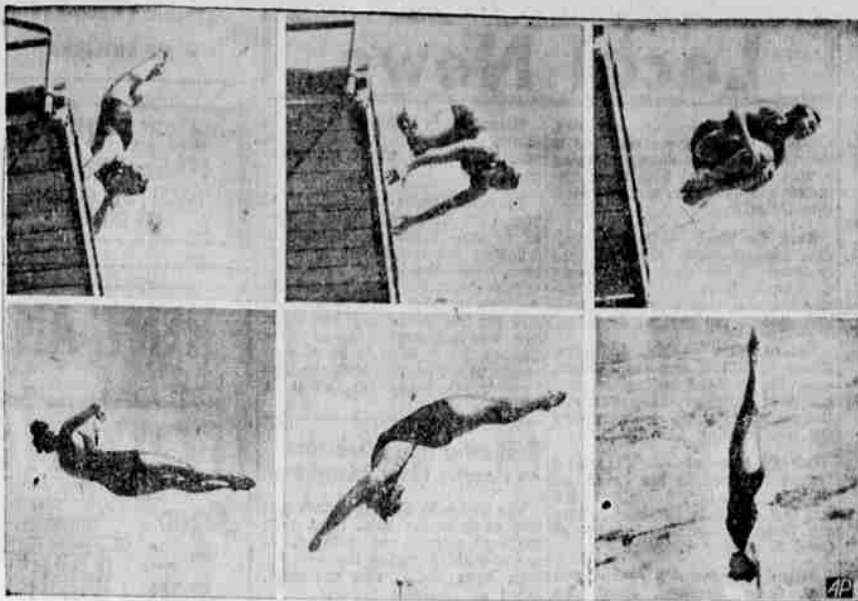
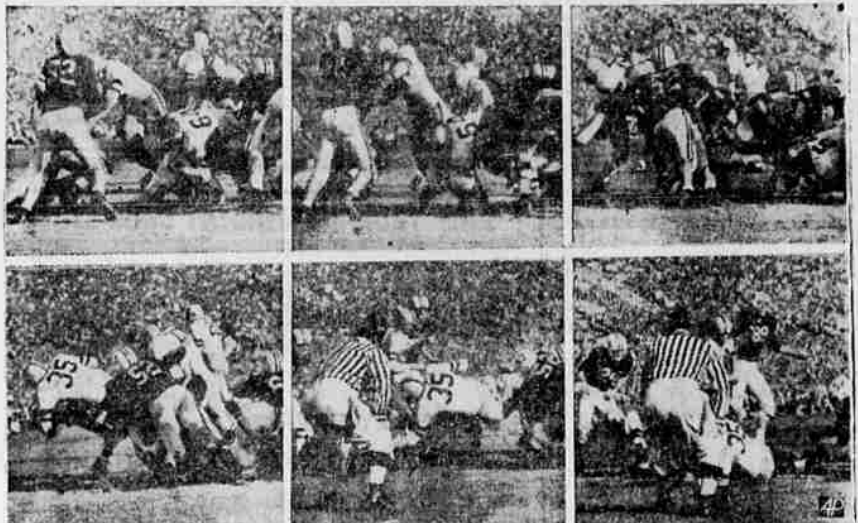

Oregon State Leaps To 11th In Gridiron Poll; Vols First

Tennessee and Oklahoma came down to the wire in a photo finish in this week's Associated Press football poll but the final closeup showed Tennessee the No. 1 team by two points.

Tennessee's strong runner - up support overcame Oklahoma's wide edge in first place votes. The final count: Tennessee, 1,446; Oklahoma, 1,444.

Sports writers and sportscasters voting on the usual basis of 10 points for a first-place vote, 9 for second, etc., gave Oklahoma 92 firsts to 58 for Tennessee. But Tennessee led 75-34 in second-place ballots.

Tennessee was a 6-0 winner over Georgia Tech Saturday. Oklahoma beat Iowa State 44-0.

Michigan State nosed out Georgia Tech (No. 4) and the Texas Aggies (No. 5) for third place with 993 points.

The other teams in the top 10 in order were Ohio State, Iowa, Miami, Syracuse and Michigan.

49ers, Shrine Want Brodie

SAN FRANCISCO — Stanford passing star John Brodie is a wanted man — by the San Francisco 49ers and the Shrine East-West game committee.

Officials of both organizations indicated Monday the nation's leading college aerialist, a senior, will be their first choice.

Two 49er assistant coaches, who asked not to be named, said Brodie would be San Francisco's top choice. The 49er quarterbacks are Y. A. Tittle, who is 30, and Earl Morrill, who faces a military service call.

A Shrine spokesman said Buck Shaw, head coach of the West squad, telephoned that he needs Brodie to key a T-formation offense.

Owner Of 49ers Lashes Players

SAN FRANCISCO — Tony Morabito, co-owner of the San Francisco 49ers, says many of his football players are loafing and using the team as a "country club."

"Coach Frank Albert has treated the squad like a group of men but there are some who just don't give a damn and only want to come around Monday for their checks," Morabito told a reporter Monday night.

"Well, nobody's going any place with a team that has some guys who want to play and others who want to sit around on their duffs."

The 49ers are alone in the cellar of the National League's Western Conference with one victory and six defeats.

Morabito declined to single out individuals.

The 49er owner said the team will "have to rebuild and it will take at least three years. After this season we're going to take the whole club apart, study each player, then decide how he fits into our plans."

Bizarre Accident May Cost Medal

MELBOURNE, — A weird accident may have cost the United States a gold medal in weightlifting at the Olympic Games.

Pete George of Akron, Ohio, Olympic and world champion in the middleweight class, suffered a severe eye injury on the plane trip to Melbourne and his training has been interrupted.

Starting to put on his hat, George jabbed a seat card in his eye. The eye has been treated but doctors refused to let George train. He also is losing sleep because of pain.

"We counted on George as a certain gold medalist," said Coach Bob Hoffman. "Now we can't be sure."

Headaches Most Frequent Among Medical Students

WASHINGTON — Medical students, a survey shows, are more apt to have recurring headaches than any other occupational group. And farmers are the least susceptible.

This was reported today by a Louisiana doctor in describing one of the most extensive surveys ever made of the causes and distribution of one of mankind's most prevalent disorders. The study showed that "over 60 per cent of the general population have headaches."

And the survey, involving nearly 5,000 persons, showed also that your chances of having recurring headaches are strongest if you are (1) a woman; (2) under 20 years of age; and (3) unmarried.

People who are divorced or separated from their spouses are more apt to have them than happily married folks.

People with no education at all are least apt to suffer from groups having varying degrees of education.

Results Of Study Shown

Dr. Henry Ogden of Louisiana State University School of Medicine gave results of the study in a scientific exhibit at the opening of the 50th anniversary meeting of the Southern Medical Assn.

Dr. Ogden said freshman and senior medical school students were questioned to get data on the headaches of college students, and it was found that more than 80 per cent of them were victims, topping even business executives, of whom 77 per cent are sufferers.

In subsequent order on the list: professional people (70 per cent); housewives (68); clerks (68); salesmen (58); manual laborers (55); and farmers (50).

Chevrolet, Buick Again Leading Registrations

DETROIT — Chevrolet led Ford by more than 198,000 units in new car registrations for the first nine months of 1956.

The figures, published Monday by Automotive News, credited Chevrolet with 1,209,036 and Ford with 1,010,736 registrations throughout the country. At the same point last year Chevrolet's lead was 51,244 units. The figures were Chevrolet 1,220,094; Ford 1,168,850.

Other figures show Buick leading Plymouth 431,130 to 377,832. At the same point last year Buick had 385,650 registrations against Plymouth's 315,569. Other totals for the first nine months of the year were Oldsmobile 350,435; Pontiac 282,559; Mercury 219,223; Dodge 170,731; Cadillac 109,910.

In the same period of 1955 Oldsmobile had 454,973; Pontiac 407,937; Mercury 281,286; Dodge 217,815; Cadillac 108,571.

The total of all American-made cars registered during the January-August period was 4,612,825 units. This compared with 5,469,128 in the same 1955 period.

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TEN HUNTERS KILLED

SEATTLE — Ten hunters have been killed by gunfire in Washington this season, seven of them by the accidental firing of their own weapons.

The close of the general deer season cut down the likelihood of further deaths, but the elk and waterfowl seasons continue and a special deer hunt is on the calendar for Western Washington Nov. 25-Dec. 2.
