

Big Run Of Chinook Salmon Tallied At Winchester Dam

A record run of spring chinook salmon was tallied over the Game Commission counting station at Winchester dam during the last two weeks of July, according to the report from the commission's Southwest Regional Office at Roseburg. The count of 197 adult fish brought the season total to 7,826, highest on record and more than ever tallied for a full season, since counting started in 1946. Records indicate that from five to eight per cent of the total migration is still to come.

Movement of summer steelhead was somewhat disappointing, with 268 fish counted for the two-week period, for a total of 1,177, below average for the date. Considerable variation in the movement of these fish, however, is noted throughout the years, and it is hoped the run will increase in tempo.

An optimistic outlook is found in the migration of salmon trout (searun cutthroats) with 274 for the period and 512 for the season to date, one of the best counts in late years.

In addition to game fish, 437 squawfish (chubs) and 20,922 suckers have been counted through the station so far this year. It is the largest run of suckers ever experienced. The previous high count was in 1954 when 14,502 fish were listed. The low count of suckers was 265 fish in 1953. Squawfish have ranged in numbers from 47 in 1955 to 2,109 in 1953.
