

Young British Officer Said To Be Missing

PORT SAID, Egypt — A young British lieutenant who arrested seven Egyptian commandos in a raid on an apartment Monday night was kidnapped from a Port Said street Tuesday by a strongarm hand.

Lt. Gen. Sir Hugh Stockwell, commander of the British-French task force, said he had summoned the local Egyptian governor, Mohammed Riad, and told him to get the officer back. Stockwell said he also had informed Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, commander of the United Nations police force, about the kidnapping. The report came as Egyptian informants charged that the extremist Muslim Brotherhood, outlawed by the Egyptian government two years ago, was planning to embarrass President Nasser by harassing the British-French withdrawal from this Suez Canal Zone port.

Egyptian sources said Nasser intends to rush 2,000 Egyptian police here as soon as the British and French pull out in order to deal with the Brotherhood. The kidnapping of the lieutenant was reported by a small Arab boy who said civilians in a car pulled up and hauled the officer inside. The incident took place in the same street where the British Monday nabbed seven Egyptian commandos hiding in a dentist's apartment.

The missing officer was the one who led the raid on the apartment. A guard left at the apartment arrested one more man Tuesday when he approached the door and sought admittance. A second man who also approached escaped.

Hungarians Launch New Strikes Over Nation

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ably will be affected by the new government measure unless they return before March 31, 1957. This is the amnesty date previously set by the government for persons who have fled from Hungary.

The Workers' Council called the strike to protest the "anti-peoples, anti-workers activities" of the government.

It was not immediately known how effective the strike appeal had proved in the provinces, although there were reports that stoppages had started Monday in some outlying towns.

The government again eluded down with a partial blackout on long distance telephone service outside the country.

The Kadar government replied to the general strike call with new repressive measures, including a decree of martial law, the arrests of some worker leaders and a decree dissolving the Central Workers' council and its regional bodies.

Western reporters, touring Budapest, heard sporadic rifle shots and explosions. These were not explained. Russian patrols roved the streets.

Refugees crossing into Austria from Hungary said the strike appeared to be spreading over the country despite Kadar's martial law decree and possible Soviet reprisals.

Hungarians who left Budapest by train Monday morning said workers all along the route reported they had been alerted to the strike appeal.

Refugees reported that the reorganized security police under the Kadar government were carrying out mass arrests of workers' council members.

PLEADS INNOCENT

Stormy Weather Halts Search For Missing Airliner

VANCOUVER, B.C. — Stormy weather, snow and low clouds forced a temporary halt Tuesday in the aerial search for a Trans-Canada Air Lines transport which vanished Sunday night with 62 persons aboard.

Four search planes were called back because of the weather after having taken off at daylight. Eight other Royal Canadian Air Force planes had remained on the ground because of the hazardous flying conditions.

Eight Americans, some of them former college football players, were among the 50 passengers on the missing four-engine plane. The interruption in the air search Tuesday came after the RCAF searchmaster said a pilot had reported seeing the outline of "what could have been wreckage" on 8,500-foot Mt. Silvertip, about 100 miles east of this west coast city.

Squadron Leader George Sheahan said "the pattern on the ground shows it could have been wreckage." The peak is in the region where the plane reported it was turning back to Vancouver with one engine dead, shortly before its radio went silent.

Search leaders hoped to be able to get the planes into the air during the afternoon. Even before the searchers were called back, small planes were grounded because of dangerously rough flying conditions in the rugged region. One search pilot said after Monday's search that air turbulence was so severe that it "just about put us on our back."

The new snow added to fears that the wreckage might be covered completely. The weather also intensified concern about the fate of any of the 62 who might possibly have survived a crash in the darkness of Sunday night — in what looms as Canada's worst commercial airline disaster.

Search planes had kept in the air until nearly midnight Monday in the hope that some telltale fire or light might be visible. Ground searchers also were sent into the Mt. Silvertip area, but visibility was poor.

7 Negro Students Attend Clinton

CLINTON, Tenn. — Seven Negro students reported peacefully to classes Tuesday at integrated Clinton High School.

One girl, Minnie Ann Dickey, 15, among the eight Negro students still attending the racially torn school, was absent because of illness.

Only a handful of newsmen was on hand as the Negroes entered along with 602 white students. Three carloads of police patrolled the area.

The school reopened Monday after being closed three days last week following an attack by segregationists on a white Baptist minister who escorted six of the Negroes to classes.

Meanwhile, a big legal battle is shaping up for the trial of 14 men and two women accused of interfering with peaceful integration of the school. The trial will open Jan. 28 before U. S. Dist. Judge Robert L. Taylor in Knoxville.

Thomas Gore, Nashville lawyer representing the 14, told Taylor the attorneys general of at least three Southern states and other lawyers would be associated with him in defense of the accused.

SYMPATHY STRIKE

TEL AVIV, Israel — This nation of 1,800,000 stopped work 15 minutes Tuesday in sympathy with workers in Hungary.

Traffic halted for two minutes at the beginning of the demonstration. In the schools, teachers used the 15 minutes to explain the meaning of the observance to their students.

Roseburg High To Participate In Research Plan

Roseburg High School has been selected by the California Test Bureau to participate in a nationwide research program. It is one of several hundred institutions co-operating in the project to obtain norms for achievement and intelligence tests.

Dean of girls Miss Elizabeth Randall is directing the program. A sampling of 70 students, 35 each from the sophomore and senior classes, have been tested with newly-revised achievement and intelligence tests. Results from all states will be combined to establish national norms of pupil performance in the basic skill subjects in addition to scholastic aptitude norms on intelligence tests.

The cost of the standardization program, believed to be the most comprehensive ever undertaken, is borne by the California Test Bureau. It was started in the spring of 1957. Miss Randall said final results would be sent to each school, denoting the work of students in comparison to the norm.

Earth Slides, High Water Close Roads

Lake and No. 42, the Roseburg-Cos Bay Highway, closed when a bridge settled.

The bridge settling was near Camas Valley, a few miles from the community of Remote where, a year ago, a slide killed five members of a family.

Loggers near Tiller were reported to have taken to the tops of at least one truck when the South Umpqua rose swiftly and the water trapped them.

Concern was felt. It was possible to get only within a half mile of there on foot. Sheriff's officers and state police headed for them by boat while a plane from the sheriff's office searched for a landing place near enough to help.

Typical of what happened was the report from the Medford Weather Bureau that late Monday afternoon 4 to 5 inches of snow lay on the ground at Prospect.

From 5 p.m. to 8 a.m. Tuesday, 1.65 inches of rain fell and the ground was bare in the morning.

This rainfall was moderate compared with many. The total at Detroit Dam on the North Santiam in the Cascades had 4.38 inches in 24 hours; McKenzie Bridge had 3.40; Odell Lake near the crest of the Cascades reported 3.41. And the Odell Lake rainfall came on top of 18 inches of snow.

Across the Willamette Valley to the west, a fall of 3.30 inches was measured on Mary's River west of Corvallis.

The Little River, a tributary of the North Umpqua, was reported to have swept away a cabin.

The Siuslaw River, rising rapidly, was reported inching up into the yards of homes at Mapleton.

Forest roads were cut and bridges on secondary routes washed out at many locations.

The Willamette River, taking the flow of mountain streams, was forecast to be at 6.5 feet at Eugene at 2 p.m. Tuesday, well under the 12-foot flood stage. It was to be 14 feet at Coburg at 10 p.m., 3 feet over flood stage. Harrisburg's level was to be 14.5 at 2 a.m. Wednesday, 2.5 over flood stage.

The stage at Jefferson was to be 16 feet at 10 p.m. Tuesday. Flood stage there is 13 feet.

MC Board Studies Instrument Prices

stopped falling in the central valleys. The sheriff also reported that an empty cabin had been reported washed away. Glide correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby was told the G. M. lies summer home 100 yards above U. S. Plywood Corp.'s operation had been evacuated. And the Orville Reese greenhouse was smashed against a fence.

In the Camas Valley area, three families were evacuated, according to Camas Valley School Supt. J. Clyde Akey. He said they were the Mars Southwick, Ford Baker and Lloyd Pope families.

Akey also reported that two busloads of children (about 60) had been sent back home from school as waters continued to rise. He said, however, that 11 had been cut off by high water on the return trip. They are now being housed by Camas Valley families, he said.

Meanwhile in the Dillard school district, Supt. William Bromley reported that 11 children were sent home. They live in the area on Olalla Creek above the covered bridge. Bromley said the administration was concerned about the safety of the bridge.

The Douglas County Water Resources Survey office was a bee-hive as reports were being phoned in to keep tabs on the status of the county's streams. Ben Irving, supervisor of the office, said: "It doesn't look good."

He related that great quantities of rain had caused most of the trouble. A record rainfall for a 24-hour period was set at the Rock Creek rain gauge as 4 inches fell. On Little River, the gauge showed 3 1/4 inches. Steamboat had 3.15 inches.

A report to Irving showed the river gauge on the South Umpqua at Tiller had reached 25.5, exactly the stage it reached last December's flood. It was continuing to rise.

At the juncture of Little River, and the North Umpqua, the river had swollen from 16.05 feet to 18.40 feet in half an hour, Irving said. He said that other streams were also rising at rates of more than a foot an hour.

Water went over some state and county roads.

There was water on Highway 227 above Tiller, on South Myrtle Road, Olalla Road and the upper Non-Parley Road.

Myrtle Creek school children who live at the end of the Days Creek cut off road had to be sent home from school because of flood conditions Al M. Neet, superintendent of schools said.

Neet reported that a bridge washed out and caused water to back up and wash over the road.

Teachers Refuse To Admit Negroes To Federation

ATLANTA — The Atlanta Public School Teachers Assn. voted unanimously last night to withdraw from the American Federation of Teachers at the end of this year rather than admit Negroes to membership.

Announcement of the decision was made by Roger Derthick, association president and brother of Dr. Lawrence Derthick of Chattanooga, Tenn., who recently was appointed U. S. commissioner of education by President Eisenhower.

Derthick said the association unanimously adopted a resolution which will take the 1,853 members out of the national organization Dec. 31, 1956, and end a labor tieup which has existed since 1919.

The action came after both Atlanta Local No. 69 and Fulton County Local No. 183 were told by the American Federation of Teachers, an AFL-CIO affiliate, that they would have to integrate Negroes into their membership or stand expelled as of Dec. 31, 1957.

O. L. Wooten, president of the Fulton County local, said no action was anticipated by the members of his organization — about 500 — until after the 1957 summer convention of the American Federation of Teachers.

Trial Of Johnny Dio Postponed Until Spring

NEW YORK — Trial of Johnny Dio, who the government contends masterminded the acid-blinking of labor writer Victor Riesel, has been postponed until next spring. Selection of a jury was to begin today.

Federal Judge William B. Herlands Monday ordered adjournment of the trial until April 24 over bitter objections of defense counsel on the court's own motion for adjournment. Herlands said the four-month delay was necessary for Dio and three others to get a fair trial. The judge said he wanted public emotions to simmer down.

200 Hungarian Fugitives Take Off Today For New Lives In The United States

MUNICH, Germany — Two hundred fugitives from Communist oppression in Hungary took off Tuesday for new lives in the United States at the start of one of history's most spectacular airlifts.

The group was the first of 10,000 refugees to be flown before Christmas to the United States in 1956.

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Weyerhaeuser To Buy Woodard Co. Operations

COTTAGE GROVE — Plans are underway for the sale of lands, equipment and mills of the W. A. Woodard Lumber Co. to Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., it was announced jointly Tuesday by Walter A. Woodard and George Weyerhaeuser.

The W. A. Woodard Lumber Co., which was chartered in January, 1925, will end its 31-year operation about the close of the year.

The sale price has not been disclosed.

W. A. Woodard Lumber Co. assets, which will be sold, include a sawmill, plywood mill, logging equipment and forest land, the bulk of which has been previously logged.

After the purchase is made, Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. will finish the installation of a bark chipper and other plant improvements now underway and will make other plant changes. The Woodard facilities will commence operation as a part of the Springfield Lumber Division of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co.

Strong Winds Carry Front Into Central Section Of Nation

Strong winds carried a cold wave into the central section of the nation Tuesday.

A storm center, moving eastward across Lake Superior, set off winds with gusts of 45 to more than 60 m.p.h. from the Dakotas to the upper Mississippi Valley.

Icy air from Canada swept in, behind the advancing cold front, southward into Nebraska and Wyoming and eastward into the northern section of the Mississippi Valley.

Temperatures dropped to about zero along the northern border of Montana and North Dakota. In some cases the plunge was close to 30 degrees in a 24-hour period.

The leading edge of the cold wave was expected to push into Michigan, northern Illinois, Indiana and northern Missouri and Kansas by nightfall.

Lows early Tuesday included 2 below at Cut Bank, Mont., 8 above at Bismarck, N.D., and 19 above at Minneapolis-St. Paul.

Rain, with snow at the higher points, hit an area embracing Washington, Oregon, Northern California and Nevada. Brookings, Ore., had 3.61 inches of rain in 24 hours.

A mixture of freezing rain and snow was reported in the belt in the line of the storm, from South Dakota through upper Michigan.

Snow also fell in the colder air zone.

Strong southwesterly winds, as high as 40 m.p.h., were reported during the night in most of the Great Lakes region. There was a warming trend, with readings averaging near 20 degrees higher than Monday from the Great Lakes through South Dakota, Nebraska, Wyoming and Nevada.

However, the warm air was being pushed aside by the frigid Canadian blasts, being powered by northwesterly winds.

In the West, rain fell from northern California through Washington. Scattered showers were reported in the southern part of the mid-Mississippi Valley.

Snow was expected to cover wide areas from the Great Lakes into the Appalachians from northern Pennsylvania to New England. Snowfalls in the foothills of the Adirondacks east of Lake Ontario Monday measured 8 inches at Turin and 5 inches at Roomville.

11-Month-Jail Penalty Meted For Two Deaths

PORTLAND — An Air Force sergeant whose automobile struck a patrol car and killed two policemen last February was sentenced Monday to 11 months in the county jail.

Circuit Judge Carl A. Dahl said the penalty for Donald Vogel, 26, would have been more severe had it not been for Vogel's good service and family record.

An Air Force officer testified in behalf of the sergeant.
