

Eugene Educator Outlines 4 'Paths' To World Peace

A young educator interested in world peace outlined four paths he thinks Americans could take in that direction when he addressed members of the Roseburg chapter, American Assn. of University Women last weekend.

Those ways, according to Marvin G. Pursinger, Eugene, are: (1) Passive resistance; (2) building a

"fortress America"; (3) disarming in an organized fashion and making that plan worldwide; and (4) sharing American abundance with others to increase standards of living.

Pursinger appeared to prefer disarmament. He urged his listeners to become informed, to bring other peace loving people in the world into such a camp. "Be informed," he advised, by reading available information to "know what we're talking about."

Ways toward international disarmament, he feels, include writing letters to the editors of newspapers and to members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives. Pursinger thinks the editorial page of a newspaper is the "most read" in the paper.

He mentioned briefly a plan being used by a women's group, the Women's International League. Members have devised a system of envelope stuffing. They enclose

literature on peace and disarmament inside envelopes when they pay bills, etc. Pursinger said the need for cessation of war is exemplified by the 312 wars on earth in the past 464 years.

The former Ford Foundation fellow also likes the method of sharing with others. He admits it would lower American standards of living, but questions "how much are we willing to sacrifice."

Now completing his doctoral dissertation at the University of Oregon, Pursinger, in his mid-thirties, has authored three books. He is currently an instructor in the Eugene secondary school system.

He spoke in Roseburg Saturday at an AAUW meeting sponsored by the organization's international relations study group chairmaned by Mrs. Cecil Sherwood and Mrs. L. P. Hyde. Two musical numbers by Mrs. Clifford Doman, accompanied by Mrs. Homer Grow, were presented.

SEATTLE — All major Pacific Northwest dam projects will be viewed next week by Col. J.L. Person, acting assistant chief of engineers for civil works, U. S. Army, and R. E. Merriam, assistant director, Bureau of Budget.

The two will address the 23d annual convention of the Inland Empire Waterways Assn. at Yakima Tuesday, Nov. 27.

They will leave later that day for Pasco to fly over McNary Dam and motor to Ice Harbor Dam. Wednesday flights will be made over sites of proposed dams on the Clearwater and middle and lower Snake Rivers and over Grand Coulee Dam and a visit be made to Omak.

A motor trip will be made to Chief Joseph Dam and a flight to Eugene, Ore., for visits to dam sites in the Willamette Valley Thursday. Friday visits will be made to the Eagle Gorge Dam site and the Mud Mountain Dam in Western Washington.
