No "Giveaways" Proof, Interior Chief Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Seaton says he doesn't think the Eisenhower administration has given away any natural resources, but if it has "I'm sure that was an inadvertence."

He said in a television interview that the administration has expanded the national parks and game and wildlife preserves, and "certainly couldn't be the same administration that gave anything away."

Seaton's predecessor Douglas McKay had been the target of Democratic "giveaway" charges based on power policies, permits to drill for oil and gas on game preserves, and other actions.

Seaton conceded that in the month he has been in office he hasn't examined every public lands transaction over the last four years, but said he has found nothing to support the charges.

Poland Protest Snubbed By U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department has brushed aside a Polish protest of "highly improper interference" by the United States in Poland's internal affairs.

Polish Ambassador Romuald Spasowski registered the protest Friday against statements made here in connection with last week's rioting in Poznan.

United States officials said the diplomatic complaint apparently was designed as counter propaganda and that the Poles would probably try to use it to offset the impact of American comments about communist oppression in their country.

But as a diplomatic move, they said, it had little substance and did not appear to require an answer. If there was any surprise here it was at the mild tone of the objection.

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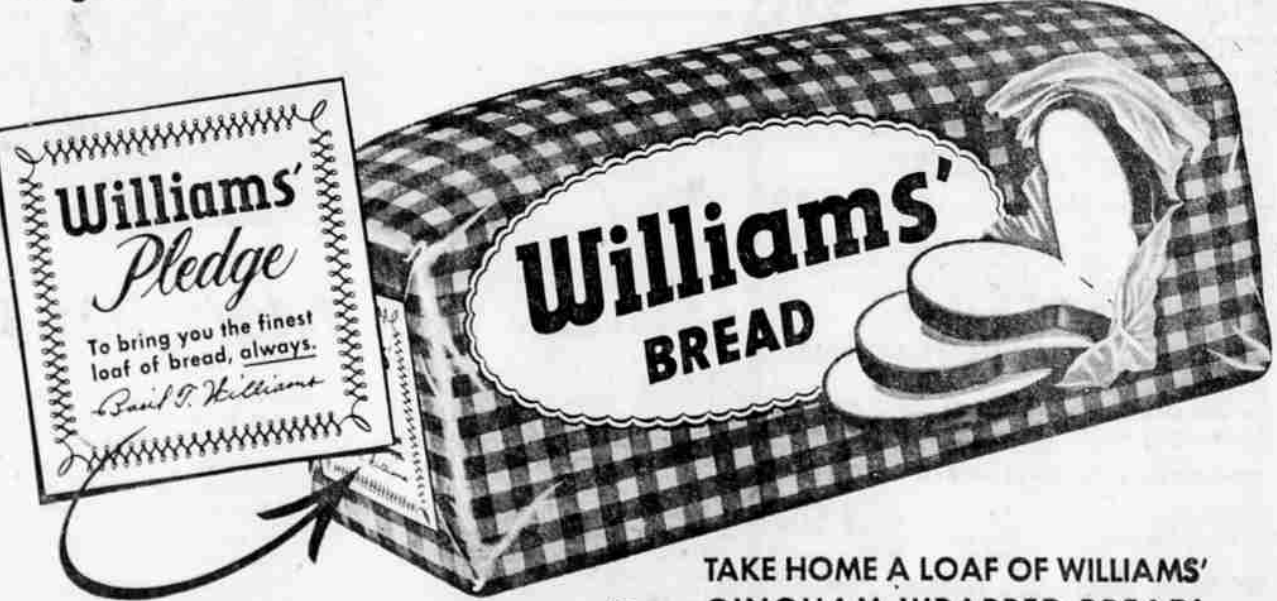
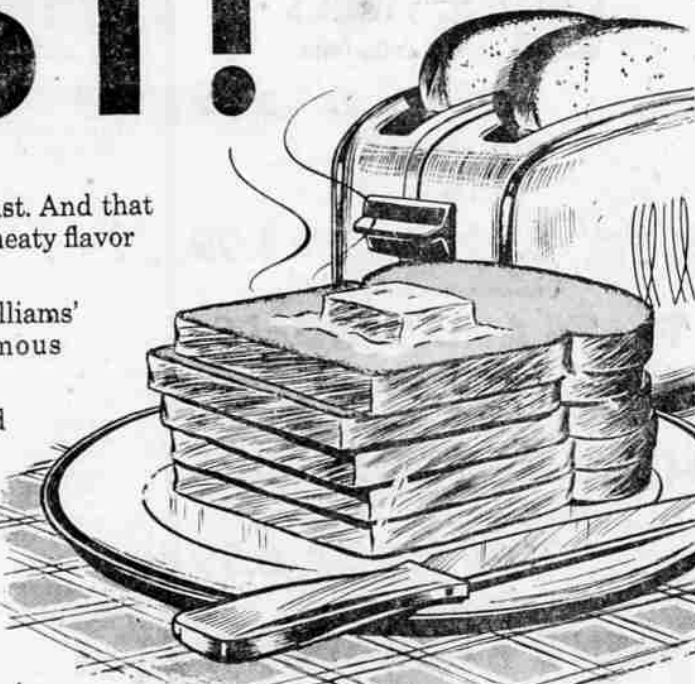
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
