New Fire Siren Installed In Riddle; Four Calls Answered

The city of Riddle installed a new five-horsepower fire siren during the past week to replace the old siren of only a fraction of one horsepower. The fire department has responded to four calls since its installation. The first came the same day when an abandoned shed burned across the road from the Lester Applegate home. A chimney fire at the E. R. Alexander home caused minor roof damage on Friday. Saturday the fire truck was called to put out a grass fire along the Cornut road reportedly caused by sparks from the slab fire at the Pacific Lumber Distributors plant. The most damaging blaze occurred shortly before noon Sunday when a grass fire near the Patrick mill burner ignited the W. D. McKay hay field. Fire Chief Don Holcomb estimated that approximately half of the baled hay in the field was burned or damaged before the fire was controlled.

Street Oiling Completed

Work of oiling the dirt streets in Riddle was completed last week by the Grant Pass Fuel Oil company. The oiling was followed by sanding done by Jim Carrell.

This week the Colorado Fuel and Iron Works completed the chain link fence around the sewage disposal plant.

Don Martin of Myrtle Creek, retained by the city as engineer, is now drawing up plans for a filter basin to be installed at the intake of the water system before the fall rains, according to Richard Baize, city superintendent. This should insure clear water during the winter months.

WASHINGTON (R)—Secretary of Labor Mitchell says administration policy and a "growing maturity" of unions and management have created "the greatest era of industrial peace, outside of war, that we have ever had in this country."

Speaking on a filmed television interview, Mitchell gave major weight to "the government policy of resting on the ability of management and labor to settle their own differences."

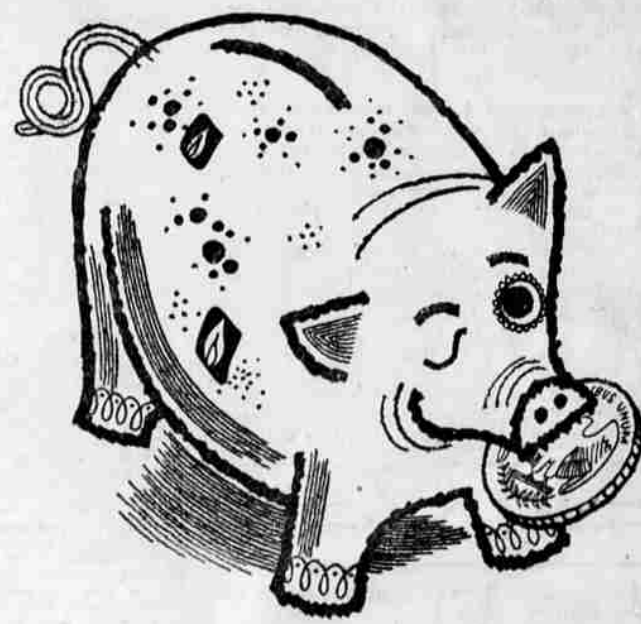
He said he foresees no industrial unrest of the type which shut down the steel industry last month, adding: "I think for the rest of the year we will have a period of industrial peace."



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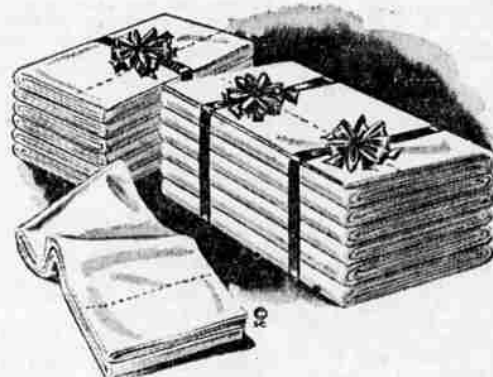
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
