

Show Business Day In Court Occupies Time Of Judges

LOS ANGELES (AP)—It was show business day in court as the divorce of actress Jeanne Crain and actor Edward G. Robinson was argued yesterday. The case was argued by Robinson's attorney, Arthur Barker, and Crain's attorney, Arthur Barker.

Another Robinson, Edward G. Jr., 24, appeared in another courtroom adjoining his mother's and pleaded innocent to a felony drunk driving charge.

Miss King, 25, charging cruelty, asked to end her shaky marriage to trumpet player Knobby Lee, 28, whose true name is Norbert Ladrach. They had separated several times since their marriage here Feb. 2, 1953.

Miss Crain, 30, distraught and fighting to retain custody, said her husband, manufacturer Paul Brinkman, 37, displayed hostility toward her mother. She said Brinkman also dragged her by the hair from a Beverly Hills restaurant last January.

Brinkman did not attend the hearing and his attorney withdrew a cross complaint.

Attorneys said the Brinkman financial settlement will provide for equal division of \$500,000 in community property. She waived alimony but will receive \$300 a month support for their four children, Paul Jr., 9; Michael, 7; Timothy, 6 and Jeanine, 4.

Corvallis Man Dies At Home Of Daughter

Lyn A. Brown, 64, of Corvallis died Monday morning at the home of his daughter Mrs. W. R. (Betty) Wright in Garden Valley where he was visiting.

Surviving are his wife, Gertrude Brown, a son, Lyn Brown Jr., and Mrs. W. R. Wright.

The body has been removed to the Chapel of the Roses. Funeral services will be announced later.

Governor Confirms Three Death Sentences

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—Gov. Sir John Harding today confirmed the death sentences of three Greek Cypriot extremists—the final legal step before they go to the gallows.

A ban on traffic was imposed in this capital city, setting off rumors the executions would be held shortly.

A similar ban accompanied the execution in May of the only two men hung thus far in the clampdown by British authorities on terrorists fighting for union with Greece.

Extremists, meanwhile, planted two time bombs at the government radio station. Both went off, causing minor property damage but no injuries.

FOURTEEN INJURED
ST. LOUIS (AP)—Fourteen persons reported minor injuries in the derailment of the New York Central's Knickerbocker Limited yesterday at Mitchell, Ill., on its run from New York to St. Louis.

None of the injured—10 passengers and four crew members—required hospitalization.

Mrs. Robinson, 59, testified that her husband of 29 years told her he "wanted to lead his own life."

She said Robinson, 62, stayed away from home almost every night and on weekends.

The court approved property settlement awarded her half of a four-million-dollar fortune. It includes \$3,500 a month alimony for 11 months and 25 per cent of Robinson's income for life, or until her remarriage.

She also is to get half of the cash received for the Robinson art collection, valued at \$2,800,000.

Miss Gilbert, 24, divorced screen writer Benny Arnold, 31, saying her husband once said "his career as a writer was more important to him than a wife."

Mrs. Alice Baker, 48, testified her husband, 58, "mostly just wants to be free."

Mrs. Baker will receive 15 per cent of her husband's income if it exceeds \$50,000 a year, but only 14 per cent if it drops below that figure.

Young Robinson's trial was set for Oct. 15. He was charged with felony drunk driving after his sports car crashed into another car and his passenger was seriously injured last June 21.

County Building Permits Totaled \$269,582 In July

Valuation of construction determined from Douglas County building permits during July totaled \$269,582, according to County Building Inspector Charles Bonioli.

The biggest single job was an addition to Sutherland Grade School for \$52,500.

Applications were also made for two service stations, one to be constructed by Steve Harriman of Dillard and the other by A. J. Young of Tiller.

Young permit was for \$19,000 and the Young permit for \$18,000.

Another major job was construction by Suburban Gas Co. of Roseburg for \$11,350.

A total of 50 permits were issued, 19 of them for dwelling house construction totaling \$13,414. Eighteen other permits for additions to dwellings were filed totaling \$30,106. Nine were filed for private garages totaling \$8,164 and six for commercial buildings totaling \$54,048.

Permit fees totaled \$656, Bonioli said.

Service Station Owner Reports Theft Of Oil
William W. Washington of Sutherland reported to the sheriff's office Monday that someone had apparently used a passkey to enter his service station at 2070 NE Stephens Sunday night and steal almost 30 quarts of oil.

A deputy is investigating the entry into a storage room at the station, from where the oil was taken. Washington reported nothing else missing.

Typhoon Called One Of Wildest; Death Toll 2,100

HONG KONG (AP)—Reports from Red China said Tuesday that Typhoon Wanda was one of the century's worst, killing more than 2,100 persons and leaving millions homeless on the Chinese mainland.

A compilation of dispatches from the Communist New China News Agency put the number of known dead at 2,161 and the injured at almost the same figure.

The casualties may be boosted when reports reach the Red Regime's capital of Peking from remote regions where communications were cut by the monster storm.

Crops were devastated in an immense area.

Heavy rains threatened to flood the Hlai River network in North China.

Wanda struck the China coast with devastating force Wednesday and veered north. It spent itself deep in the interior.

Chekkiang Province, south of Shanghai on the coast, bore the brunt of the terrible blow.

Winds of up to 150 m.p.h. velocity tore across Chekiang, causing casualties put by Peiping Radio at 1,900 dead and 1,200 injured. One report said 38,000 homes were destroyed in the province and more than a million persons were homeless.

Before striking the mainland, Wanda destroyed many native homes and sheared off the roofs of army warehouses on the U.S. base island of Okinawa, and drove 6,000 from their homes on nationalist Formosa.

China's worst natural disasters in recent history include floods that took 900,000 lives in 1887 and 100,000 in 1911.

Norblad Proposes Astoria For First Fish Stamp Sale

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Norblad (R-Ore.) wants the first issues of a proposed "Salmon" stamp placed on sale at Astoria.

Norblad said he understood the Postoffice Department is preparing to issue a series of three wildlife stamps, and that one of them will be a picture of a salmon.

In a letter to Postmaster General Arthur N. Summerfield, the Oregon congressman said:

"It would seem to me only appropriate that the first issues of this stamp should be sold at Astoria, which is now and has been for many decades the center of salmon fishing and canning industry, not only in the United States, but throughout the world."

"I have learned that Seattle and certain Puget Sound interests have made a request for the first issues of the stamp there, but their salmon industry is minor in comparison to the production of the Columbia River with its center at Astoria."

Execution Of Arab Commando Is Ordered

JERUSALEM (AP)—A three-judge Israeli military court has ordered the execution of an Arab commando who pleaded guilty to throwing a grenade and firing at Israeli soldiers.

The army said the defendant, 20-year-old Abdul Rzek Mustapha Abu Sarafat, was a member of an Egyptian fedayeen group. The fedayeen are suicide squads which infiltrate across the border, harass communications and raid farms and villages.

An Israeli patrol wounded and captured Abdul after he entered Israel from the Gaza Strip last April.

Court Approves Purchase Of Land For Road Purpose

The Douglas County Court has signed an order approving the request of the Roseburg Lumber Co. to allow the Bureau of Land Management to buy portions of land in the Cow Creek area for construction of a timber access road.

The company is currently buying the land on term contract for a perpetual easement over company lands for the purpose. The BLM has offered \$727 for the land, which it will pay to Roseburg Lumber.

Owner Kenneth Ford said the money may be applied to the sales contract.

The company will clear timber on the land for its own use, according to a letter to the court.

The BLM is completing plans for an access road into the middle fork area of Cow Creek where both the company and the BLM have considerable timber.
