

Auto Industry Proving Safety Points In Cars

DETROIT (AP)—The "big three" of the auto industry is putting on a week-long thrill show to convince an audience of five they are building safety, not death into their vehicles.

The audience is a subcommittee of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee looking for means to cut drastically the nation's highway death toll that mounted to 39,000 last year. It is headed by Rep. Kenneth A. Roberts (D-Ala.).

The general areas of the subcommittee investigation are vehicle design, the human factor, legislation, highways and law enforcement.

General Motors, Ford and Chrysler each has wrecked thousands of dollars worth of automobiles to prove advertised safety features. All three have pulled all stops to show the so-called "horsepower race" doesn't have speed as its aim, but quick acceleration and passing safety.

Speaker Claims Two Lines Serve Better Than One

An area served by two railroads is assured better service than an area having only a single rail line, southern Oregon lumber shippers were told Wednesday evening by a representative of the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn.

Shippers from Jackson, Josephine and Douglas Counties met Wednesday night for a dinner meeting at the Umpqua Hotel where they were addressed by Kenneth Batchelder and Emmett E. Stoddard of the lumbermen's association. Stoddard is director of field services and Batchelder is secretary of committees on traffic, car loading and car supply.

Shippers were advised by Batchelder, the chief speaker, to continue efforts aimed at increasing rail competition for the region.

He explained that a considerable length of the inadequate supply of freight cars to handle the national volume of freight during peak months. He listed devices and practices used by the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. to secure more cars and better distribution for the lumber industry.

Payment Formula For O&C Timber Now Under Study

Congressional proposals which would affect the payment formula of the 1937 O&C act are under study today in Portland by members of the public lands committee of the Assn. of Oregon Counties.

Recent suggested changes include a revision in the system of payments to local governments from a portion of the gross receipts from timber and grazing lands to an in lieu tax basis, according to Douglas County Judge Carl Hill.

County Commissioner Frank Ashley is attending the Portland session. He is there as an observer for the Assn. of O&C Counties and as a county representative.

The possible revisions have come following reports of the government's Hoover Commission and upon recommendations from House and Senate committees, Judge Hill said.

The state's public land's committee is concerned with all public lands in Oregon, he continued, including national forests, Taylor Grazing Lands, O&C lands and other federal property.

Currently the proposals are being studied. Judge Hill said the PLC group might have recommendations to bring before the annual meeting of the Assn. of Oregon Counties this November in Portland.

Some 50 persons died or are still unaccounted for in the crash off Nantucket Island which sank the 29,000-ton Italian liner Doria. Both lines have filed actions accusing each other of being at fault. The Italian line is suing the Swedish line for 25 million dollars.

Hoodlum's Wife Held In Riesel Blinding Case

NEW YORK (AP)—The wife of an alleged co-conspirator in the acid attack which blinded labor columnist Victor Riesel has been held in \$100,000 bail as a material witness in the case.

Mrs. Leni Miranti was arrested yesterday before U.S. Commissioner Earle N. Bishop. The high bail was set as a deterrent for her own protection and because she heard conversations pertaining to the acid throwing.

Thomas B. Gilchrist Jr., chief assistant U.S. attorney, told the court, "We want to protect her from bodily harm. She's a witness."

Mrs. Miranti interrupted the attorney's remarks, saying, "I don't know what I'm a witness to."

The husband, Umberto Riesel, was arrested Aug. 17 with Joseph P. Carino, 43, each held in \$100,000 bail and charged with conspiracy in the assault last April 5 on Riesel as he emerged from a Broadway restaurant.

Chicagoan May Succeed Paschen

CHICAGO (AP)—Political observers speculated today that another Cook County (Chicago) man would be the Democratic party's choice to succeed Herbert C. Paschen as its nominee for governor.

Paschen, Cook County treasurer, resigned Wednesday as the nominee in a controversy revolving about an employee fund in his office. The fund is under investigation by county and federal grand juries.

Paschen's resignation came less than 10 weeks before the Nov. 6 election. It left the problem of picking his successor up to the Democratic State Central Committee which meets in Springfield, Ill., Tuesday.

At least a dozen persons were reported being considered to replace the affable, 51-year-old Paschen who polled more than a million votes in 1954 when he was elected county treasurer.

Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential nominee, is expected to have a strong voice in the selection of Paschen's successor, as is Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley, a Stevenson adherent.

Among those reported under consideration are Stephen A. Mitchell, former Democratic National chairman, Justice Walter V. Schaefer of the Illinois Supreme Court, Cook County Sheriff Joseph D. Lohman and Cook County Judge Otto Kerner, former U. S. attorney in Chicago.

EOKA Charges Papers Forged

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—The EOKA underground fight forged last night at documents the British say Archibishop Makarios said the director of the violence campaign against Britain's rule over Cyprus.

The British replied they are "convinced the documents are genuine."

EOKA leaflets scattered last night in the port city of Limassol charged "scum" who are prepared to accept money "forged and distributed by the violence campaign against Britain's rule over Cyprus."

British officials announced Monday they had seized the documents and said they included portions of the diary of the EOKA leader "Digenis," whom the British have identified as former Greek army colonel, George Grivas.

Britain charged the documents established that the EOKA chief acted under the personal direction of the exiled archbishop. Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox Boyd said he was absolutely satisfied as to the authenticity of the papers.

Bullet Wound Caused Death Of MC Woman

the neighborhood." He said the bullet taken from the woman's body, seven or eight guns owned by youngsters of the neighborhood and several empty shell cases picked up in the area, had been taken by police. Bird said the guns belonged to youngsters known to have been out with firearms at the time.

Sheriff Byrd said he has sent a deputy to Portland today so the items can be analyzed at the Oregon Crime Laboratory. He said evidence from the items would be introduced at a coroner's inquest.

The bullet struck Mrs. Moore while she was washing clothes on the back porch. Sheriff Byrd quoted the children as saying Mrs. Moore suddenly acted stricken and staggered into the adjoining kitchen from the back porch. She collapsed on the floor in front of her children. One of the girls ran to the home of Mrs. Moore's sister, Mrs. Floyd Creason, while another daughter immediately called the doctor.

When Mrs. Creason arrived at the Moore home, she found the victim crumpled on the floor. She told investigators she thought her sister had suffered a heart attack or some other type of sickness.

Coroner Powers explained that there were no apparent outward signs of a bullet wound. The doctor was uncertain immediately of the cause of death since no blood was visible outside her body.

An autopsy was performed soon after her death. Powers estimated she had lived from three to five minutes after she was struck.

He said the autopsy revealed the bullet had penetrated her body on the left side near the front, had gone through both lungs, the main artery to the heart and the heart.

The intensive investigation was carried on cooperatively by state police, Myrtle Creek police, the coroner and sheriff's deputies, Sheriff Byrd said.

Mrs. Moore was born May 4, 1922, at Spokane, Wash. She and her family had moved to Myrtle Creek less than three months ago from Green River, Wyo. She is survived by her husband, an employee of Hanna Nickel Smelting Co., and six children ranging in ages from 8 months to 11 years. The youngest children are twins. The children are: Linda Jean 11, Shirley Rae 9, Jimmy Ernest 5, Lonnie Lee 2½, and twins, Brenda Ann and Glenda Jo 8 months.

She is also survived by her mother, Mrs. Clara Kirkelle of Myrtle Creek; her father, Fred Ludwig of Rockwood, Wash.; three brothers, Donald and Roger Ludwig of Myrtle Creek and Sgt. Robert Ludwig with the U.S. Army in Newfoundland; three sisters, Mrs. Bibbie (Wanda) Bell, Mrs. Creason, both of Myrtle Creek and Mrs. Al (Betty) Cline of Fromberg, Mont.; and an aunt, Bertha Osborne, Myrtle Creek.

Myrtle Creek Buses To Serve Surprise Valley

The Myrtle Creek school board announced this week that the district expects to send buses into the Surprise Valley area on Gazley Route when school starts although some residents of the area are making efforts to have the area annexed to the Canyonville district.

The board said until some official action is taken by the county Boundary Board, the approximately 100 children will continue to attend Myrtle Creek schools.

The announcement was made at this week's board meeting, according to Correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

At the meeting, Supt. Al Neeth estimated district schools would have about 1,570 pupils again this year. This is about the same figure enrolled when school ended last spring.

In other action, the board heard a request from Travis Richards for money to repay him for transporting his children to school. The board said it would pay him \$40 monthly, but he estimated he would need more. He lives on Boomer Hill and has three children. Under state law, a district is forced to furnish transportation for its children. No other action was taken on the matter.

The board also:

1. Accepted bids for gasoline, lubricating and fuel oil. Shell Oil Co. was awarded the gasoline contract at 22.88 cents per gallon and lubricating oil at 69.5 cents per gallon. Union Oil was awarded a contract for fuel oil on a bid of \$3.80 per barrel.

2. Took out student insurance with Jones Insurance Agency of Myrtle Creek at \$3,000 for \$10 deductible.

3. Denied a request from Canyonville for use of its football field for three nights in the fall.

4. Heard a remonstrance from a group of families in the Frozen Creek area of North Myrtle against having a woman bus driver. Action is still pending.

AFL-CIO Cracks Down On Labor Racket Movement

FOREST PARK, Pa. (AP)—Organized labor appeared today to be embarked on a new attempt to chase racketeers out of the labor movement.

On the heels of action against three unions charged with welfare fund irregularities, the AFL-CIO Executive Council ordered its 140 unions in effect to quit chartering locals to hoodlums trying to extort money from employers by threatening violence.

It directed all unions to avoid indiscriminate issuing of charters that "can be used to shake down" employers and give "a black eye to the labor movement."

The Federation's action closely coincided with the FBI's arrest in New York of John DiGuardi, alias Johnny Dio, a police character who has for years operated on the racketeer fringe of the labor movement.

Dio, arrested on charges of conspiracy in the acid-blinding of labor columnist Victor Riesel, had succeeded for years in operating nonexistent or "paper locals" of various labor unions, New York police officials said.

George Meany, AFL-CIO president, said he didn't know whether Dio's worst meant he helped blind Riesel but declared that anybody responsible for the "dastardly deed" in the Riesel case should get "the full penalty of the law."

Stumbo Family Announces Plans For Own Highway

Tentative plans for the 16½ foot section of Highway 99 owned by the Stumbo brothers was announced by the clan recently at a Glendale-Grants Pass baseball game at which they were guests of honor. The highway strip is near Azalea Flats.

Bob Stumbo, Azalea logger, talked on imposing a weight limit on the strip. "It's not that we have anything against the logging industry, but we're going to have to do something to protect our road and the log trucks are tearing it up. We're going to have to put in scales and impose a 20-ton load limit, with money from the fine going to keep the road in condition," he told News-Review correspondent Grace Fox.

The load limit will not apply, however, the brothers indicated, to their own employers, the Dollar and Patterson Lumber Co., of Glendale.

The Stumbos also indicated that they are making plans to make "their" highway a freeway by adding two more lanes to the present two.

They did not reveal the present state of their negotiations with the State Highway Dept., Mrs. Fox reports.
