

Assailed Comic Books Defended By Minister

BOSTON (AP) — Universalist-Unitarian churches observed Freedom of the Press Sunday. One minister even defended the frequently attacked comic book.

The Rev. Dr. Joseph Barth of King's Chapel urged his congregation to honor "our agencies of communications, leaving them to do, as they slowly will, their own police job."

"For every youngster who gets a bad idea from a comic book," he said, "I venture to say there are a thousand youngsters which, if they didn't have comics to read for release, might easily lead to much worse pastimes."
