Canyonville Man Is Bound Over To Grand Jury

Canyonville truck driver Wayne Simpson, 46, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, was held to answer to the grand jury following his preliminary hearing in South Douglas District Court. He was lodged in Douglas County Jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail.

Simpson is charged specifically with shooting at Sandra and Stephen Kinney and their two dogs on June 25 by complainant Lucille Kinney. He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Nina Pietzold June 28 in the Canyonville court. At that time Simpson requested a preliminary hearing. He was placed in the county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail.

At his preliminary hearing, Simpson denied the charge of assault with a deadly weapon. In a written statement, he said his gun went off accidentally.

Simpson said "two of the shots like to hit my own foot." He said he apologized to the mother of the Kinney children for the incident.

He said he had gone to the Kinney residence to see if he could sell his 22 rifle. He said he had not been drinking.

Government Ends Allocation Of Polio Vaccine

WASHINGTON — The government Wednesday ended federal allocation of Salk polio vaccine to the states and territories.

Secretary of Welfare Folsom announced this was done "so that more vaccine will be available to areas where the demand is greatest."

Folsom added that the move was taken upon recommendation of Dr. Leonard A. Scheele, who would up his work as surgeon general of the Public Health Service Tuesday.

Scheele reported that the supply is more plentiful, and noted that last month turned back vaccine previously allotted them.

Seven of those states waived their rights to allotments available to them on July 24.

Allocations can be reinstated, he said, if circumstances change.

Scheele gave a new estimate that the states have 40 million children and expectant mothers have received at least one vaccine injection, with many having received two or three.

Dropping of allocations does not affect the recommended priority groups, Scheele said. He said the National Advisory Committee strongly urges concentration on vaccinating children under 20 and expectant mothers until maximum coverage has been achieved in that group.

Northwest Steel Rolling Mills' Workers Strike

SEATTLE — Employees of the Northwest Steel Rolling Mills in Seattle went on strike at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday after failure to reach agreement with the company management over a number of issues.

The walkout affects approximately 180 employees. The union membership voted 143-12 in a night meeting to strike. The company has refused to accept the national wage pattern negotiated in last week's settlement of a nationwide steel strike.

In addition, union officials said there were other local issues yet to be resolved.

Meanwhile, Bethlehem Pacific Coast Steel Corp. was preparing to reopen under terms of the national strike settlement. A few workers are expected to be recalled this week and the majority of its 1,800 employees before the end of next week.

Man Completes Niagara Whirlpool In 2 1/2 Hours

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. — Mayor Lloyd Holt shot the 2 1/2-mile-long whirlpool rapids of the lower Niagara River in a steel barrel Monday night and said he had spun around in the whirlpool itself for 2 1/2 hours.

The 37-year-old riverman had made three previous trips through part or all of the rapids, which extend for about six miles below Niagara Falls.

This time he used the same barrel he used for a rapids ride in 1954. He said the water-tight barrel finally drifted out of the whirlpool and he was able to climb out and tow it ashore.

Request Of Gold Beach Man For Quick Justice Granted

Justice moved swiftly this week when a Gold Beach man told Curry County Dist. Atty. Sam Hall he wished to waive all rights and enter a guilty plea to a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Hall checked with circuit Judge Dal King of Coquille to request an arraignment and learned the judge was on vacation. Hall then contacted Judge Charles Woodrich in Roseburg and asked for an arraignment in Roseburg Tuesday.

This was possible since both counties are in the same judicial district.

Tuesday, William Andrew Linzy, 37, appeared before the Roseburg judge. He was accompanied by Deputy Dist. Attorney David R. Fortner.

Linzy admitted drawing a pocket knife on Allen Scherer of Roseburg, a special deputy sheriff of Douglas County temporarily employed in Gold Beach by United States Plywood Corp. According to Sheriff G. C. Sabin of Curry County, Linzy called Scherer across a Gold Beach street the night of July 22, then drew a knife.

Linzy, who has served two previous prison terms in Mississippi and California, told the judge he seeks help for an alcoholic problem. He said he apparently "blacks out" and loses control. He said the Curry incident was similar to those in the other states.

A sober-faced man, the ex-convict really caused trouble in Gold Beach and by Police Officer James Bolton and Deputy Sheriff Linzy apparently went berserk. He pulled a basin from the jail wall and smashed out glass windows. As authorities attempted to quell the disturbance, Linzy broke out the jail door and raced into the street, the sheriff said.

He was controlled by tear gas. His eyes injured by the gas, Linzy went to Curry General Hospital.

He came from the hospital Tuesday for the courtroom appearance.

Asked if he had anything to tell the court before sentence was imposed, Linzy replied at length.

He pleaded for "some type of help for an alcoholic problem." Stating he was "not a drunkard," Linzy said a few drinks (four or five) caused him to pass out. He said incarceration alone didn't seem to help, harking back to the prison terms in Mississippi and California.

He said he was worried because the attacks seem to come more frequently.

Judge Woodrich, listening calmly throughout the commentary, later told Linzy the court had a two-fold function: To protect society and to help "you rehabilitate yourself . . . for a life in society."

In imposing a five-year prison term for Linzy in Oregon State Penitentiary, the judge said he would also request psychiatric help for him from the Oregon State Hospital.

"An alcoholic problem is often the manifestation of a psychological problem," Judge Woodrich observed.

Money Allotted To States For Highway Work

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Commerce Weeks Wednesday allotted \$2,550,000,000 to the states to speed construction of first sections of the new 41,000 mile road network.

The money, for the fiscal year beginning next July 1, is the largest amount ever provided for roads at one time in history.

This second division of funds for the new road building plan brings to \$3,675,000,000 already set aside for the states.

Immediately after President Eisenhower signed the federal highway legislation June 29, Weeks moved to provide \$1,125,000,000 to the states for the current fiscal year which began July 1.

He said at the time that he expected the first construction to get underway within three months and that the program should be rolling by Jan. 1.

The federal aid road program calls for a spending of about 33 billion dollars in the next 13 to 15 years. The bulk of the funds provided by Congress will go for the secondary roads. Under the new apportionment for the 1958 fiscal year, Weeks set up \$1,700,000,000 to help build interstate roads and 850 million to the federal share toward improving state feeder roads.

Weeks said the new apportionment is being made now to carry out the intent of Congress to push the federal highway program with maximum possible speed.

Amounts apportioned to each state for the 1958 fiscal year include: Idaho \$25,506,734; Oregon, \$25,741,796; and Washington, \$41,126,176.

FLOOD DAMAGE HIGH
SALEM — The July 13 flash flood at Mitchell caused \$226,000 damage to public property, Gov. Elmo Smith reported Tuesday in asking the federal government for that amount.

The loss includes \$400,000 in damage to the John Day Highway, \$115,000 in damage to county roads, and \$11,000 to a bridge and water facilities in Mitchell.

Restrictions Lifted From Salvage Timber

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timber in the South Coast Marketing Area.

Judge Hill pointed out that now both Lane County and Douglas County lumbermen will be able to bid on BLM sales of salvage in the area. He said it will benefit particularly lumbering in northern Douglas County, much of which is included in the Douglas Marketing Area, the central Douglas County area.

Hill said the BLM plans to go ahead with construction of a link road between the Twin Sisters Road and the end of Gunter Road, thus giving northern Douglas County lumbermen an even greater advantage. He said the benefits would accrue particularly to Drain, Yoncalla and Oakland, which previously have not been able to bid on timber which might be closer and more accessible than timber to which it was restricted in the central Douglas County area. Hill said the link road would stretch between three and 3 1/2 miles for the connection.

Marketing area regulations were established in 1947. They required that wood manufacturers initially process timber in the marketing areas in which they are located.

Officials of the BLM said increased recovery of salvage timber would not materially affect the quantity of green timber that may be cut.

Judge Hill pointed out that a minimum of green timber would have to be cut in the salvage operations because of intermingling of salvage and green trees. He said this is necessary for economic feasibility, but would be kept to a minimum.

Long Humiliated By Opponents' Win In Election

NEW ORLEANS — Two Louisiana congressmen threw the state's politics into a spin today after humiliating Gov. Earl Long with smashing victories in their bids for renomination in the Democratic primary election.

Rep. T. A. Thompson defeated three Long-backed candidates in the 77th Congressional District Race and Rep. Otto Passman won over two Long-supported candidates in the 8th.

Victory in yesterday's balloting amounted to election in this state. Long was not available for comment on the outcome.

Four other representatives won renomination in two-way races. Two representatives and Sen. Russell Long were unopposed.

Interest was centered on the Thompson and Passman races, in which Long took a personal hand. There was little state interest in the other races.

Long's political prestige also took a beating in New Orleans and in the 8th Dist. Long's home district.

Long-backed candidates for judgeships were roundly defeated in New Orleans and Long's sister Mrs. Clara Long Knott of Many, trailer Alexandria Atty. Harold McSwain in the 8th Dist. Board of Education race.

Thompson's explanation was that the results showed the people's resentment.

Burma Presses For Withdrawal Of Communists

RANGOON, Burma — Burma today pressed Communist China to withdraw Red troops which military sources say have occupied about 1,000 square miles of Burmese territory.

There were no reports of new advances. Clashes with Burmese forces and some casualties were said to have occurred when the Chinese units moved up to 60 miles at various points into Burma's northern territory.

A government spokesman said Burma was "seriously concerned" about the moves along the north-east border and had brought the situation to the attention of the Foreign Office.

"Negotiations are now in progress with a view to the withdrawal of these Chinese troops to the Chinese side of the border," a Foreign Office statement said.

There was no accurate count of the strength of the Chinese force, but estimates here put the total at not less than 300 troops.

Some Aluminum Plants Struck, Others Wait

NEW YORK — One union started a strike against the nation's two biggest aluminum producers today. A second union held off another threatened walkout against the same two giant firms.

The United Steelworkers of America called a strike of 28,000 workers at Aluminum Co. of America (Alcoa) and Reynolds Metals Co. plants across the nation. The walkout began shortly after midnight in a wage contract dispute.

Meanwhile, the Aluminum Workers International Union extended its strike deadline 24 hours — until midnight tonight. The union officially kept its 20,500 members on the job at other Alcoa and Reynolds plants.

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news conference on June 6. But he replied to a barrage of questions during a 30-minute session in a sure voice and seemed to be in a confident mood.

The news conference drew 311 newsmen, tying a record set on Feb. 29 when Eisenhower announced for a second term.

Many of the questions dealt with the state of the President's health.

With a somewhat wry smile, Eisenhower said he had what he termed a pretty rough ride during the days immediately after his June 9 operation.

The President went on to say that from the day of the operation he has continued to improve daily.

He said however, that his physicians had told him it would be four months before he was fully recovered.

Eisenhower's physicians gave him a new physical examination Wednesday morning and the White House doctor reported him "in fine shape."

Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, the President's personal doctor, told newsmen that so far as the forthcoming presidential campaign is concerned "Eisenhower will be able to do as much as he would have without this attack" of ileitis.

The President's comment on other subjects included:

The great problem now, he said, is to make sure that the Suez is preserved as an international waterway. Doing that, he added, is vital to the U.S. economy and world peace.

Congress—the record of the 84th Congress, which adjourned last Friday, leaves him with mixed emotions. He said he is not completely satisfied about the record of Congress.

Registration Proposed For All Sex Offenders

BEND — Proposed registration of sex offenders in Oregon received general approval at a hearing of a legislative interim committee here Tuesday.

The hearing was one of a series being held by the special Interim Committee on Sex Crimes Prevention, headed by Sen. Carl H. Francis, Dayton.

Under consideration was a recommendation for legislation which would require the reporting to a central state agency of all felonies and certain sex offenses. Such an agency would be patterned after that now functioning in California.

Several local school officials and law enforcement officers appeared as witnesses before the group here.

The committee was in Klamath Falls Wednesday for its final meeting. It will make a report to the 1957 Legislature.

Gov. Faubus Victorious In Arkansas' Primary

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Gov. Orval Faubus sailed toward a second term today, the easy victor over four opponents in Arkansas' Democratic primary.

The governor took the lead with the first trickle of returns and never relinquished it.

Defeating his major opponents — Jim Johnson and Jim Snoddy — without a runoff struggle, Faubus broke tradition for the second time in his comparatively brief career of seeking statewide office.

Actor Weakness Lessens Drama Of 'Country Girl'

The weakness of one character spoiled the presentation of Clifford Odets' "The Country Girl" here Tuesday night in the Kiwanis Summer Theater series.

Paul Ward's attempt to portray the intense director of the theatrical drama came off more as a portrayal of an angry little boy in comparison with the quiet, efficient work of the other two leading actors.

The play, which was a successful 1954 movie, deals with an alcoholic actor who stages a successful comeback because the young director and his wife believe in him.

Ward's portrayal was more "over acting" than anything. Leroy Owen and Sally Call, as the actor and his wife, gave their characters just the right touch of frustration and bitterness.

Backing the three lead players was an assorted crew of minor people who ran in and out. Most outstanding of these was Judith Hawley, as cute Nancy Stoddard, an ingenue just beginning her Broadway career.

Starting slowly, the play built to its climax. The rather long first act (five scenes) had the audience somewhat restless, but this was forgotten in the final three scenes, which overshadowed all that went before.

The Daniel Krempel — directed show used a minimum of scenery and props to lend a somber note to the story of drabness.
