

Liquor Store Bandit Slain In Third Holdup

TAMPA, Fla. (U)—The third holdup of the same liquor store was once too often for a 23-year-old gunman. Raoul C. Martinez was fatally shot in the face by a policeman, who came out from the store's back room on a prearranged signal from a clerk.

The 17-year-old wife of the gunman said her husband's parents lived in Salinas, Calif. She said she knew nothing of her husband's holdup activities.

Youths Who Found Mail Pouch Given Rewards

LEIGHTON, Ala. (U)—The three Leighton youths who found a missing mail pouch filled with \$44,000 in \$1 bills have received rewards from the Post Office Department.

Ingram Mitchell, 18, who first saw the pouch, was given \$300, while his rabbit-hunting companions, William Mitchell, 15, and Eddie Chambliss 13, received \$250 each.

The pouch had disappeared from a railway shipment 85 days before.

Pioneer Myrtle Creek Woman, 'Aunt Lottie' Weaver, Dies Sunday

A pioneer resident of Myrtle Creek, "Aunt Lottie" Weaver, died Sunday at the age of 91 in a Portland hospital. She had been ill for several weeks.

Mrs. Weaver was born Nov. 7, 1865, in Polk County, Oregon. She moved to the Myrtle Creek area at the age of three with her parents. She and her husband, John, spent a few years in Red Lodge, Mont., where he preceded her in death. Mrs. Weaver later returned to Douglas County.

She is survived by three sons: Jack, Portland; and Allen and Stanford, both of Red Lodge, Mont. The body will be sent there for funeral services and interment.

Mrs. Weaver left Myrtle Creek about a year ago and was living in Portland with her son at the time of her death.

Speed Limit Raised On Harvard Avenue

The Roseburg police are beginning enforcement of new, raised speed limits on West Harvard Avenue, Police Chief Carl E. Rumpf announced Monday. The current speed limit is now 25 mph.

The new speed limit on West Harvard will be 30 mph. from the Douglas Community Hospital property west to a point between Fairhaven and Nebo Streets. From there west to the city limits the speed will be 35 mph, the chief said.

The lone exception is a 20 mph. school zone around Fullerton and St. Joseph's schools from Fairhaven to west of Stanton Street, the chief said. This speed will be in effect during hours of school crossings, he added.

The new speed limits were agreed upon jointly by the city council and the State Board of Speed Control, Salem. New speed limit signs will be posted by the state highway department, the chief said.

Disturbances last Tuesday, including an attack on a white minister who accompanied the Negro students to school, closed the school. The 14 arrests followed within 24 hours.

A Tennessee pro-segregation group said Saturday that nine lawyers, including attorneys general of two states, have agreed to defend them.

The nine Negroes have been out of school for nearly two weeks except for the brief period last Tuesday before the Anderson County School Board ordered the school closed.

Top Attorneys Defend
They remained at home Nov. 28 demanding the board's assurance of their personal safety after a series of incidents of harassment by white students was climaxed by rock and egg throwing.

The Tennessee Federation for Constitutional Government, a pro-segregation organization, announced in Nashville Saturday that the nine lawyers who have agreed to help in the defense include Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard of Texas and Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook of Georgia.

Family Of 6 Dies When Car Plunges Into River

MOOSE, Wyo. (U)—The wheels of their auto, protruding from the icy waters of the Snake River, marked the grave of a family of six.

State patrolman Wood Wormald said the victims all were drowned when their car plunged off an icy highway, probably Saturday night. The tragedy wasn't discovered until noon Sunday when children playing along the river saw the wheels of the overturned vehicle.

The victims were Albert Oakley, 40, of Casper, Wyo.; his wife, Margaret, 37, and their children, James, 12, William, 9, Judy, 4, and Harry, 11 months. Their bodies were surrounded by packages and sacks of groceries they had bought while on a Christmas shopping trip at Jackson.

Five Accidents In Traffic Occur During Weekend

A commercial trailer's spill on its left side about 3 a.m. Monday on U.S. Highway 99 north of Rice Hill was the most serious accident reported this past weekend in Douglas County.

Driver of the truck, Jean Moore Goff, Grants Pass, told state police he had applied the brakes to avoid hitting a horse on the highway when he "lost" the trailer.

The state police stated that merchandise and freight were scattered along the highway for 500 feet at the point where the highway narrows from four to two lanes for northbound traffic.

The police said that Goff had set out flares and cleared a lane for traffic so that the highway remained open.

In a second accident at 5 p.m. Saturday, a car driven by Gunn Junior Caston, flipped and landed in a cow pasture two miles east of Myrtle Creek on Forest Road, state police said.

Caston told the state police that he was driving west when a car ran a stop sign at the Neil Lane intersection, causing him to swerve to avoid collision.

Empty Car Impounded

In a third accident Roseburg city police impounded a driverless car at 11:10 a.m. Sunday after it had rolled from a parking place on Southeast Chadwick across Douglas Avenue into a basement entranceway of the Church of the Nazarene.

James H. Hayden, Box 641, Winston, told the police that he tried to get inside the car to stop it but the doors were locked.

A fourth accident, on Southeast Stephens Street, near the Brockway street intersection resulted when the left front of a car driven by Robert L. Bissnette, 22, Route 2 Box 220, Roseburg, collided with the right rear of a car driven by Herman M. Preston, 43, 1290 SE Balsam Ave., Roseburg.

Roseburg police stated that Bissnette was attempting to pull out from a parking place when the collision occurred and that neither driver apparently saw the other.

\$500 Damages Reported

A fifth weekend accident, report at the Glendale police station Sunday by Charles Cooper reported an estimated \$500 worth of damages to his car, incurred when another automobile backed into his parked car.

Cooper reported that a car driven by Mary Louise Weltz of Roseburg backed into the front of his 1956 sedan in the parking lot at the Dixie-Dog Drive-In at Glendale Junction on Highway 99.

There was no damage to the woman's car, according to the report.

That was the last radio contact with the plane, a tourist flight to Montreal with scheduled stops at Calgary, Regina, Winnipeg and Toronto.

The worst commercial air disaster in Canada occurred on April 8, 1954, when an RCAF training plane crashed into a TCA airliner in flight over Moose Jaw, Sask., killing 37 persons.

Segregation On Buses Draws Law Conference

WASHINGTON (U)—Thirty-three U.S. district attorneys from 14 Southern and border states assembled here today to discuss what they should do about laws in those states requiring racial segregation on buses.

Atty. Gen. Brownell called the conference Nov. 19, a few days after the Supreme Court struck down as a violation of the 14th Amendment such segregation laws in the state of Alabama and the city of Montgomery.

Brownell said today's conference would consider and decide "upon measures most appropriate to secure observance of the Constitution and laws by carriers and all others who may hereafter require segregation of white and colored passengers on common carriers."

"TRAIL'S END"

The film story traces the activities of the pioneer-spirited missionary who one day finds himself summoned to a village to kill off marauding tigers terrorizing the natives and the next day traveling by elephant back, sumpson or aloft into forbidding jungles where aboriginal blood-hunters conceal poison-tipped lances along the trails in search of human blood for their religious sacrifices. The dramatic-documentary introduces tribal peoples who lead a tight rope existence in an interior mountainous domain over-run with leopards, tigers and other predatory wild life.

As the brilliant jungle scenery takes hold of the imagination, heightened by authentic, synchronous sound, one begins to lose himself with the little band of Christian missionaries as they probe deeper and deeper into the jungle.
