Riddle To Vote On Supplementary Budget July 17

A proposal to provide a supplementary budget for the City of Riddle will be put to the people there July 17 in a special election, according to the Myrtle Creek Mail.

The amount of \$17,936.50 is on deposit in the city treasury, but a vote of the people is required before the funds can be used to pay operating expenses of the city.

The supplementary budget, if approved, will clean up old claims and bills against the city, and budgeted and actual expenditures may balance.

Since the money already is on hand, there will be no increase in taxes, city officials said.

Actually, two proposals will be on the ballot, since passage of the supplementary budget entails a charter amendment.
