

Taunting Leads To Fatal Shots At Pendleton

PENDLETON — Taunts flung on the streets of Pendleton early Thursday resulted in a shooting that killed William Mancanara Jr., 27, Tacoma.

Dist. Atty. John Walker said Hollis Carl Doe, 30, Pendleton, came into the police station voluntarily afterwards and admitted the shooting.

Doe is being held for investigation. Walker said he had pieced together the story.

Doe, a Negro, stopped his car on the west side of Pendleton to talk to some women he saw there about 3 a. m. Mancanara and three others were in another car, talking to the women. A dispute arose, and the others began taunting Doe, who first tried to climb into the others' car, and then fired a shot into the back seat before the four drove off.

The car carrying the four men was stopped for a traffic violation. At the police station officers were told of the wounded man. He was dead on arrival at a hospital.

Talmadge Wins Election In Georgia's Primary

ATLANTA — Georgia's successor to veteran U.S. Sen. Walter F. George will be Herman E. Talmadge, 43-year-old staunch racial segregationist.

Talmadge rode to victory yesterday in the Democratic primary — equivalent to election in this state — over Melvin E. Thompson, whom he has twice defeated for governor, but never by such a smashing margin as in the Senate race.

Mrs. Chapman Dies Wednesday

Fleta Blanche Chapman, 63, resident of Northeast Fremont Street, died Wednesday in a local hospital. She was born Nov. 14, 1892, in Jacksonville, and had made her home in Roseburg for the past 14 years.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Rie, in 1948. She was a member of the Eastern Star of Medford and of Zulema Temple, Daughters of the Nile.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. H. K. (Leona) Hanna, Medford, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 10:30 a. m. in the Chapel of the Roses, Dr. Homer Noble will officiate. Committal services and interment will be held at 3 p. m. in the Jacksonville Cemetery in Jacksonville.

Truce Chief Asks Jordan, Israel To Stop Battling

JERUSALEM — Maj. Gen. Edson Burns, U.N. truce chief, has called on both Jordan and Israel to put an end to the series of border incidents that has exploded in the middle of the worsening Suez crisis.

Jordan military sources charged Wednesday that 1,000 Israelis in a fleet of trucks and armored cars blew up a fortified police post and killed 20 Jordanians during a two-hour battle.

This attack, one of the most serious along the Jordan-Israeli border in months, was only three miles from where the Israelis claimed six of their soldiers were killed by a Jordan patrol Monday. The raid was followed by an Israeli report last night that two Israeli guardsmen were killed by infiltrators from Jordan on the road between the Dead Sea and Red Sea. Another guardsman was missing.

Gen. Burns appealed to both sides to end the "tragic series of events." In a communique he declared that the raid appeared to be "an act of retaliation such as has been repeatedly condemned by the Security Council."

The Tel Aviv newspaper Maariv said the raid "should teach the Arabs that Israel's security forces are on guard and will severely punish every murder and act of sabotage."

Rothschild Praises Air Navigation System As 'Best'

WASHINGTON — Undersecretary of Commerce Louis S. Rothschild Thursday praised the country's new air navigation system as "the best we can now devise" but said it will be several years before it can be brought into full use.

Rothschild told a House Commerce subcommittee about "VORTAC," the compromise navigation system announced by the government on Aug. 30.

The House group is looking into air traffic control problems. Rothschild said that if present civilian and military navigation systems had been allowed to develop, independently they would have "not only interfered with one another but would have vastly complicated air traffic control in this country."

Rothschild described "VORTAC" as a combination of the best parts of the two existing electronic systems which tell a pilot where he is headed and how far he is from a given point.

The system for civilian aircraft is known as "VOR-DME" (very high frequency omnidirectional range—distance measuring equipment). The military-developed system is TACAN (tactical air navigation), more complex but more precise than VOR-DME.

The two could not operate simultaneously because they need to use some of the same radio frequencies.

Rothschild said a common system acceptable to the military had to be worked out "because it is now known that in any future conflict the United States may be a theater of war."

Lebanon Woman Slays 2 Children With Knife

LEBANON, Ore. — A Lebanon woman killed her two young daughters Wednesday by cutting their throats with a paring knife. Police Chief Ned Crippen said.

He said Mrs. Graham Upham, about 35, telephoned the police station shortly after 10 a. m., and said, "Send the police to my house. I just murdered my children."

Crippen said the bodies of Ruth, 4, and Lois, 2, were found in the bathtub.

He quoted Mrs. Upham as saying, "I did it so she could live." The remark was not explained.

The father, a laboratory technician at the Lebanon Community hospital, was not at home at the time. The couple has no other children.

Stevenson, Kefauver Endorsed By Labor Group

ST. LOUIS — The Democratic Stevenson-Kefauver ticket has the endorsement of the International Brotherhood of Electrical, Radio & Machine Workers.

A resolution endorsing the presidential and vice presidential candidates was adopted by voice vote at the union's convention here Tuesday.

James P. Carey, president of the union which claims 410,000 members, said more than 700 convention delegates were on the floor at the time and there was only one vote in opposition to the resolution.

Orders For Douglas Fir Climbed Up In August

PORTLAND — Orders for Douglas fir lumber climbed slightly in August over the previous month, but ran well behind production, the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. reported Thursday.

At the end of August the industry's unfilled order file totaled 606 million board feet and stocks on hand totaled 956 million.

The weekly averages for August were: Production, 130,344,000 board feet; orders, 163,500,000; and shipments, 168,586,000. The same averages in July were: 148,759,000; 161,890,000; and 160,495,000.

Post Offices Get New Identification Signs

WASHINGTON — The Post Office Department announced today new identification signs will be placed at some 45,000 post offices and postal stations starting the first week in October.

Postmaster General Summerfield said the red, white and blue signs are "an important improvement at a slight cost," making it easier for patrons to identify postal service facilities in growing areas, resorts, and shopping centers having new postal contract stations in their stores.

Inspection Fails To Show Plane Was Sabotaged

WASHINGTON — A complete inspection of the Hawaii Kai failed to indicate that an attempt had been made to sabotage the hydroplane, owner Edgar F. Kaiser said Wednesday.

It had been reported Tuesday that rolls of tape had been stuffed into the Hawaii Kai's fuel tank vents Sunday night or early Monday.

Kaiser said the tape might have been placed there after a mishap prior to the Sept. 1 Gold Cup race on the Detroit River in Detroit in an effort to prevent gasoline from running out of the tanks.

The Hawaii Kai is here for the running of the President's Cup race Saturday and Sunday.

In Detroit, meanwhile, the City Council backed away from a proposal that it institute an investigation of the Gold Cup controversy.

The council had proposed that Seattle and Detroit newspapers and Seattle's KING-TV join to conduct their own probe of the disputed final heat of the race.

Seattle's Miss Thriftway apparently won the race, then was disqualified on grounds she hit and damaged a buoy. The Thriftway camp denied the charge and lodged a protest. The matter is now in the hands of the Inboard Racing Commission of the American Power Boat Assn. A decision is expected next Sunday.

Temporary TV Walkout Probed

HOLLYWOOD — Talks were scheduled to begin Thursday on a labor dispute that knocked two National Broadcasting Co. nationwide television programs off the air Wednesday.

NBC was unable to present the "Tennessee Ernie Ford" and "Matinee Theater" programs when studio engineers refused to pass a three-man picket line at the front entrance.

The pickets were NBC clerks seeking to have the National Assn. of Broadcast Employees and Technicians named to represent them, said the union. They were withdrawn after four hours when a temporary settlement was reached.

NBC resumed its normal schedule of programs after an hour and a half by using supervisory personnel.

The dispute has been referred to the New York offices of the company and the union for discussion.

Motions Attack Vice Indictments In Portland

PORTLAND — Motions attacking indictments returned by a grand jury in its vice investigation here were filed Wednesday by Thomas E. Maloney, Seattle.

He contended that the grand jury did not consider all of the evidence before it, and that five of the indictments in which he was named were faulty.

Circuit Judge Frank Lonergan said the motions would be considered next Tuesday. Lonergan has under consideration similar motions to throw out other indictments in the case.

One of the charges against Maloney accused him of conspiring with William M. Langley, district attorney, and Joseph P. McLaughlin, Seattle, to promote gambling here.

Special music will be provided and the Rev. Mr. Adams will deliver a sermon. The public is invited to attend.

Suit To Collect On Property Sale Filed In Court

A complaint has been filed in circuit court in Roseburg by Rubye Jean Powell seeking \$34,012 allegedly due on real and personal property.

The plaintiff says defendants Leo S. Wilson and Margaret Wilson have made no payments on a contract involving 14 rental units in Sutherlin in June, July and August. She asks the contract be foreclosed if payment is not made.

In the complaint, the plaintiff requests a court order naming her receiver of rents and profits. She asks for immediate possession after a decree.

The complainant, who says she is the former Rubye Jean Powell, says she and Powell and the defendants purchased the property Jan. 15, 1954. She says she has acquired the interest of Elmer Powell.

In her complaint she asks that the defendants pay interest, costs and \$3,500 attorney's fees. She further asks that if no payment on principal is made that all monies paid to her by the defendants be retained by her as liquidated damages and compensation for use of the premises. She alleges that the defendants named have not paid taxes and says the units bring a monthly income of \$900.

Toketee Falls Worker Arrested As Fugitive

A construction worker was arrested in the Toketee Falls area Wednesday by state police on a fugitive complaint from Mountain Home, Idaho, authorities, who charged him with statutory rape.

Earl Wesley Davis, alias Leo W. Davis, 40, was arraigned later Wednesday in district court in Roseburg. Judge Warren Woodruff committed Davis to jail for 15 days, pending extradition.

The complaint charges him with the alleged rape of his 14-year-old daughter.

Silverton Man, Wife Killed In Accident

SWEET HOME — A man and his wife from Silverton were killed Wednesday morning in the head-on collision of their pickup truck with a logging truck on Highway 20 a half mile west of the Cascade ranger station.

The victims were James Richard Patton, 32, and Cecile M. Patton, 45, Silverton Route 2. Driver of the logging truck, Melvin R. Schlicht, 28, of Venita, was hospitalized here with shock and undetermined injuries which were believed not serious.

Glendale School Board Discusses Lunch Program

The Glendale School Board met at the high school Wednesday night. Considerable time was spent in discussion of the school lunch program, and the board decided to have the ceiling and walls of the grade school gymnasium, where elementary students will be served their lunches, repaired and painted before the cafeteria program begins.

It was announced that Mrs. Laura Wells, of the state school board lunch administration, will be here Monday to inspect facilities at the high school and grade school. She will meet with the school board in the evening to make recommendations and to discuss the possibility of state aid for the Glendale school lunch program.
