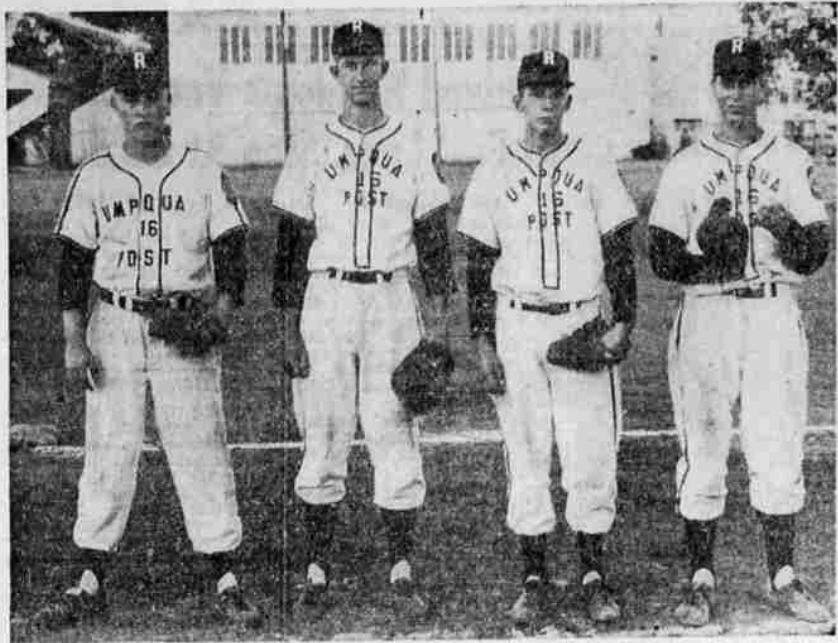

Roseburg's Junior American Legion baseball team hosted the Eugene aggregation to a 8-2 loss in an exhibition contest between the two clubs Thursday night at Finlay Field.

Both clubs are slated to begin state intradistrict league playoffs Saturday. Roseburg will travel to Klamath Falls for an 8 p.m. battle at Gem Stadium against the Southern Oregon champs and Eugene will journey to North Bend against the Coast champions, also at 8.

Thursday's Legion encounter saw the home-town gang pushing across two runs in the first frame for a quick lead. Larry Bissonette singled and Bill Oerding collected his first of four walks for the game.

Cleanup batter Bill Rudzik chased them both home with a liner to right. Rudzik went to third on the play when the right fielder missed the ball, but was unable to score.

Roseburg chased across two additional runs in the fourth with the aid of four walks and Dick Smith's single.

Moore's Cafe added its seventh straight and Umpqua Plywood of Myrtle Creek stayed close behind as both won Industrial League softball tussles Thursday night.

Moore's downed U. S. Plywood 3-1, scoring three runs in the first frame and made them stand up throughout the remainder of the game for the win.

All three runs were scored after the first two batters went down in order. Bill Shapiro walked and scored on Jack Loomis' double to center. Manager Dick Nichols sent Loomis across with a triple to center and scored himself when the outfielder misplayed the ball.

The Plywood nine had men on base in almost every inning, but failed to dent the plate until the fifth when they scored their lone run. Phil Tiltford, up as first batter in the inning, rapped a hard single to left and scored on Claude Curran's double.

They offered another serious threat in the next frame when outfielder Hegele, singled, went to second on a sacrifice and to third on a passed ball. This was as far as he got, however, as Duane Ankerberg set the next two batters down on strikeouts to retire the side.

U. S. Plywood outlived the winners 3-4.

Ankerberg went the distance for Moore's setting nine of the plywood batters down on strikeouts. Bill Borecher hurled for U. S. and was tough all the way with his amazing assortment of "junk" pitches. He scattered two hits over the route, both coming during the first-inning uprising.

Umpqua Plywood of Myrtle Creek won its fifth of the year in the nightcap with a one-sided 11-1 margin over South Stephens Hardware. The game was cut at the end of five innings of play, due to a 7-run lead rule.

Umpqua lost little time in scoring its first run. Leadoff batter Virgil O'Quinn rapped a single to center and Arland Weaver walked. The next two batters went down in order. Then pitcher Luke Ross rapped them both home with a line double to left.

Umpqua added three more in the second and four in the third. O'Quinn capped the four-run uprising with a two-run homer. It was his third consecutive hit for the game.

The final two runs crossed the plate in the fifth on singles by Charlie Brown and John Cavanaugh along with a double by Barney Barnes.

The hardware men scored their lone tally in the initial stanza on singles by Zeke Walton and Bill Whitten.

Luke Ross pitched the win, giving up three hits and striking out eight batters over the five innings.

Ross and O'Quinn were the leading hitters for the game with three hits apiece.

Walton collected two of the losers' three safeties to capture batting honors.

Gov. Knight Backs PCC Dissolution; Prexies Slate Talk

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A suggestion that the Pacific Coast Conference be dissolved and a California conference of UCLA, California, Stanford and Southern California be formed for athletic competition has been made by Gov. Goodwin J. Knight.

The governor made the suggestion in a letter to Ned Cronin, Los Angeles Times sports writer, who wrote him for his opinion about the athletic scandals that brought fines and bans against schools and athletes in the PCC.

"This whole ivory tower business raises the hackles of my red-blooded American neck, and I join with you in the hope we can do something," the chief executive wrote.

"I am wondering if it might not be a good plan to consider the forming of a conference, leaving out the two universities in Washington, the two in Oregon and the one in Idaho."

The governor pointed out that the present day booster clubs have been composed of "all the community leaders with whom the professors fraternize and the community leaders from whom they ask university financial support."

He said he played rugby football at Stanford "and I can assure you that if some prominent alumnus had approached me with an offer of modest assistance in my tuition or expenses I would have assumed that this prominent alumnus was a man of character and standing in the community and that this proposition had the tacit approval of those in authority."

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—The Presidents' Council of the Pacific Coast Conference will meet July 17 to review penalties against four members for illegal overpayments to football players.

Robert Gordon Sproul, president of the PCC and of the University of California, Thursday night called the meeting for San Francisco after a poll of the presidents.

The conference has placed UCLA, USC and Washington on athletic probation and banned them from the Rose Bowl for two or three years. California was fined and placed on probation but Cal was not banned from the Rose Bowl.

Dr. Fred Fagg of USC and Chancellor Raymond B. Allen of UCLA insist the conference code should be revised and the punishments lessened. Fagg called the code unrealistic. Allen labelled it "archaic."

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic Assn. (NCAA), ruling body of the nation's college sports, is officially investigating the current row over payoffs to athletes in the Pacific Coast Conference, it was learned Thursday.

Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt of the PCC told the Oakland Tribune the NCAA had requested and received detailed information on the UCLA and University of Washington cases.

Similar action is expected in the cases of USC and the University of California.

Authoritative sources reported the PCC already had given Schmidt the right to present details of the new cases to the NCAA if requested to do so.

The NCAA, comprising more than 500 of the nation's colleges and universities, can take its own actions in the PCC cases of rules violations.

Glendale Beats Merchants, 8-6

The Glendale Loggers dumped the Roseburg Merchants 8-6 in an exhibition baseball contest played at Glendale Wednesday night.

Paul Smith and Duane Miller combined to hurl the win, scattering eight hits along the way. Left-hander Frank Weber was tagged with the loss, giving up 10 hits.

Glendale scored the first two runs in the second inning on a walk, a triple to right by Jack Snelling and a single by Troy Reynolds.

The Merchants took a 3-2 lead in the top half of the third with a three-run uprising without the aid of a single base hit, utilizing a hit batter, two walks, an error and two fielders' choices.

Roseburg made it 5-3 with single runs in both the fifth and sixth. The third run for Glendale crossed the plate in the fifth, and the Loggers tied the game up in the seventh with a two-run outburst.

Roseburg went ahead once more in the next inning counting a solo run.

The lead was short-lived, however, as Glendale dented the plate with the tying and lead runs during a three-run frame. An error, Ray Munyon's single and Miller's double were the main blows in the uprising.

Glendale is scheduled to play a return game at Finlay Field Friday, July 29.
