

### New Rain Gauge To Be Installed

Shipment of the new rain gauge slated for installation on the North Umpqua River at Steamboat has been delayed, but is expected by Friday, according to Ben L. Irving, chairman of the Water Resources Board for Douglas County.

The new gauge will help in determining flood control measure. Irving reminded of the forthcoming public hearing to be held concerning flood control. The meeting is open to all interested parties, including representatives of federal, state, county and municipal agencies, commercial, industrial, civic, highway railroad and flood-control interest and property owners concerned. These persons will be given a full chance to express their views concerning the character and extent of the improvement desired and the need and advisability of its execution. The hearing will be held Thursday, Nov. 29 in the county court auditorium, starting at 9:30 a. m.

### Associates Say Eden Only Tired

LONDON — An associate says Prime Minister Eden has not suffered a recurrence of his critical 1953 illness but is "utterly exhausted."

Eden, who canceled some public duties Monday night to rest from "severe overstrain," underwent three operations in 1953 after being stricken by a liver complaint.

His parliamentary private secretary, Cmdr. Robert Allan, said the Prime Minister had experienced "no recurrence, discomfort or pain from the abdominal trouble from which he suffered three years ago."

Lady Eden told a political meeting there is nothing wrong with her husband which a rest won't cure.

"He is just tired," she said. "During these past few weeks I have felt as though the Suez Canal was flowing through our drawing room."

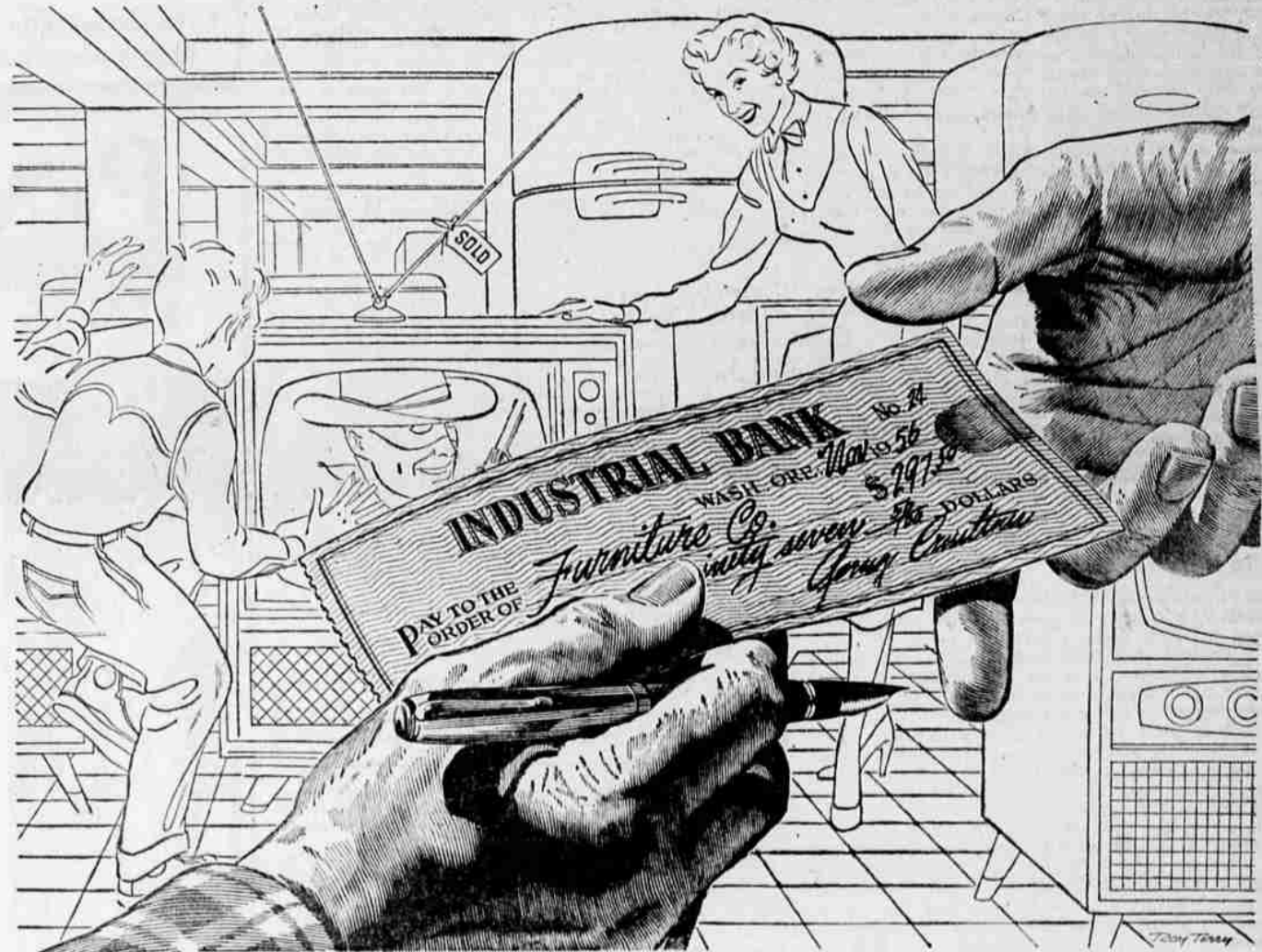
