EUGENE — Nearly 600 employees of local lumber mills were out of work Tuesday, as the result of a strike on the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railroad.

Operators of mills north of Eugene on the SP&S expect another 250 will be added to the total within 24 hours if there is no break in the strike.

The largest mill to shut down was U. S. Plywood's Associated Division in West Eugene where 285 men were laid off Monday night.

Bonneville To Outline \$26 Million Program

PORTLAND — Bonneville Power Administration announced Tuesday that it will outline a \$26 million dollar construction program in the Northwest for 1957 at a meeting with prospective contractors here Friday.

Administrator William A. Pearl said Walter H. Kanzler, special construction assistant to BPA's chief engineer, will explain the building schedule in Oregon, Washington, Northern Idaho and Western Montana.

The schedule includes about 300 miles of right-of-way clearing estimated at \$1,100,000, 250 miles of transmission line construction costing \$1,800,000, 13 new substations and 39 substation additions totaling 2 million dollars.

General and electrical contractors and subcontractors from most of the Western states are expected to attend.
