Atomic Weapons Spending Talked By Ike, Strauss

AUGUSTA, Ga. — President Eisenhower Saturday spent an hour and 15 minutes discussing spending plans for development and production of atomic weapons.

The conference with Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, also dealt with planned expenditures for peaceful uses of nuclear power in the fiscal year starting July 1.

Eisenhower and Strauss met at the President's vacation headquarters here for their discussion of the AEC budget for the new year.

Strauss did not see reporters and White House press secretary James C. Hagerty declined to shed any light on how much money the President may ask for the AEC in the budget he will submit to Congress next month.

Other developments at Eisenhower's headquarters included:

1. A formal announcement that the expense of the government air-lift of 15,000 Hungarian refugees to this country will be met through a special White House fund. Of the 25 million dollars in that fund, 100 million is earmarked for refugee relief throughout the world.

2. The President's Citizen Advisers Committee on Foreign Aid will visit 18 countries in carrying out its duty of the administration's mutual security assistance program. The committee, headed by Benjamin Fairless, former chairman of the United States Steel Corp., will leave Washington Dec. 27 and return Feb. 17.

3. Eisenhower, who has been combining work and golf here since Nov. 26, plans to return to Washington next Wednesday or Thursday, Hagerty announced.

4. The President accepted the resignation of Chester K. Davis as assistant secretary of the Army in charge of financial management, effective Dec. 15. Davis is returning to his duties with the Chicago Title and Trust Co.

SALEM, Ore. — George F. Sack, 63-year-old Portland man who is scheduled to die next Friday for the murder of his wife, filed a handwritten notice Friday that he is appealing to the United States Supreme Court.

The notice was filed with the state Supreme Court. The court clerk, F. M. Sercombe, said the notice itself will not delay the execution.

Sercombe said that if Sack actually files the appeal with the U. S. court, then that court would be responsible for postponing the execution.

In other words, he said, the state Supreme Court must do so.

July As Deadline For 6-Year-Old School Age Asked

Oregon county school superintendents favor changing the age limitation for entering first graders. They'd make the deadline July 1, instead of the present Nov. 1 for the six-year-olds. Youngsters who turned six after the proposed July 1 would enter school the following year.

This age switch is stronger than that being discussed at the Oregon Education Assn. representative council session now under way in Portland. The original proposals asks for an Oct. 1 deadline.

Other matters for examination include a bill repealing the institute law. The superintendents oppose it and suggest, instead, a permissive institute called when needed.

Douglas County School Supt. Kenneth B. Barning, attending the council as a delegate for the County School Superintendents Assn. He enumerated other proposals which may go before Oregon legislators:

(1) Transfer of licensing, control and inspection of school buses from the Dept. of Motor Vehicles to the State Department of Education.

(2) State school building aid for distressed districts provided it is outside basic school support; (3) a change of bonding capacities to the present ratios; (4) a measure to increase salaries of State Department of Education employees.

The superintendents' group will take no action at the OEA session on a measure to have county courts divide O & C funds and U.S. Forest Service funds equally between school districts and county governments.

The superintendents conferred recently in Eugene. At that time the group agreed the two top measures to face the Legislature in January concern proposed increase of the basic school support from \$80 to \$120 per census child and the revision of the equalization formula.

Cold Chased From Oregon

Moderating temperatures and rain began chasing a spell of winter weather out of Western Oregon Saturday.

East of the Cascades, though, the weatherman said there was a chance of more light snow or freezing rain.

Rain melted most of the snow at Eugene overnight, and warmer weather turned snow to slush at Salem.

To the south a bright sun was shining at Grants Pass and Klamath Falls, and temperatures were higher. Roseburg had morning fog.

Snow and ice remained in the Portland area where winds from the Columbia Gorge froze the light sprinkles of rain that fell intermittently.

The Weather Bureau said, however, that the wind was expected to shift to southwesterly by Saturday night and more rain would improve conditions.

Roads continued hazardous in many areas, with chains required for safety. But there were no traffic snarls like those of Friday reported.

New Haven Clock Co. Closes Shop

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — The 137-year-old New Haven Clock Co., one of this city's leading industries, closed Friday, throwing 1,000 employees out of work.

The company, which has been in firm which filed a bankruptcy petition just before the closing said earlier that the shut-down would be for "a couple of days" only.

The U.S. District Court is expected to decide on Monday whether it will approve the company's bankruptcy petition.

Hungary Police Disburse Mob Before U.S. Embassy

PORTLAND, Ore. — Hungarian Olympic athletes who have refused to return to their homeland, have been offered a chance to start new lives in Oregon.

Paul Ousley, chairman of the Oregon Committee for Hungarian Refugees, called University of Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman, in Melbourne, Australia, with the U. S. Olympic team, that some 150 Hungarians could be taken care of here.

"Please advise any members of the Hungarian Olympic team who do not wish to return to Communist suppression they will be welcomed in Oregon," the cable said.

Snow Sifts Down, Bitter Cold Hits Rockies, Plains

DENVER — Snow sifted down today on half a dozen Rocky Mountain and Great Plains states from a slow-moving storm, leaving bitter cold in its wake.

Freezing drizzle from the same weather system stung parts of Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma. Snow extended from southern Wyoming through Colorado to western Kansas and western Nebraska and into northern New Mexico.

Montana shivered in sub-zero weather that came with clear skies.

Forecasters expected the storm to move out of southern Wyoming by midday and leave Colorado by nightfall. There may be brief zero weather in the two states before a chinook winds areas east of the Rockies.

Western Colorado — on the Pacific side of the Continental Divide — is due for bitter cold, possible 20 below tonight, the Weather Bureau said.

Early today temperatures in Montana included 21 below at Glasgow, 20 below at Havre and 11 above at Cut Bank, where a chinook was blowing.

At the same time Evanston, Wyo., reported 10 below and Rock Springs 6 below. It was 16 above at Cheyenne.

Roberts Mountain Road To Be Opened Early In January

The opening of the Roberts Mountain section of relocated Highway 99 probably will be early in January.

Frank Morgan, division engineer for the Oregon Highway Dept., said today that completion of the Booth Ranch Bridge is holding up the opening of the new route.

He said that the deck of the bridge was poured early this week, but must cure for about a month before traffic can be allowed over it.

The first course of paving has been laid on the highway between Shelby and the bridge, and guard rails now are being installed along the highway right-of-way. The paving will be adequate for traffic to use in January, although a second course will be laid early next summer.

Morgan remarked that he anticipates use of the highway by traffic "between Jan. 5 and 15."

The route, when completed, will bypass Winston and Dillard.

Myrtle Creek Man Found Guilty Of Drunken Driving

A six-member district court jury found Delbert Benjamin Shelton, 48, Myrtle Creek, guilty of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor late Friday afternoon. Shelton was sentenced to 10 days in jail and fined \$200 including costs by Judge Warren Woodruff.

The case arose out of a citizen's arrest made Sept. 15, by the Rev. J. Elbert Nash, Myrtle Creek, on South Myrtle Road a few miles out of Myrtle Creek. Shelton had pleaded innocent to the charge earlier.

Six witnesses were called to testify in the prosecution. The Rev. Mr. Nash was first called to the stand. In his testimony he told of his being forced off the road by Shelton as they passed by each other.

The second witness called, a passenger in the Rev. Nash's car, the Rev. Mr. Nash, described going back and stopping Shelton until the arrival of state police.

The third and fourth witnesses, Robert B. Lawrence and William L. Packmeyer, testified that they were driving along the road at the time they observed Shelton's driving and his actions while awaiting the state police. The fifth witness was state police officer Gerald Joseph O'Grady who was dispatched to the scene.

The above witnesses, plus Deputy Sheriff James J. Adams, testified that Shelton appeared to be under the influence of liquor.

After the noon recess, the defense called Shelton to the stand. He testified that he suffered dizziness from an injury suffered several years ago when some dynamite blew off near his head. He stated that he had spent three months in a hospital at that time and that every once in a while he would become dizzy and lose control of his senses. He also testified that he had a "hangover" of whiskey before starting the ride on which he was arrested.

The second witness called for the defense was Jim Eckwall, owner of John's Heating and Plumbing, Myrtle Creek, who told the court that he had given Shelton a drink when he was in the latter's brother's shop an hour or so before. He also testified that Shelton did not appear to be drunk either when he arrived or left.

5-Year Prison Term Meted 2 In Riesel Case

NEW YORK — Two men convicted in the acid blinding of labor writer Victor Riesel were sentenced Friday to five years in prison. A third defendant was sentenced to two years.

They were accused specifically on conspiracy to obstruct justice by helping Abe Telvi, 22, flee arrest after he allegedly hurled the acid at Riesel outside a Broadway restaurant April 5. Telvi later was found slain.

Federal Judge William B. Herlands gave the lightest sentence—two years—to Leo Telvi, 26, Abe's brother, who contended he acted out of love for Abe.

The five-year sentences went to Gondolfo Miranti, 37, an alleged "finger man" on the plot, and Domenico Bando, 47, an intermediary. Miranti also was fined \$10,000.

Herlands said Leo Telvi was not involved in the acid throwing and made no money from the assault.

A jury returned the guilty verdicts Thursday after deliberating 88 minutes.
