

Integration Will Be Gradual, Archbishop Says

MINTREAT, N.C. (AP) — Vice President Nixon told three North Carolina religious groups Saturday that a "moderate approach" is the only one which will work in integrating the schools.

He said he knew "dedicated men" are striving toward a solution, and declared that "the Supreme Court has wisely given time to implement its 1954 solution."

The vice president declared that the law without "the will of the people to obey it" is not enough, and "political demagoguery will aggravate, not solve the problem."

Nixon delivered essentially the same speech at three religious assemblies: the Southern Baptist Home Missions Conference at Ridgecrest, a Presbyterian Synod and an open house to the public at the Methodist Assembly Grounds in Lake Junaluska.

An estimated 5,000 persons heard him at each.

Nixon avoided politics over the weekend, both on the speaker's platform and before reporters.

Ideals Lost Sight Of

In his address, the vice president declared that "bitterness and tension are mounting by the hour" on the race relations scene.

He said "fundamental religious and moral ideals are being lost sight of... the ideals of the basic dignity of all men, our equal rights, our brotherhood under the fatherhood of God."

"If these ideals were fully accepted," said Nixon, "there would be much less bitterness over the means to realize them."

"The churches," he advised, can help create the climate of understanding and good will which is essential for the implementation of the law of the land."

In the areas of labor relations and international politics, Nixon called again for the churches to exert their influence toward clarifying public attitudes.

Understanding Needed

Acknowledging that the government's way of handling labor-management troubles is only "imperfect," Nixon said:

"Our country would benefit enormously if understanding could replace resentment and if partnership and cooperation rather than armed force were the order of the day."

On the international scene, the vice president said the churches can help clarify the beliefs of those who think the Cold War is simply "a struggle for power and world domination."

He noted "a vital difference between political neutrality and moral neutrality in the present conflict of ideas."

Nixon was introduced at each of his appearances by evangelist Billy Graham, who makes his home here.

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Suez Crisis Not Linked With U. S. Fleet's Sailing

NAPLES, Italy (AP) — Warships of the power U.S. 6th Fleet put to sea Monday from six Italian ports which Navy officials said were scheduled six weeks ago.

Italian newspapers ran front page speculation that the sailings were connected with the Suez crisis.

"There just is not one word of truth in it," a Navy spokesman said. "The redeployment schedule has not changed in any way since it was made six weeks ago. We informed the Italian government that the ships would be sailing a month ago. The 6th Fleet does this all through the year, shifting from port to port in the Mediterranean. It is coincidence, pure and simple."

Ships put out from Naples, Genoa, Leghorn, Venice, Rapallo and Santa Margherita.

From Naples, the aircraft carrier Randolph sailed with two attack transports, one landing ship, one light transport, four destroyers and one fleet tanker. From Genoa went the carrier Intrepid, with two destroyers, two submarines, one command ship, two attack transports and one fleet oiler. From Leghorn, four destroyers, one destroyer tender and one landing ship tanks put out into the Mediterranean. The heavy cruiser Salem sailed from Venice, carrying the flag of Vice Adm. Charles Randall Brown, who took over 6th Fleet command last Saturday. Two destroyers sailed from Rapallo and two more from Santa Margherita.

Normally after putting out, the fleet has a rendezvous at sea and begins training operations.

Earlier, Navy spokesmen denied any special form of alert has been given the fleet. On several occasions they have said the fleet remains on an alert status at all times.

Mossadegh Free From Iran Prison

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Dr. Mohammad Mossadegh, former premier of Iran, walked out of jail Saturday, a free man after three years of solitary confinement. He was sentenced on charges of attempting to overthrow the Shah in 1953.

A few members of Mossadegh's family went to the prison—Ghasar Barracks, in northern Tehran—to meet him. His son helped him into a car. Members of the family have indicated the former premier intends to spend the early days of his freedom visiting holy places in Iran.

Mossadegh, a weedy old ex-dictator, was the Nationalist leader in a bitter fight similar to that in which President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt finds himself involved over the Suez Canal.

Mossadegh's fight was to nationalize the billion-dollar British-owned Anglo-Iranian Oil Co., which for 50 years had built up one of the Middle East's biggest enterprises under a concession from the Iranian government.

There was no question of seizing an international facility such as the Suez crisis.

Skill, Daring Awards Given At White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Decorations for "skill and daring" were awarded in time of peace to airmen at a White House ceremony Thursday to 30 Army and Air Force pilots who recovered bodies and wreckage after the June 30 Grand Canyon airliner disaster.

The collision of a United Air Lines DC7 plane and a Trans World Airlines Constellation took 128 lives, the worst commercial airliner disaster in U.S. history.

SNAG FIRE SQUELCHED

A small lightning-caused fire in a single snag was extinguished in the Diamond Lake Ranger District of the Umpqua National Forest Saturday before it could spread.

Forest Service Fire Control Officer Ray Hampton reported a lightning storm which struck in the Diamond Lake area Sunday failed to start any fires.

Twelve Lives Lost In Eastern Storms

In 50 years, The Red Cross set up emergency shelters for evacuated families in Carnegie, 10 miles from Pittsburgh.

In other developments, a series of storms had left much destruction in Northern Ohio—knocking down many trees and electric wires in Cleveland, Akron, Canton and other cities.

Cleveland had power failure for nearly 15 hours in parts of the city. Lightning set off a fire that destroyed a women's apparel plant employing 35 persons, near Ceneaut, Ohio.

A man and his daughter were electrocuted 10 miles southeast of Youngstown. No casualties were reported from small tornadoes that tore through a wooded area two miles north of Youngstown. But, the accompanying wind caused heavy property damage in the Youngstown-Warren area.

Clarksburg, Morgantown and Salem were the hardest hit cities in West Virginia. More than 4½ inches of rain fell on Morgantown in two weekend installments. City Manager Elmer Prince estimated damage in the area at "hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Between 75 and 100 families were forced from their homes after a nearly 2½-inch rainfall at Clarksburg. Main Street in Salem was partly flooded, but the high water was reported receding.

Detroit area basements were flooded and widespread damage was caused by a weekend rainfall of nearly 4 inches.

Wife Sets Home Afire After Spat With Mate

BALTIMORE (AP) — Police charged 45-year-old Mrs. Mary E. Love with arson after she told them she had set her apartment afire so her husband "wouldn't have a house to come home to" after a quarrel. Firefighters had been called to her address to put out a blaze in a mattress that had burned and damaged a room.

McKeon Appeals Penalty Imposed For Death March

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — Sgt. Matthew C. McKeon today pinned his hopes on Navy Secy. Charles Thomas to remove his bad conduct discharge for leading a Marine death march, and restore him to the corps.

If not reduced by the secretary, an appeal is still possible of his sentence of nine months at hard labor, reduction to private, a fine of \$30 a month during imprisonment, and then a bad conduct discharge.

The 31-year-old career Marine from Worcester, Mass., whose wife is expecting their third child momentarily, was jailed and tear-stricken when a court-martial board of six Marine officers and a Navy doctor decided on his sentence Saturday, a day after it had found him guilty of drinking on duty and negligent homicide. Negligent homicide was defined by the court as "absence of due care by one responsible for the safety of others."

The court-martial board cleared him of charges of manslaughter, oppression of recruits, and drinking in the presence of a recruit. These charges could have sent him to prison for six years — double the maximum he faced after the verdict.

The automatic review by the Navy secretary, and the appeal, if any, may take months.

Until then, McKeon will not be imprisoned or stripped of rank.

He has been assigned as an enlisted sailor to the Roman Catholic chapel on the base, the Rev. Maurus Cook.
