President Says Fissionable Material Too Valuable To Be Placed In Storage Vault

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower says the nation's supply of fissionable materials is "much too valuable to be placed in an atomic vault."

Radar Control Cost Placed At \$2,000 A Month

SPOKANE (AP)—It costs about \$2,000 a month to keep radar units and motorcycle patrols on the highways and the added expense has put the Washington State Patrol in a "financial bind," Acting Chief Roy L. Carlson said Friday.

But the program in the patrol's war against highway accidents has been so effective "we feel it is well worth it," he told a reporter.

Carlson, here on a routine visit, said the patrol's traveling expense cost ran about \$5,500 a month before the radar and motorcycle units were added.

Now they average more than \$7,500 and the traveling expense fund is \$17,000 overexpended, he said. To keep the fund in the black for the rest of the biennium, Carlson said he has "borrowed" \$25,000 from the patrol's new-car fund. This means the patrol will be unable to replace 17 of the 40 vehicles which could be replaced this fall.

He said he has asked Gov. Langlie to transfer \$25,000 from the governor's emergency fund to the patrol's new-car fund.

That was his reply to a proposal from Sen. Anderson (D-NM) that the country increase its production of nuclear materials and store some of them in "a critical reserve for peace or war."

The nation's reserve supply of gold is stored in vaults at Ft. Knox, Ky.

Anderson made public Thursday his letter in which he proposed the atomic bank. Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) and Rep. Price (D-Ill.) joined in Anderson's proposal, made May 24. All three are members of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee which Anderson heads.

They said the present method of allocating the fissionable materials "leaves no uncommitted reserve from which either reactor fuel elements or defensive weapons could be fabricated in an emergency."

Eisenhower said he thinks the present program is "in healthy condition," and added that a number of years would be necessary to provide the increased production the Congress members suggested.

Saying the supply is "too valuable" to bank, Eisenhower expressed the opinion that "in existing world conditions the weapons stockpile must continue to have first call," and added: "Fortunately, the condition of

Miller Refuses Again To Name Reds

WASHINGTON (AP)—Arthur Miller, playwright bridegroom of actress Marilyn Monroe, refused again Saturday to name for a Congressional committee the persons he once saw at a meeting of Communist writers.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities had threatened Miller with contempt action for refusing to answer. Chairman Walter (D-Pa.), announcing Miller's second refusal, commented:

"If that's his answer to the opportunity offered by the committee to avoid contempt, then it seems to me he's inviting it."

Miller, who Friday was granted a passport to go on a European honeymoon with his bride, sent committee members a letter stating in effect the position he took at a committee meeting on June 21.

At that time, the 40-year-old Miller said his conscience would "not permit me to use the name

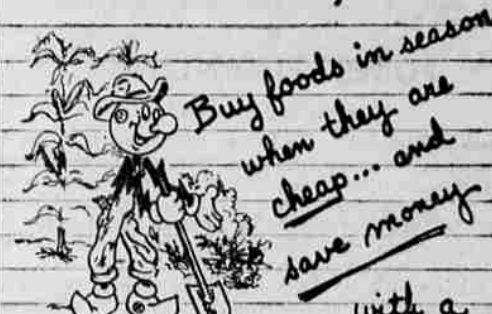
