Montana School Head Sees Revenue From State Land

PORTLAND (AP) — Montana's superintendent of schools says she hopes that in a couple of generations that the 4½ million acres of land the school system owns will pay for half of the state's education budget.

Miss Mary Condon of Billings said "it looks like it is going to provide the big income, if we can only hold onto what we have."

She said she is fighting forces in Montana that want a faster development of the state.

"They say the school system should get into the swing by encouraging industry and giving our holdings away at a nominal fee," she said. "Their argument is that faster development will bring in bigger state revenue and thereby provide bigger state incomes."

The fight has now gone to the courts where Miss Condon said she is being helped by Attorney General Arnold Olsen, now Democratic candidate for governor.

Miss Condon said the school system already has 300,000 acres of its holdings out in oil leases plus additional leases for uranium and other mining. The rest is leased

to farmers for crops and grazing. In addition to the 4½ million acres, the school system also controls the mineral rights on 1½ million acres. The system has built up a general fund of 36 million dollars and this has been invested and is drawing interest, she said.

"Like Oregon and Washington," Miss Condon said, "Montana was given sections 16 and 36 of each township when it became a state."

She said that Washington appears to be developing a similar program. "I understand Oregon has long parted with its rights to the original school land grants," she added.

Mrs. Pearl Wanamaker, Washington schools superintendent, said her school system holds 2,250,000 acres of land and has the mineral rights to additional land. Most of the acreage is under lease to farmers.

They were here for the National Education Assn. (NEA) convention.

76-Year School Boundary Error Is Discovered

SALEM (AP) — A school boundary error, putting school pupils, taxes and school board directors in the wrong district for at least 76 years, has been brought to light here.

Involved in the confusion is some 60 acres of bottom land about 12 miles southwest of Salem on the border of Salem and Riverview School districts.

A petition by a nearby land owner to have his Salem district property annexed to Riverview brought about a land description check revealing the error.

Records show that taxes on the land, much of it valuable river bottom soil, have been incorrectly going to the Riverview district all these years.

One consolation for the tax losing district, however, was that the youngsters have been going the way of the taxes, thinking they belonged in the other district.

George Hoyer, who owns part of the land involved, said his grandfather had bought it in 1880 and the Hoyer generations have been going to the wrong school ever since. Not only that but Hoyer elders through the years have served as school board members, including George for the last 18 years, all illegally.

Hoyer said his father had even contributed the land on which the school now stands. He'll petition the county to change the boundary to make legal what every one took for granted for over three-quarters of a century.

Pistol-Packin' Mama Startles Commons Meet

LONDON (AP) — Battling Bessie Braddock may be known henceforth as "Two-gun Bessie, the pistol packin' Mama."

Mrs. Braddock, outspoken, 200-pound Labor member for a tough Liverpool district, enlivened a House of Commons debate on antirime legislation by pulling a brace of air pistols from a paper bag.

She rushed across to the government benches and wagged her guns under the nose of Home Secretary Gwilym Lloyd-George.

Then, while both conservatives and Laborites cheered, she waved them in the air and clicked their triggers.

"Will the government do something about this?" she demanded loudly. "Children under 17 can buy these. Is it any wonder we're always in trouble?"

Deputy Speaker Sir Ryhs Hopkin Morris informed Mrs. Braddock icily that she was out of order for bringing "those things" into the House. When she retorted she had a license, he said it didn't apply in Commons.

"You've got to startle this House before anybody does anything," she commented. Then she put the guns away.

Largest Concrete Floating Drydock Is Completed

SEATTLE (AP) — The largest concrete floating drydock ever built in this country—a 13,500-ton monster 400 feet long—has been completed by Todd Shipyards here and turned over to the Navy.

The 4 million dollar giant is at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton being readied for towing to San Diego.

Built right into the drydock are accommodations for 36 men, including staterooms, wardroom, dining room and infirmary. Telephones link the various sections.

Some other statistics:

A third larger than any other concrete drydock in the country, the AFDL-48 is 96 feet wide, 33 feet high and contains 5,400 cubic yards of concrete and 2,000 tons of reinforcing steel.

Langlie Arrives To Kick Off His Drive For Senate

SEATTLE (AP) — Gov. Langlie arrived here Friday to kick off his campaign for the U.S. Senate.

With the Republican state convention as a backdrop, the governor was cast in roles that will keep him in the center of the party spotlight for the better part of two days.

He was scheduled to address the Young Republicans Friday; deliver a major speech at the party convention Saturday; introduce the keynote, Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton, and take part in other convention activities.

His Saturday address probably will be a high level speech with time out to replay to some of the attacks his Democratic opponent, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, fired at the Republican administration when he keynoted the Democratic convention last Saturday.

Convention proceedings will be televised including the razzle-dazzle of demonstrations boosting Langlie for the Senate and extolling the virtues of Lt. Gov. Emmett T. Anderson and Atty. Gen. Don Eastwood, both of whom are seeking the GOP governor nomination.

Republicans Have Failed, Says Demo Candidate

PORTLAND (AP) — Republicans have failed to provide adequately for education in Oregon, Robert D. Holmes, Democratic candidate for governor, said Thursday.

He said economy-minded Republicans had cut funds from school bills, and one of the results is that University of Oregon and Oregon State College faculty members are leaving in increasing numbers for other jobs.

Holmes told the Democratic Business and Professional Men's Club that Oregon now is filling 40 per cent of its primary and secondary school teaching jobs with persons holding only emergency certificates.

"That means we are using that many teachers who do not come up to our standard. They are badly needed now, but we should encourage education of teachers so that those below standard can be weeded out," he said.

Holmes advocated more money for education.

"Cheap education is wasteful extravagance," he said.
