The division of highways closed the pass after two hours of heavy downpour had sent Cloudburst Creek, east of the summit, roaring out of its banks and covering State Highway 108 with four feet of water.

Court Martial Set For Naval Officer As Crash Result

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Cmdr. Richard B. Varley Jr., USN, has been ordered to stand trial for a general court martial on charges of "improper hazarding" of a Navy ship.

Varley was the commanding officer of the escort destroyer "Eaton" when the Eaton and the battleship Wisconsin collided at sea May 6. Both ships were damaged extensively but no one was killed.

The court martial trial for Varley was ordered by Adm. Jerauld Wright, commander in chief of the Atlantic fleet, as a result of the findings of a board of investigation "decried" and an inquiry into the circumstances of the collision.

Wright also took these actions: (1) Addressed a letter of reprimand to Capt. Terrell H. W. Connor, USN, commander of Escort Destroyer Division 22, for "improper performance of duty as a unit commander."

(2) Addressed a letter of admonition to Lt. (JG) Peter V. Schoeffel, USN, who was officer of the deck on the Eaton at the time of the collision, for certain alleged "derelictions which contributed to the collision."

(3) Instructed the appropriate unit commanders of the fleet to "correct deficiencies indicated by the investigation."

In naval procedure, letters of censure such as reprimand and admonition are forms of non-judicial punishment.

Hells Canyon Not Ended As Issue, Senator States

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hells Canyon will be a political issue in the Pacific Northwest during the election campaign and for many elections to come, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Saturday.

Neuberger pointed out in a statement that only two Republicans voted for a bill to authorize a federal dam in the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake River along the Idaho-Oregon border. The Senate rejected the measure Thursday, 51-41.

He said also that "all 11 Republican senators from the Far West" voted against the bill and debaters called attention to opposition from the Republican governors of the three Pacific Northwest states.

"I will not venture predictions," Neuberger said, "all I will say is this—if the people of the Northwest still favor undertakings like Bonneville and Grand Coulee they will have an opportunity for many elections to choose clearly at the polls between friends and enemies."

The compact, in effect, would set up a five-state alliance in the Northwest to recommend on developments along the Columbia River and its tributaries.
