24 Korean War Orphans Leave For Northwest

SEATTLE, South Korea (AP) — Twentyfour mixed blood Korean war orphans left by Northwest Airlines plane for the United States Wednesday to join American families who adopted them.

The boys and girls, between 6 months and 7 years of age, are the third group of Korean children whose adoption was arranged with the help of Harry Holt, a farmer from Creswell, Ore., who adopted eight Korean orphans last year.

Holt, who stayed here for months to organize placement of Korean orphans in American homes, accompanied the group. They will stop in Honolulu Thursday.

Featured in the third season of the organization will be authorities on science, philosophy, national and international news, Hollywood, humor and entertainment.

The year's first speaker will be Dr. Gerald Wendt whose subject, "Science Leads the Way," will be given Oct. 15. The E. C. Hall Co. of Portland Tuesday submitted the only bid for surfacing of roads in southern Lane County and northern Douglas County.

The project is a Bureau of Land Management job being handled by the Bureau of Public Roads. The bid has been referred to the BLM for a decision.

The Hall company submitted a bid for two schedules of work. One, which involves surfacing of the Siuslaw River Road and the South Sisters Creek Road, was bid at \$504,086.

The second schedule for surfacing the North Sisters Road, as well as the Siuslaw River and South Sisters Creek roads, was bid at \$702,242.

The North and South Sisters Creek roads, also known as the Twin Sisters Creek roads, connect with the Siuslaw Road near Alma, approximately 25 miles southeast of Eugene.

The roads will be used for harvesting of timber in the Smith River area.

Sec. Wilson Calls Suez Canal Rift 'Small'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Wilson described the Suez situation as a "relatively small thing" Tuesday, and expressed hope the problem could be settled by a conference "rather than wave the big stick and threaten people."

Wilson made his comment at a State Department disclosed Secretary Dulles and 20 Latin American envoys had discussed whether Britain and France might feel they have a legal basis for use of force as a result of Egypt's seizure of the Canal.

Wilson, asked about the possible impact of the Suez crisis on the U.S. military program, replied: "We can't flip up and down because of a relatively small thing."

A reporter asked what he meant by his reference to the relatively small thing.

Minister Says Churches Inadequate In Moscow

NEW YORK (AP) — The Rev. Myron W. Fowell of Westwood, Mass., returned from a visit to Russia Tuesday and said Moscow's 54 churches were not enough for the city.

He said that everywhere his group went, even on a week day, they found the churches crowded.

The Rev. Mr. Fowell and 25 other members of the Council for Social Action of Congregational Christian Churches left late in June on the Council's sixth annual study and travel seminar. They visited Russia, Germany, France, Finland, Sweden, Denmark, The Netherlands and England.

Safecrackers Use Telephone Alarm

LYNNBROOK, N. Y. (AP) — A cautious crew of safecrackers has come up with a new burglar's aid — a telephone alarm system from lookout to bank vault.

The thieves, working under cover of night, successfully demonstrated the modern communication setup over the weekend. They looted the Lynbrook branch of the Meadowbrook National Bank of an estimated \$100,000 in cash and an undetermined amount in checks.

Police said the burglars first leaped from a Long Island Rail Road trestle to the roof of a one-story building next to the bank. Then, using a ladder, they climbed to the roof of the bank's two-story annex. From there they ducked into the main building through a third-floor window.

The thieves strung communications wires all the way from a lookout point on the railroad trestle right up to the steel door of the bank's night depository. Apparently there were telephone sets on each end of the line.

The lookout could observe any vehicle or pedestrian near the bank and flash a warning in an instant to the gang inside.

The burglars burned open the depository with an acetylene torch. They hauled out the cash and checks that depositors had left there Friday.

The bank's alarm system failed to ring.

PICNIC-REUNION SET

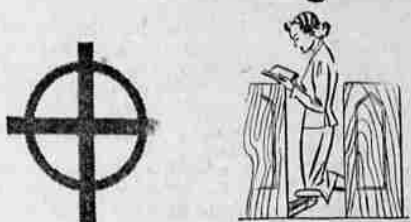
