'U. S. Agents' Get Reds' Blame For Revolt In Poland

BERLIN (AP) — Communist East Germany announced Tuesday it had arrested "U. S. intelligence agents" who had orders to stir up the recent bread and freedom revolt in the Polish city of Poznan.

The announcement was made by Fritz Beyling, East German information chief, at a news conference. He did not disclose the nationality, names or numbers of the men arrested.

He indicated they were seized before the revolt broke out about two weeks ago.

The Communists have been issuing propaganda statements blaming "Western agents" for fomenting the Poznan revolt. A Polish commission has reported that the underlying causes were justified grievances of the workers.

"Clear Proof" Claimed
Beyling told reporters: "We have arrested U. S. intelligence agents who were operating from West Berlin or West Germany and were assigned to work at Poznan. American dollars were found in their possession."

An indication of how the Communists intend to play up the arrests was seen in a statement by Col. Ernst Borrmann of the East German secret police that "very likely" Western newsmen would be admitted to the trials of arrested men.

Borrmann said that items confiscated from men arrested in East Germany were "clear proof that Poznan was a provocation prepared a long time ago."

Spanish War Vets Select Grants Pass

EUGENE (AP) — Oregon's Spanish War veterans, meeting in Eugene, Tuesday selected Grants Pass as the site of their next year's annual encampment.

The veterans and their auxiliary nominated officers Tuesday and will elect them Wednesday. Among those addressing the veterans was Harry E. Williams, of Portland, a past national commander in chief of the United Spanish War Veterans.

Just under 100 veterans and approximately 130 auxiliary delegates are registered at the convention.

Effort To Halt Power Dam Now In Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court was asked Tuesday to stop the construction of a private power dam in the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake River where a federal dam has been proposed.

Public power groups filed an application asking the Supreme Court to stay a Federal Power Commission order granting a construction license to the Idaho Power Co.

Evelyn Cooper, attorney for the National Hells Canyon Assn. and other groups advocating the federal project, asked the court to hear oral arguments on her application.

She said the Court of Appeals has been asked to reverse the power commission action.

Idaho Power already is building one of the licensed dams, Brownlee, and its completion before the Appeals Court acts and the case reaches the Supreme Court would "threaten to impair the jurisdiction of the court," Mrs. Cooper said.

The FPC and the Court of Appeals both have turned down Mrs. Cooper's request for a stay.

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Governor Of Tennessee To Be Demo Keynote

CHICAGO (AP) — Gov. Frank G. Clement of Tennessee, regarded as friendly to Adlai E. Stevenson, was selected Monday to keynote the Democratic National Convention.

The young governor was named by the party's Convention Arrangements Committee after a three-hour meeting.

Clement, a fiery orator, is considered a possible vice presidential candidate.

At the recent Governors' Conference, he described Stevenson as the "greatest candidate ever to be denied the presidency of the United States."

Sen. Estes Kefauver, a fellow Tennessean, termed the selection an honor for Clement. But, said Kefauver, it in no way would affect his determination to win the nomination. Kefauver and Clement are not considered to be politically close.
