Top Fighters Meet Tonight

CHICAGO — Unbeaten Rory Calhoun of New York and Spider Webb of Chicago clash in a 10-round middleweight bout at Chicago Stadium tonight.

Calhoun, 22-year-old former dishwasher who will be seeking his 24th straight victory, was an early 9-5 favorite.

Rory has scored 12 knockouts and recently defeated Charlie Cotton in 10 rounds at New York. Before meeting Cotton, Calhoun stopped Willie Vaughn in eight rounds at New York.

Frank Gilmer, chairman of the Illinois Athletic Commission, said the five point scoring system will be introduced in tonight's fight. Heretofore, the 10 point system had been used. The winner now gets five points and the loser four or less.

Cross-Country 3-Hour Flights Seen By Doolittle

SAN FRANCISCO — In the not too distant future, you can take off in New York and land in San Francisco before you took off.

This is the opinion of the man who won the first Bendix Trophy Race in 1931 and went on to set a transcontinental record of 12 hours.

"We now have fighter planes in the 1,000 mile-per-hour class," Lt. Gen Jimmy Doolittle said in an interview. "It is only a matter of time until commercial aircraft will be flying across the continent in less than three hours."

With the aid of the three-hour time differential from coast-to-coast, this would mean arriving before you left, by the clock.

This week marks the 25th anniversary of the Bendix Trophy Race — aviation's equivalent of the Kentucky Derby or the Indianapolis Speedway Classic.

Doolittle won that first race in 1931 from Los Angeles to Cleveland, refueled, took off for New York and became the first man to cross the continent in 12 hours.

The present record for the Bendix Race was set in 1954 by Edward Kenny in an F86 Thunderstreak which averaged over 616 m.p.h.

Riddle Schools Slate Opening For September 4

Riddle Schools will get under way for the 1956-57 school year Tuesday morning, Sept. 4, at 8:40 a.m. All new students in the area should be registered before this time.

School will be in session all day, and since there will be no cafeteria service that day students may bring their lunches or make other arrangements.

Riddle school hours will be as follows: Morning session beginning at 8:40 a.m., out at 11:55 a.m.; afternoon session beginning at 12:40, closing at 3:30 p.m. First and second graders will be dismissed at 2 p.m.

Bus schedules will follow approximately the same routes as last year with the earliest loading of buses starting at 7:40 a.m.

Student fees for the Riddle High School have been set at \$13 per student, the same as last year, according to information released by Donald E. Brown, high school principal. This fee includes rentals on all textbooks; student body tickets; fees for athletic events, assemblies and special films, and student body dues.

Students taking shop classes will pay a fee of \$5 in addition. Mechanical drawing and home economics students will each pay an additional \$2 for supplies, and those in chemical laboratory will pay a breakage fee of \$5 each. Any credit will be refunded at the end of the year. The fee for students taking chemistry may be paid on a basis of \$2.50 each semester.

The opening faculty meeting for Riddle schools will be held at the elementary building Friday at 9 a.m. Following the opening group session and pictures, the teachers will meet with their principals until noon.

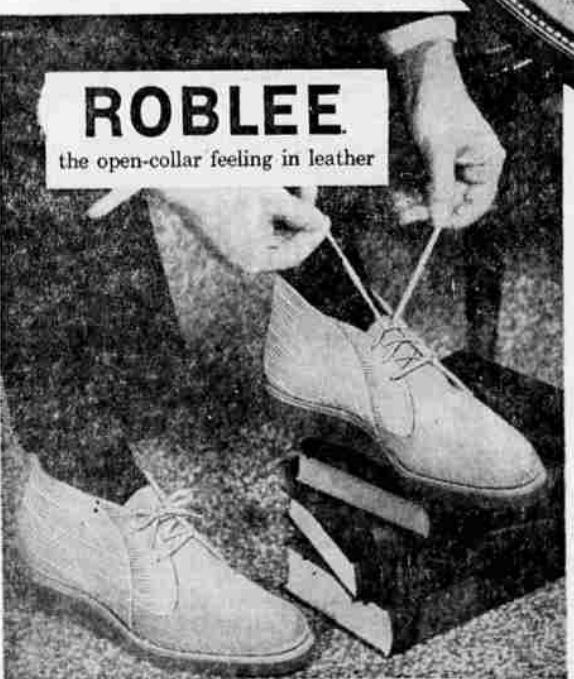
FAMILY PICNIC HELD
