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Anti-Russian Demonstration Reported Tuesday

WARSAW — A wild anti-Russian demonstration was reported Tuesday from the big Polish port city of Stettin (Szczecin). Demonstrators marched on the Soviet consulate, smashed windows and tried to break in.

Communist authorities finally called in troops and "workers' militia"—club-wielding strongarm men—to disperse the crowd.

Official reports blamed the outbreak on "drunken hooligans." But reliable sources in Stettin said it was the outcome of a planned young factory workers' protest against events in Hungary.

The demonstration started early Monday night and continued until midnight. Government papers reported several policemen were beaten up and an undisclosed number of demonstrators arrested.

Stettin, on the Oder River estuary 80 miles northeast of Berlin, was the major port of German Pomerania until Poland seized it after World War II. It reportedly was the scene of shooting—still unconfirmed—between Polish and Soviet troops during Poland's "October revolution" which culminated in Moscow's grant of considerable independence to the government of nationalist Communist Wladyslaw Gomulka.

The demonstration appeared certain to heighten the readiness of Polish authorities to deal with any action which might be thought likely to arouse Soviet suspicions.

AMERICAN GIFT

LONDON — An American gift of 25,000 pounds (\$170,000) was handed to Britain's Royal Air Force Wednesday to help restore a London church shattered by wartime German bombing. The money was contributed by U. S. servicemen and civilians all over the world. It will be used to provide an organ for St. Clement Danes, the RAF church.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Cork and three children have moved to the home formerly owned by the Howard Walkers on Rex Street.

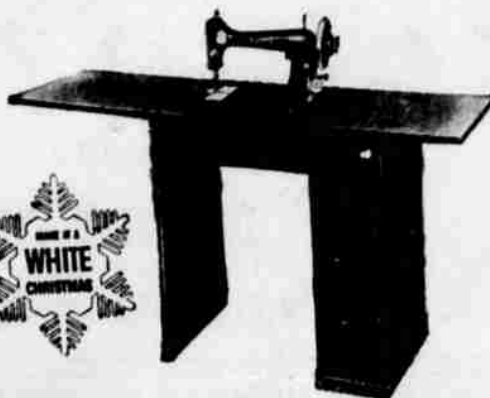
Mrs. Paul K. Ryan of this city left this week for Portland, where she was called by the sudden death of her sister, Mrs. George Stephenson.
