

Mollet Faces Heavy Pressure Over Two Wars

PARIS (AP)—The Suez fiasco and the unending Algerian war have brought French Premier Guy Mollet under increasing political attack, but most political observers agree the government is not in danger—yet.

The trouble might come when the hills roll in and the budget must be voted in January.

By then, if he makes it, Mollet will have been 12 months in office, a postwar rarity in France. Until now he has weathered the Suez crisis with far less difficulty than British Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden.

The job which has hurt Mollet worst came from 17 deputies in his own Socialist party. Declaring themselves in line with Britain's Labor party in condemning the Suez affair, the 17 protested that the government's "pacification" policy in Algeria had also failed and should be scrapped. They demanded the immediate calling of a special party congress to discuss the next moves.

There has been shipping too from the far left, right and center of the National Assembly.

In closing the meeting the flags were retired while the bugler sounded taps. Then all Scouts and parents joined in a friendship circle and sang the closing song and prayer led by the chaplain.

Western Experts View Clampdown

BERLIN (AP)—Western officials Thursday viewed Russia's clampdown on allied road and rail traffic in and out of West Berlin as part of a general security alert throughout the Soviet satellite empire.

The Kremlin's nervousness over possible spread of independence fever from Hungary and Poland appeared behind demands for the right to search allied trucks and trains for hidden persons.

Copco Granted Permit For Huge Klamath Job

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Hydroelectric Commission Wednesday granted to California Oregon Power Co. a license to construct a hydroelectric project on the Klamath River at the Big Bend site 18 miles southwest of Klamath Falls.

The project includes a 60-foot-high earth fill dam, 11,000 feet of conduit, a 16-foot tunnel 16,000 feet long, and a power plant containing two generating units with a capacity of 4,000 kilowatts each.

The license provides for construction of facilities to protect fish, and for release of enough water to sustain fish life below the reservoir.

The project would cost \$12,500,000, and be in operation by Jan. 1, 1959.

Police Holding Man For Probe Of Boys' Deaths

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Police said they were holding today a 30-year-old former metal worker and gardener for questioning in the slaying of three Chicago schoolboys Oct. 16, 1955.

The man, identified as Richard Elbert of Aurora, Ill., was arrested on a charge of suspicion of vagrancy. Aurora is 40 miles southwest of Chicago.

Detective M. Z. Brandenberger said that during routine questioning of Elbert he kept repeating: "That time I was in the woods."

He was asked what he meant and Brandenberger quoted him: "I've three boys in the woods. It was terrible the way they were killed."

Brandenberger said that when he asked Elbert if he killed the boys — Robert Peterson, 14, John Schuessler, 13, and his brother, Anton Schuessler Jr., 11 — Elbert said: "I don't know." He told officers he was subjected to black-out spells and had been an inmate in mental institutions at Elgin, Ill., and Camarillo, Calif.

Chou En-Lai In Favor Of U. S. Stand On Egypt

MADRAS, India (AP)—Premier Chou En-Lai of Communist China today endorsed the position taken by the United States in the U.N. debate on the Egyptian conflict. He described it as "correct," but then said he was "more concerned" about two other questions of American policy in the Middle East.

"Is the United States trying to take over British and French positions in Egypt and does the United States still support the British and French idea of international control of the Suez Canal?" Chou asked.

He added that he supported the policy of the African-Asian nations on Egypt "for an immediate withdrawal of British-French forces, with the United Nations supervising their withdrawal and helping clean up the canal."

Highways Clear In County Area; Light Show Due

Highways in Douglas County and most of the rest of Oregon remained open Wednesday with a few new light snowfalls reported.

Reports reached state police in Roseburg that U.S. Highway 99 had packed snow in the Siskiyou, Medford, Grants Pass, Eugene and in the Portland area. Snow plows are operating in the Siskiyou, Grants Pass and Portland areas.

Spots of ice were reported in the Salem vicinity.

In Douglas County spots of packed snow were reported from Camas Mountain with eight inches of roadside snow. State police reports indicated the road to be well sand-

On Oregon Highway 38 at Elkton bare spots of ice were reported. The road has also been sanded.

Four inches of new snow was reported on U.S. 101 from Florence to Glenada Hill. The road was reported well sanded.

The only highways in Oregon where chains were required were Green Springs and the Willamette Pass.

The U.S. Weather Bureau at Roseburg said at 10:30 a.m. today that mostly cloudy skies would bring snow flurries Thursday afternoon and scattered snow flurries into Friday.

Arctic Air Hits Northern Plains

Arctic air brought bone-chilling weather to most of the northern Plains and sections of the Rockies Thursday. Temperatures dropped to near 25 below zero in Montana.

The icy Canadian blasts, moving southward and eastward, extended from Eastern Washington to Lake Michigan and southward through Missouri and Oklahoma.

Readings dropped rapidly toward the zero mark from Nebraska through Minnesota and were below zero in most of the Dakotas, Wyoming and Montana. It was 24 below at Glasgow, Mont., early Thursday. Along the leading edge of the cold air temperatures were generally near the 30s from eastern Wisconsin through Oklahoma.

Fairly heavy snow covered the ground in the frigid belt, with up to two feet in the mountain areas of Montana. Nearly a foot of snow was on the ground at Malad City, near the Utah-Idaho border. Falls averaged nearly four inches in most of Montana and Wyoming. Lighter falls were reported in the Dakotas.

Private Plane Overdue On Flight To Ogden Utah

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—A private plane with four aboard disappeared Wednesday on a flight from here to Ogden, Utah, through the heaviest snow storm of the season in southern Idaho and northern Utah.

Aboard the twin-engine, Piper Apache, were John Aram, recently resigned president of the Boise Payette Lumber Co. and now assistant to the president of Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. in Tacoma; Robert B. Hansberger, president of Boise Payette and A. E. Montgomerie, vice president of the Idaho firm. The pilot was I. Lloyd Eason, owner of Pacific Northwest Flying Service here.

said, with groups of investigators having spent considerable time in the East, Midwest and West Coast. Seattle, Portland and Los Angeles are listed as western cities visited, with the probes still going on in Portland and Los Angeles.

In the Midwest, he said, investigations have been made widely including in Kansas, Minnesota and Illinois.

Kennedy, chief counsel for the subcommittee, said he had been traveling between cities where the investigations are being made. He said things were getting to a point where it might be possible for the subcommittee to open hearings in January but "we are aiming at February or March."

The investigation opened here, Kennedy said, as a result of a series of articles printed last spring by The Oregonian charging, among other things, that Teamsters Union officials had brought pressure against city and county officials in an effort to control law enforcement.

This led to a grand jury investigation in which Clyde C. Crosby, international representative of the teamsters here was indicted on several charges including one of extortion; Dist. Atty. William Langley was indicted on a charge of conspiring to permit gambling; and Police Chief Jim Purcell Jr. was indicted on a charge of failure to enforce the law.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Saturday in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary at Myrtle Creek. Interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery at Glendale.

Attorney Says Commies Running Hawaii Union

HONOLULU (AP)—An attorney for a Senate subcommittee said Wednesday a secret witness had testified that men he knew as Communists "are running" the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union in Hawaii.

J. Robert Morris, chief counsel for the Senate Internal Security subcommittee, told newsmen that two former Communists had agreed to testify only at a secret session and if guaranteed anonymity.

Morris quoted one as saying that men he knew as his Communist superiors still "are running the ILWU" in Hawaii.

Eighteen witnesses called to a subcommittee hearing here on communism have refused to testify, invoking the Fifth Amendment. Among the 18 were officers of the ILWU.

Repatriated GI Still Seeks Peace

SEATTLE (AP)—An Illinois farm boy who refused repatriation after his capture by the Reds during the Korean War said last night he was disillusioned in his 3½-year search for "peace" in Communist China.

But Arley Pate, 26, of Carbonade, Ill., declined to give his definition of "peace." He said there was as much "peace" in the United States as there was in China.

The talkative Pate, dressed in a shabby, blue, Chinese-tailored suit, arrived here from Tokyo with Aaron Wilson of Urania, La., another Korean War POW who cast his lot with China when prisoners were exchanged in 1953.

Pate and Wilson, a shy, quiet lad of 25, crossed over the Chinese border at Hong Kong Sunday after telling the Communists they wanted to return home.

Caretaker Seen For Yoncalla's City Dump
