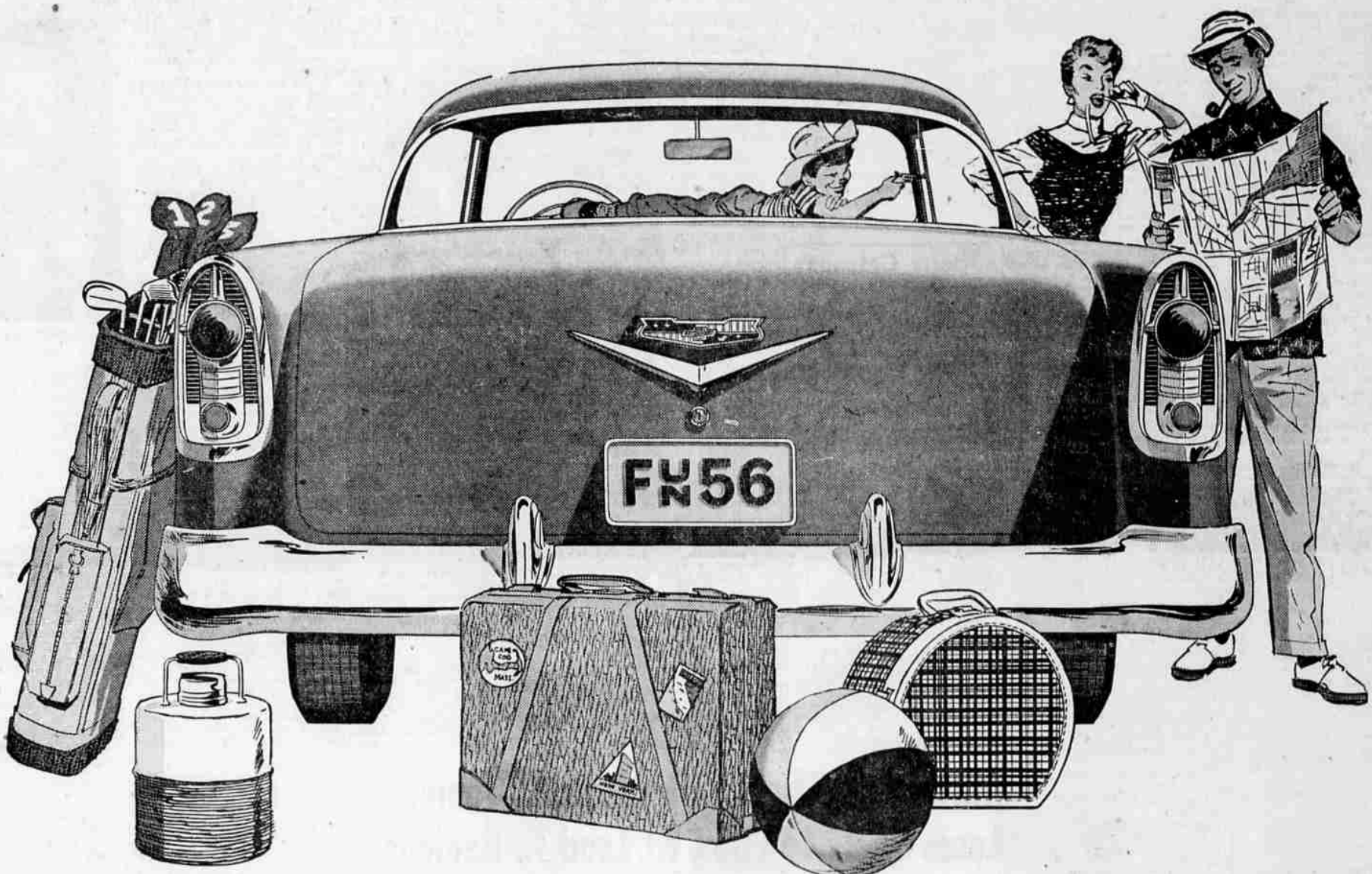
The cake was won by George McDowell. The next meeting will be held Friday, July 13, with Viola White, Isabel McDowell and Cecelia Conklin as hostesses.
