Grievance List Against Union Pacific Talked

PORTLAND — A long list of grievances was being discussed here Tuesday by representatives of the Union Pacific Railroad and the Order of Railroad Conductors and Brakemen.

Robert O. Boyd of the National Mediation Board said it looked as though the talks would go on "for a few days." Asked if any progress was made Monday in the opening session he said only that disputed points "are still in mediation."

Boyd said interpretation of rules covering the railroad's Northwest division is at issue. Many of them are complicated, he said, and the railroad and the union have different opinions of what they say. The Northwest district chiefly embraces Union Pacific's routes in the Ogden-Butte-Huntington, Ore. area.

Boyd came here Sunday from Seattle where he had aided in settlement of the West Coast Airlines contract dispute.

Mass Refugees' Flight Blamed On Bureaucracy

BERLIN — The chief of the East German Communist Party said Wednesday "cold-blooded bureaucracy" and abuses of justice have prompted the mass flight of refugees from East Germany to the West.

Party boss Walter Ulbricht called for improvement of conditions in the Soviet zone of Germany in a speech to his party's Central Committee. It was printed in the official Communist organ Neues Deutschland.

In line with the current campaign in the Soviet satellites to ally public unrest, Ulbricht said conditions should be bettered to attract "youths, members of the intelligentsia and skilled laborers" to East Germany.

Ulbricht also reported 80 East German Communists blacklisted by the party during the Stalin era have been cleared in a review of past injustices.

In Prague, the Czechoslovak Parliament gave the Communist government a unanimous vote of confidence.

Though the debate on government policy was a novelty in recent history of the satellite nation, the outcome was as expected.

The parliamentary debate and other new tokens of softening of iron rule in other Communist nations were viewed in Vienna as efforts to prevent more workers' bread-and-freedom uprisings such as occurred in Poznan, Poland, June 28.

In Budapest, Hungary's chief prosecutor acknowledged that thousands had been executed or imprisoned unjustly but promised a better future.

PERMANENTLY DISBARRED
SALEM — Walter S. Lamkin, Salem lawyer who was sentenced to five years in prison for converting funds of estates to his own use, was permanently disbarred Tuesday by the Oregon Supreme Court.

COMPLETES TRAINING

Shoulders May Win \$50,000 In One Year

DENVER — A Rodeo Cowboys' Assn. official said Wednesday Jim Shoulders of Henryetta, Okla., may become the first rodeo performer ever to win \$50,000 in one year.

Shoulders is far in front for all-around cowboy honors with 24,121 points, each representing a dollar earned in R.C.A. approved rodeos. He leads Guy Weeks, Abilene, Tex., by 8,360.

Shoulders also leads in bareback bronc riding with 10,549 points and in bullriding with 13,572. Other division leaders are: Saddle bronc, Deb Copenhagen, Post Falls, Idaho, 9,975; calf roping, Ray Wharton, Bandera, Tex., 12,286; steer wrestling, Harley May, Deming, N.M., 9,638.
