

Mysterious Lights Seen By Residents

Mysterious colored lights were sighted by Roseburg residents and their existence was corroborated by a state policeman Monday night.

The lights were sighted around the KPIC television tower on Rose Mountain.

State police were informed by a call Monday night that "funny" green and red lights were moving slowly around the tower. The officer on duty at the police station said he looked and spotted three of the lights. He claimed they were even changing colors as they moved around the tower.

One local amateur "astronomer" said he thought the lights may have been falling meteors. He said that from now until the middle of August, the meteor season will be at its height in the Northwest.

Task Of Picking Brink's Robbery Jury Continues

BOSTON — The task of picking a jury of 12 members and two alternates gets under way today in the Superior Court trial of Edward J. Brink, charged with the \$125,211 robbery.

The jury will be selected from an unprecedented long list of 2,000 men and women, to be summoned at the rate of 100 a day.

The selection of a jury was ordered by Judge Felix Forte after the first day of trial yesterday was taken up completely with arguments on defense motions and a charge by the defense that the government had engaged in a "shabby form of jury-fixing."

Paul T. Smith, who heads a battery of four defense attorneys, charged that the release of some news stories on the Brink's case precluded the possibility of a fair and impartial trial.

He charged that the "prejudicial" news stories were released by government officials, none of whom he named specifically.

One such story, Smith said, even went so far as to say that a prospective witness had been slain to keep him from testifying — "accusing the defendants not only of robbery but of murder."

U. S. Steel Hikes Price \$8.50 Per Ton Today

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declared the price increase amounts to "about 6.25 per cent." This, he said, "reflects the persistently rising costs with which the company is confronted."

Under the new contract the workers got a package boost variously estimated at from 45 to 55 cents an hour over the 36-month period. Of this, some 20 cents — including 10.5 cents an hour in wages — was effective immediately. Additional direct wage hikes of 9.1 cents are effective July 1, 1957, and July 1, 1958. Under the old contract the workers averaged \$2.46 an hour. The new contract, with 33 hourly pay classifications, has a basic minimum wage of \$1.82 an hour and a maximum of \$3.71.

But will be a determining factor in any price adjustments. It is possible some steel fabricators will absorb part of the increased cost of steel.

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brought the bat because he was outnumbered.

Witnesses disagreed on whether Soper had actually swung the bat at Hamlin. But all agreed that Hamlin had struck Soper, knocking him unconscious. He allegedly continued to beat him after he hit the ground. Hamlin said Soper had also struck back.

When the car they were in had stopped because of the bat-swinging Soper, both Hamlin and Stafford had jumped from the car. Soper's daughter, Mary, testified that Stafford had also laid hands on Soper. But at the distance she was from the scene of action, Woodruff said "reasonable doubt" existed. He found Stafford innocent.

In summing up, Judge Woodruff quipped that it wasn't often he was called on to find a man "armed with a baseball bat" a victim of assault and battery. He chided Soper for arming himself thusly. But he continued, although it is legal to meet "force with force" when threatened, a man is "entitled to use only what force is necessary" to defend himself. Woodruff said Hamlin had used more than necessary violence.

Soper was hospitalized two days as a result of the altercation.

Meanwhile, another assault and battery charge was resolved when Jesse Brown of Roseburg failed to appear for trial scheduled Monday. He forfeited \$25 bail.

Brown was accused by Ernest M. Kolberg of beating him on July 22. Last week, bail was reduced from \$100 to \$25 on the order of Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults.

Reforestation Plan Approved

PORTLAND — A plan for spending one million dollars for reforestation of O&C lands in 18 Western Oregon counties will be presented at a general membership meeting of O&C land grant counties at Eugene Sept. 28.

The O&C executive committee approved the plan at a meeting here Monday. Money for the project would come from receipts from timber sales which have been allocated over the past five years for access road construction.

The counties receive 75 per cent of the sales receipts and the federal government gets the rest. Earlier the counties agreed that a third of their share should be used for access roads.

Guy Cordon, former U. S. senator from Oregon and now the O&C counties' legal representative in Washington, D. C., will attend the Eugene meeting and will discuss legislation in the next Congress that may affect the O&C counties.

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withdrawal cannot be handled as an "isolated" matter. On the broader disarmament proposal Eisenhower said Russia's announced cut of 1,200,000 men in its armed forces merely follows cuts the West has already made since World War II. And he said he doubts that action by individual countries, on the Bulgarian plan, would do much to eliminate the fear and costs generated by great armaments.

Eisenhower said "we welcome" Soviet efforts to wipe out "some of the evils" Stalin imposed within Russia during his rule. But, he stressed, these "evils" were also evident in Stalin's foreign policy.

Eisenhower put on new pressure for agreement to his earlier proposal of a freeze on atomic arms, and sounded a new appeal for reconsideration of the Soviet rejection of his "open skies" aerial reconnaissance proposal.

Eisenhower said he welcomed Russia's move in reducing manpower but that it merely followed earlier moves by this country to "steadily reduce" the size of its armed forces.

"I doubt that such reduction of this particular kind as our governments may make in their respective national interests will contribute effectively to eliminate the fear, and the vast cost, generated by national armaments," Eisenhower wrote.

Eisenhower's letter was delivered at noon in Moscow by Ambassador Charles Bohlen, who personally handed it to the Soviet Premier.

Governor Orders Leg Break Probe, After New Ties

ATLANTA — Gov. Marvin Griffin has ordered a new and complete investigation into the series of leg amputations by Rock Quarry Prison convicts, who charge they have been ill treated by the guards.

The governor acted yesterday after a fresh outbreak of leg amputations and a statement by an admittedly "disgruntled" guard that he had witnessed beatings, kickings, cuffs and cursing.

Warden Hubert Smith said there was "not a word of truth" in what the guard said.

The prison for incorrigibles at Buford is about 40 miles northeast of Atlanta.

The latest bone-crushing incident occurred Sunday night at the Georgia State Prison Hospital in Reidsville, where 41 convicts were taken for treatment after they tried to shatter their legs with 20-pound hammers at Rock Quarry Prison.

Seven men whose legs were not shattered in two sieges of mutilation at Buford tried again. Director Jack Forrester of the State Department of Corrections said two succeeded.

Cause Of Chemical Plant Blast Probed

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. — Investigators Tuesday sought the cause of a million dollar explosion at the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp. plant Monday that killed three men and injured 17.

Company officials said the blast wrecked three buildings where an insecticide was manufactured and damaged six others.

The three dead were Herman C. Holtz; John Maule Jr., 34, of Niagara Falls; and Francis Kramarik, 22, of North Tonawanda.

Twelve of the injured were admitted to hospital.

A company spokesman estimated the damage to buildings and equipment at one million dollars.

He said the explosion, which came shortly after noon, was in a building near an area where classified government work was being done, but that no buildings in the restricted area were damaged.

SEATTLE — A group of helicopter-borne engineers from the United States Geological Survey will attempt Wednesday to answer a question raised occasionally ever since 1913:

Exactly how high is Mt. Rainier?

The last official measurement in 1913 reported the snow-topped landmark was 14,408 feet high. In the past 43 years, others have claimed the mountain is 50 to 60 feet higher than originally estimated.

Cleanup Started In Pennsylvania

PITTSBURGH — A big cleanup job was in full swing Tuesday throughout flood-ravaged and storm-damaged southwestern Pennsylvania.

With the Red Cross lending aid to stricken families, police were checking to determine if there are any additional casualties.

At Fayette City, about 30 miles south of Pittsburgh, volunteers dragged Johnson Hollow Creek seeking the bodies of a family of three who may have drowned.

Feared victims of the Sunday night storm were James Pascarella, 22, his 19-year-old wife and their 3-month-old son.

Pascarella's auto was found Monday. He had telephoned relatives in Monaca, that he was taking his wife and child to them as flood waters rose rapidly around his home near Fayette City.

Most streams were receding rapidly. The Ohio River crested Monday night at 24.9 feet in Pittsburgh. Flood stage is 25 feet.

Telephone and electric service was about back to normal in most sections. Thousands of lines were torn down and many highways and streets were damaged.

Army Colonel Dismissed By Court-martial

FT. DEVENS, Mass. — An Army general court-martial sentenced Col. Walter C. Heinel, 54, to dismissal from the service and forfeiture of all pay and allowances Tuesday.

He was convicted of eight counts of conduct unbecoming an officer by accepting free services at the Army base in Boston which he commanded, and with attempting to induce a married woman to leave her husband.

The sentence will not take effect until it has been reviewed. Army officials said it will take "months" to complete the procedure at Devens, First Army Headquarters and in Washington.

Col. Heinel wept as he went back to his seat following sentencing.

The colonel, who entered the service at the age of 40, had only six months to go before he would have qualified for a pension. He had previous service before his current term in the Army.

Heinel, a native of Chicago, was found guilty Monday after the eight-member court-martial board deliberated nearly nine hours.

Log Truck Demolished On White Tail Mountain

A loaded logging truck belonging to Eldon Crow was demolished Monday on White Tail Mountain, 11 miles west of Roseburg, according to correspondent Mrs. Arthur Marsh.

Brake failure coming down a hill was given as the cause of the accident by Mrs. Marsh. The driver, Eldon Crow, escaped injury by jumping from the vehicle before it ran into a stump at the side of the road. The trailer was not badly damaged, according to Mrs. Marsh, who said that insurance on the new truck had expired Aug. 1.

Another Vote On Livestock District Asked

A petition containing 10 names was filed with Douglas County Clerk Charles Doerner today requesting that part of a recently formed livestock district be dissolved.

The East Myrtle Livestock Control District was formed through approval of voters on May 18, but the petitioners call for another vote on the day of the general election calling for withdrawal of most of the eastern portion of the district from livestock control. The district is comprised of the entire East Myrtle voting precinct.

If the request in the petition is approved, livestock in that eastern part of East Myrtle Precinct will be allowed again to run at large. According to law, it is only necessary to have six legal voters sign the petition in the precinct.
