

Douglas-Coast Road Project To Be Pushed

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Maple, manager of the Coos County Chamber of Commerce, Commission Contact Told George Burr, mayor of Coquille and co-chairman of the Coos Chamber highway committee, reported to the group on a visit to the highway department in Salem Monday.

He told of a conversation with State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock's chief assistant during which the east-west road was discussed. Although "hard to pin down," Mayor Burr said he had been told that there "might" be a survey for the route within the next six months.

He also told the group that in Salem it was pointed out that it was "easier" to get an entirely new road when the old route can be abandoned, which is not the case with Highway 42.

Funeral Services Set For Rudometkin

Funeral services for John Andrew Rudometkin, 44, will be held in The Chapel of the Roses Thursday, at 2 p.m. The Rev. Ellsworth Tibbitts of the First Methodist Church will officiate.

Rudometkin was accidentally killed in a logging accident July 9 at Panther Creek while working for the George Lumber Company. He was born Sept. 28, 1911, in Sohar County, Mexico, and came to Roseburg nine years ago.

Surviving are his wife, Corita Rudometkin of Roseburg; a son, John Robert Rudometkin, also of Roseburg; and a daughter, Eileen Rudometkin in the Merchant Marines stationed in Los Angeles; and Jack and Fred Rudometkin, both of Los Angeles; four sisters: Mrs. Levin (Mary) Katanian, Mrs. Tanja Wren, Mrs. Hazel Strohn and Mrs. Sarah Vernonion, all of Los Angeles.

Common Cold Still Problem Although medicine has annihilated many diseases and controlled others, Dr. Wainscott says probably no real advance has been made in treatment of the common cold, "It's still around," he said, adding the treatments today are the same as in 1910.

Few Epidemics Noted In 1955, with other physicians, he financed the building of the Medical Arts Bldg. That same year the main unit of the present county courthouse was erected.

Small Fire Spotted Near Tiller Monday

Fire burned over three acres of logged-off land on the Tiller-Traill highway Monday afternoon, according to Ray Hampton of the U. S. Forest Service.

Apparently started by a cigarette, the blaze was discovered just before noon, Hampton said. The fire was about 10 miles from Tiller near Elk Creek, along the highway.

Some 15 men were dispatched to fight the fire, Hampton said, including a 14-man suppression crew from the Wolf Creek station to help in the mop-up operations. They returned Tuesday.

There was no damage, since the fire was confined to a brushy area which had been logged and on which the slash had been burned, Hampton said.

It was charged by some of those present that some business men and members of the council had been trying to stall the project so the people working on the center could not complete it by the Aug. 1 deadline set by the council earlier.

Reedsport Man Arrested For Alleged Ax Threat

A Reedsport man, Donald Davis Syverous, charged by his sister with threatening her with an ax, posted a \$1,000 bail bond at Douglas County jail Tuesday and was released. No trial date has been set.

Six women listened intently Tuesday afternoon in a circuit courtroom while Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich explained the duties and privileges of American citizenship.

Shortly after, they officially became citizens.

The six and the countries from which they come are: Inga Marie Erickson of Gardiner, Norway; Alvida Aslaug Barrett of Brockway, Norway; Jean Siles of 525 Sykes St., Roseburg, Canada; Anna Francis Smoot of 1545 NE Thomas St., Roseburg, England; Christa Ann Priest of Sutherland, Germany; and Josephine May van Orman of Dulard, Canada.

July 10 was a banner day in their lives. It meant the culmination of months of effort in becoming thoroughly acquainted with their new homeland. On hand for their swearing-in was a representative of the U.S. Dept. of Justice's Immigration and Naturalization Service, which carried the responsibility of acquainting the new citizens with their new country. He was Leroy Schilling.

Judge Woodrich explained to the women that with their citizenship, they became heirs to many privileges. "But for every privilege there is a duty right along with it," he emphasized. He cited as an example the privilege to vote. He said with the right goes a duty to examine closely the backgrounds, records and characters of those running for public office in order to sift the truth from half-truths and fancy.

Roller Operator's Condition Reported

Peterson, who was arrested by the state police this month, pleaded guilty to a charge of entering a motor vehicle with intent to steal. He and a Sutherland juvenile allegedly tried to steal \$147 in fishing tackle from a jeep owned by William Jones of Roseburg. The incident allegedly took place June 10.

Peterson was granted probation on the basis of his youth and his family obligations. He is married and the father of a 6-month old child.
