Loan Of Boat Sought For Y's Camp For Boys

In previous years it has been possible for the YMCA to rent boats from the lodge at the lake. This year a heavy demand from fishermen has made rentals impossible, Naden said.

He said the YMCA would like to borrow two rowboats capable of carrying four or five people for youth use. Some 70 Roseburg area boys will be attending the camp. Naden said other communities would be granting passes and Medford would be providing boats in a like manner.

Fire In Business Area Engulfs Six Buildings

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — Fire engulfed six large buildings in the business heart of Springfield early today, causing damage estimated by fire officials at "hundreds of thousands of dollars." No casualties were reported.

Firemen contained the blaze within the six-building area after it spread rapidly from a two-story brick structure housing the Eisner Food Center, headquarters of an Illinois grocery chain.

An adjoining four-story building housing a department store and several apartments was engulfed by flames, as were a restaurant, a clothing store, a bakery and a vacant building.

Oregon Counties Sated For Revenue Sharing

SALEM — Oregon counties will share \$2,505,194.14 in highway revenues for the second quarter of 1956, the secretary of state's office announced Monday.

Another \$74,721.87 is being apportioned from amusement device tax moneys for the fiscal year ending June 30. Sixty per cent of the sum goes to the state public assistance fund and 40 per cent to the counties.

The highway funds are distributed on a pro rata basis for the \$20-\$29 motor vehicles registered during 1955. Funds are accumulated from registration, fuel tax, carrier fees and fines.

Negroes Again Reject Peace Bid on Boycott

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Tallahassee Negroes Sunday night again rejected a compromise proposal for ending the bus boycott and reaffirmed their determination to do without public transportation until they get integrated seating.

The Tallahassee City Commission renewed an offer to permit Negroes to sit where they wish on buses except for one three-passenger seat reserved for white patrons.

The Rev. David Brooks, a leader of the Negro Inter-Civic Council, reported the commission offer, which was unanimously rejected.

He said he understood Negroes would not be required to stand while the white seat remained empty and that if it were occupied by Negroes before whites boarded the bus, the white passengers would have to stand.

More Roseburg Boys Get Diamond Lake Camp Bid

Ten more boys from Roseburg will be able to attend YMCA camp at Diamond Lake this summer because of co-operation between the Roseburg and Klamath Falls 'Y's.

Don Naden, director here, said the Klamath Falls 'Y' will accept the 10 boys for its camp, which will be July 15-21.

Only 70 boys from Roseburg can be handled in August, Naden said, and the roster has been filled for several weeks.

He advised that parents with boys 10-14 years of age may enroll their sons at the local YMCA. The telephone number is OR 3-3558. The Klamath Falls camp will be under the direction of Paul Campbell, general secretary of the Klamath Falls YMCA.

Boys enrolled in the Roseburg camping program in August won't be eligible to attend the Klamath Falls camp, Naden said.

into action Sunday night by another telephone call, it was learned.

Three Men Questioned
Following instructions, she left home so as to arrive at 53rd St. and Skillman Ave., in Woodside, Queens, at 10:30 p.m. in a deserted spot, near the Long Island Railroad tracks.

The caller has said, it was learned, that 30 minutes after the money was picked up by Mrs. Weinberger would find her baby in St. Joan of Arc Roman Catholic Church, in Jackson Heights, Queens, several miles away.

Alone, and with \$5,000 cold cash in her possession, the mother waited an agonizing 70 minutes. Nothing happened.

She went to the church anyway. Police and clergymen joined to search the building from top to bottom.

Again, nothing, and Mrs. Weinberger made her weary way home.

No Children In Church
Sunday night's strange, late-hour visit in Queens occurred in the midst of a series of new telephone calls to the Weinberger home from that same area. Three men were seized by police.

The pay - telephone calls were made at 12:40 a.m.; 1:40 a.m. and 2:40 a.m. Monday. Police traced them through a telephone operator, who overheard snatches of the conversation while collecting overtime calls.

Queens chief of detective Raymond V. Martin said the men apparently were not the kidnappers, but they still were being questioned at mid-day.

What kind of communication sent Mrs. Weinberger to her late night wait on a streetside 15 miles from home was not made known, but it was reported the message was not received by telephone.

Two of the traced calls early Monday were made from taverns and one from a drug store.

Meanwhile, police in Stamford, Conn., said a man entered a drugstore there Friday and asked for the vitamin compound the Weinberger baby was taking along with his bottle. The compound—a vitamin B12 preparation called Doxex—is rarely used in infants' formulas.

The man left when told the store did not carry the preparation.

The child's need for the vitamin was widely publicized.

Harry Gilvin Dies Of Attack

Harry Eugene Gilvin, 78, died of a heart attack at his home in Roseburg Saturday.

Gilvin was a retired Southern Pacific conductor.

He was born in Knoxville, Tenn., February 27, 1878, and came to Oregon with his parents in 1890.

He went to work with the SP on the Portland Division in 1895. And from 1913 until his retirement in 1949 he worked on the Rio Grande Division of the railroad. For the past six years he had lived in Roseburg.

The deceased was married to Ivy Pearl Johnson on February 27, 1932. She preceded him in death in 1952.

Gilvin was a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and of the Roseburg Elks Lodge No. 326.

He is survived by a sister, Mrs. J. W. Tynan, Roseburg, and a brother, Richard Gilvin, Portland.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. Cremation rites will follow at the Rest Haven Memorial Park in Eugene.

Supporters See Quick Nomination For Adlai

Some supporters of Adlai Stevenson appeared confident today that Stevenson will grab the Democratic presidential nomination at the national convention next month before other hopefuls can find their seats.

Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala), Stevenson's 1952 running mate, said there is "a growing possibility" Stevenson will get the nod on the first ballot, and certainly "no later than the second ballot."

Sen. Lehman (D-NY) agreed. "If he's not nominated on the first ballot I'm very confident he will be nominated on one of the early ballots," Lehman added.

Life Insurance System Planned By Loan Assn.

Umpqua Savings & Loan Assn. will become one of the first such associations in the state to inaugurate a group life insurance program in conjunction with loans, if a 75 per cent majority of the 1,200 borrowers approve.

This was the report from William Eaton, secretary of the Roseburg association, today.

He said the plan has been set up with the Standard Insurance Co. of Portland exclusively for Umpqua Savings & Loan. He said the plan will take effect as soon as 75 per cent of the existing borrowers approve confirmation.

Eaton said the plan does not call for an increase in monthly installment payments, but rather sets up an extension of time on the loan to take care of premiums.

Eaton said the purpose of the new plan is to enable any borrower upon his death to leave a debt-free home to his family. He explained that is a borrower dies before the loan is repaid, the outstanding loan balance will be automatically retired. He said the rate will apply to all parties regardless of occupation.

He also said a borrower at the age of 50 will be eligible for coverage up to \$15,000. The insurance amount allowed after 50 will decrease with each year of age.
