

Sutherlin Grapplers Sink Willamette 49-8

Coach Ralph Dyson's strong Sutherlin wrestling team got off to a winning start this week with a lopsided 49-8 victory over Willamette High of Eugene.

State champion Jerry Perez led the winners to victory and kept his long winning streak intact with an easy pin over his challenger from Willamette, Archie Rowe. Perez needed but 1:33 of the first round for the win.

Durrell Gigeir aided the Bulldogs cause with the best pinning time of the night when he downed his opponent, Darrel Smith, in 30 seconds of the first round.

Another fast pin for Sutherlin came in the opening match which saw 85-pound Gary Madrell dispose of Bill Haase in 1:01 of the initial period.

Eight pins in all were chalked up by the Bulldog grappling unit. Others to win via the count method were John Mustion, Bob Linstead, Jim Seal and Rod Parazoo. The eight points for the losers were counted on a pin and a decision.

The exhibition matches also favored the Sutherlin crew by a 28-9 margin.

Next match for the Bulldogs will be Saturday night when they host the strong Roseburg Indians of Walt Payne.

OSC Cage Team May Be Power

CORVALLIS — Oregon State College, which fell from a Pacific Coast Conference basketball championship in 1955 to a sixth place tie last year, may again become a power this season.

Slats Gill, starting his 29th year as head coach here, has a tall, nearly all-veteran starting lineup and what appears to be deep reserve strength.

Gill will not predict where the team will finish but says it will be much stronger than last season. He feels that in sharpshooting Dave Gambee, a 6-foot 7-inch forward, he has one of the nation's top players.

Gambee, as a sophomore last season, scored 278 points in 16 conference games. He picked up where he left off last weekend, registering 58 points in three games against Brigham Young, Wyoming and Colorado.

Oregon State defeated Brigham Young and Wyoming and lost to Colorado. Gill was, on the whole, satisfied with the team's showing.

Gambee has improved on defense and as a rebounder, and Gill says, "I wouldn't trade him for anyone in the league."

In the three games Gill teamed Gambee with Bob Allord, 6-4, a senior, at forward; Wayne Moss, 6-9, a junior, at center; Ken Hanson, 6-0, a junior, and Jim Anderson, 5-9, a sophomore transfer from Grays Harbor Junior College, at guards.

Allord, the only non-letterman, is counted on to provide the drive for a team whose chief asset is not speed. Hanson drives well, too, and was the team's second best scorer last season.

Much depends on the work of Moss. The rangy performer from Richland, Wash., an outstanding high-jumper on the track team, is a fine rebounder but has not developed into a consistent scorer.

Allord is another good rebounder and a deadly shot, particularly with a whirl from the key. If he continues to show as he did in the Colorado game, when he scored 18 points, he will give Oregon State a double front-line threat, along with Gambee.

Don Pino, 6-2 sophomore from Los Angeles, is pressing hard for a starting job at forward. He scored 22 points against Brigham Young and works well off the backboards.

Gary Goble, 6-8 sophomore from Toulon Lake, Wash., shows consistent improvement and Gill feels he could be a valuable alternate for Moss.

Most of the other top reserves also are from last season's fine freshman team. They include guard Ted Miller, an all-state high school guard from Milwaukee; forwards Don Stamps and Leighton Tuttle and guard Lee Harmon.

Holdover lettermen reserves include Jerry Crimins, who set the Oregon high school single game scoring record of 72 points while playing for Milton Freewater; Gary Haynes and Ralph Carroll, a 6-8 center.

Oregon State gets another good test this weekend when it meets Texas at Corvallis Friday night and Portland University at Eugene Saturday night.



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
