The Yakima Bears return to their home baseball park Friday night to go through the motions of what was to have been a showdown battle with Eugene for the Northwest League's "first half" championship.

After a neck-and-neck race through the month of June, the Bears topped the title Wednesday night, beating Salem in a "crucial" game that made it mathematically impossible for Eugene to catch up.

The Emeralds and the Bears will play four games at Yakima to wind up the first half of the split season. The league starts all over Monday with the winner of the "second half" meeting Yakima in September.

Yakima widened its margin Thursday night to six full games with a 5-4 decision over Salem. Tri-City beat Lewiston, 9-6, in the league's only other game. Spokane and Wenatchee were rained out after four innings.

In the windup at Salem, the Senators barely missed catching the Bears in the bottom of the ninth. Yakima led, 5-2, when the Solons came up for their last turn at it. Salem scored twice and had the tying run on base when Yakima pitcher Don Boenker induced Ray Webster to hit a grounder for the final out.

Lewiston also put on a bottom-of-the-ninth rally but it ended three runs short of overtaking the Braves. The rally featured home runs by Bruce McIntosh (with one on) and Gene Klingler. Tri-City's Tom Perez homered with two on in the fifth.

Lewiston moves to Spokane Friday night for a four-game stand that will wind up the first half and Wenatchee to Tri-City.

PCL Proxy Levies Fines At Seal, Solon Fighters

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Leslie O'Connor, Pacific Coast League president, was quick in assessing fines for the two-punch fight he saw when Ferris Fain of Sacramento and Eli Grba of San Francisco.

O'Connor Thursday fined Fain, Solon player-coach, \$75 and Grba, Seal pitcher, \$50, for their clash at Sacramento Wednesday. O'Connor was watching the game.

Each threw one punch—both missed—after Fain protested what he called a deliberate dust off pitch by Grba. O'Connor suspended five day suspensions on good behavior.

Coos Bay Squad Slated In Series By Black Sox

The Drain Black Sox will attempt to get back on to the victory trail in a three-game series starting today against the Coos Bay - North Bend club after a near disastrous road trip to the Bend area last weekend.

The first game is scheduled for the Drain ball park at 8 p.m. with the second slated for North Bend Saturday night and the final game booked for Drain Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m.

Dick Duerr probably will go postwar in the series opener, with Bill Croco and Noel Arronson around for the final two. Manager Heiser, who came out of retirement last week at Bend, probably will stay close to the bullpen should the occasion arise.

Bill Beard is slated to start behind the plate with Ad Rutschman on second, Don Kirsch at short, Ray Stratton at third and Vern Marshall at first. The outfield will consist of Pat Wohlers, Norm Welch and Ted Wilson.

Ex Charles' Manager Sees Another Comeback

TACOMA (AP) — With Rocky Marciano out of the picture, former world heavyweight champion Ex-Charles is ready for another comeback, Charles' manager said Thursday.

Arriving to prepare for Charles' fight July 13 with Irish Pat McMurry, Tom Tannas said Marciano's retirement opens the way for the ex-champ to campaign actively for the title.

Charles, who was heavyweight champion from 1949 to 51, will be 35 Saturday. He was due here Friday with Frankie Williams, his sparring partner, to open training for the bout with McMurry.

PCC To Probe 3 More Teams

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Pacific Coast Conference meets here Saturday and Sunday to probe reports of illegal financial aid to athletes by Southern California, California and Stanford.

Washington and UCLA recently were penalized severely for such infractions.

Conference action is taken by the faculty representatives of the nine member schools with athletic directors attending but not voting.

Southern California may be in for severe penalties. Newspapers quoted Los Angeles sources as saying Southern California admitted 42 cases of rule violations.

J. Miller Leavy, a UCLA alumnus and deputy Los Angeles County district attorney, has charged that a group of USC alumni raised \$71,235 and paid it to 60 Trojan athletes in two years.

He also accused the University of California of having a "phony job racket" in which he said athletes were given off-campus jobs with pay but little or no work.

Cal officials reported finding 20 athletes who received a total of \$1,100 in the 1955-56 school year as tuition.

That's approved in the conference but president Robert Gordon Sproul of California has never approved such payments.

On June 21, Al Masters, athletic director at Stanford, said he had discovered "minor violations" of the football code at his school.

He added, "There is no slush fund here, and there is no organized alumni payoff system."

Californians Dominate Spokane Tennis Event

SPOKANE (AP) — California continued to dominate the Inland Empire Tennis Tournament Thursday with four Los Angeles players bailing through to the men's singles semi-finals.

Glen Bassett ousted Larry Mounger of Seattle, 6-1, 6-1; Greg Grant beat Jack Neer of Portland, 9-7, 7-5; Bob Sherman defeated Clyde Knox of Portland, 6-4, 6-3, and Earl Baumgardner eliminated Lee Patten of Spokane, 6-2, 6-1.

However, Neer and Bill Rose of Portland teamed to defeat Sherman and Ed Bell of Los Angeles, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3, in men's doubles.

Gordie Martin of Seattle beat Bob Quall of Spokane, 6-4, 6-4, in junior men's singles. Jerry Bratton of Olympia whipped Bob Cherry of Los Angeles, 6-3, 6-0; Art Kono of Seattle tripped Bill Burley of Seattle, 6-4, 6-4, and Dave Broom of Spokane dropped John Kettering of Seattle, 6-2, 6-4.

Hoad Triumphs At Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Lew Hoad won the Wimbledon men's singles tennis championship Friday by crushing his fellow Australian, Ken Rosewall, 6-2, 4-6, 7-5, 6-4. They were the first and second seeded players in the tournament.

Hoad, who Thursday routed the last American in the tournament, Ham Richardson, dominated the match except in the second set and for a few games at the start of the third.

Hoad is Australian champion and Rosewall was runner-up to him in the Australian tournament last winter.

The contest between the two 21-year-olds was the first all-Australian men's final at Wimbledon since 1922. Rosewall was finalist in 1954, losing to Jaroslav Drobny of Egypt.

The match went about as expected. The big, blond Hoad used his more powerful service and ground strokes and his quickness at the net to good advantage. Rosewall, with less power, had to rely on court-covering and retrieving. He did well this way for a while simply because he was going for every shot and returning smartly to score with placements.

Hoad, trailing 1-3 and 2-4 in the final set, called on his strong service and unreturnable drives to win five straight games and the match. He took the last point when Rosewall netted a backhand shot.

Durando Gets Unpopular Decision From Martinez

PORTLAND (AP) — Jimmy Martinez of Phoenix got the nod from the fans but not from the judges Thursday night as he dropped a split decision to hard-hitting Ernie Durando of Rayonne, N.J., in their match.

Referee Ralph Gruman voted for Martinez but the two judges gave the fight to Durando. The fans booed the decision.

Martinez weighed 160 to Durando's 162.
