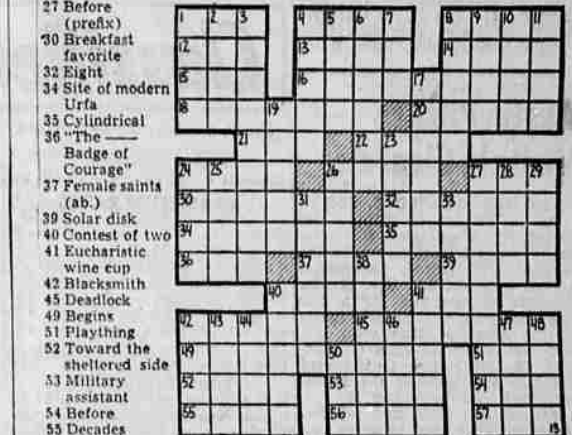
The ore came from the Lucky Lass mine near here.
