U. S. Plywood, Union Contract Signed At Noon

A new contract between U. S. Plywood Corp. here and Local 2571, Lumber & Sawmill Workers (AFL-CIO), was signed here at noon today to replace one which had expired between the union and the old Youngs Bay Lumber Co. since 1947.

The contract touches only working conditions, not wages, and contains "quite a few departures" from the standard contract, according to Bill Borchert, personnel manager of the company.

Particular emphasis has been placed on job training and the rights of employees to bid, not for jobs, but for job training.

Grievance procedures have been changed, Borchert said. There is also a provision to set up a program for older employees, and a clause for rehabilitation in industrial accident and occupational disease cases.

The contract covers about 130 employees of the firm.

Signing the contract were: Ray Purcival, president of the local; Cal Stroup and Harold Jellison, both members of the union negotiating committee; Ted Prusia and Bud Hughes, representing the Willamette Valley District Council of the union; and George French, general manager of the Roseburg plant and Borchert.

Warsaw Reports New Clash In City Of Stettin

WARSAW, Poland — Warsaw newspapers today reported a new clash between Polish and "hooligans" in the port city of Stettin.

The papers said a "gang" gathered outside a restaurant in Stettin (Szczecin) last night and tried to block the street in order to "start a new adventure." They added that police wielding clubs broke up the crowd in a few minutes.

School Board To Pursue Application For Tract

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near the Rosewood Homes, Fullerton School and the parochial school.

The information brought up the temper of board members, because the work already has been done.

Chairman Harold Hoyt commented that he believes the parish and housing authority should have consulted the board before undertaking the project if they wished the school district to share in the \$1,000 cost.

The project consisted of opening a ditch in the area and burning some brush. The request was tabled until the board can inspect work that was done.

Davis also told the board that the Douglas County Road Dept. is considering widening Garden Valley Road from the Veterans Hospital to Brown's Bridge, which crosses the North Umpqua River.

The county is seeking an additional 10-foot right of way on each side of the road, and part of the roadside strip runs through the Riverside School grounds.

The board took no action on the county request until it can be determined who will bear the cost of moving a fence along Garden Valley Road. The district put in the fence to prevent children from running into the road.

The board acted on a host of minor business during a four-hour session. Even in that time, it was unable to get through the complete agenda, so another meeting was set up for next Thursday night to replace the regular board meeting, which would have fallen on Dec. 20.

The action included:

1. A denial to ask Herbert D. Quine, administrator of the school insurance program, to come to the next board meeting to outline the present policy of distributing insurance among the various agencies in Roseburg.
2. Okay of a transfer of about \$15,000 from the general fund to the school building fund to fill out a \$18,750 payment to Murphy Construction Co., Hucrest School contractor. The money will be replaced in the general fund from cash coming in a federal aid grant.
3. Authorization for Supr. M. C. Deiler to attend a curriculum study conference to be sponsored by the State Dept. of Education Jan. 15-18.
4. A report by Richard Buss, director of vocational and adult education on a state plan for practical nurse training at the local school district level.
5. Appointment of Deiler and Davis to be official school district representatives in the purchase of surplus government property.
6. Approval of contracts with Leonard Squires, Thomas K. Swinford, Carl S. Yout, Don Starmer and Ed Wyatt as adult education teachers.
7. Agreement to allow Gary and Darrell Welch to continue to attend Roseburg High School, although their parents will move from the district.

Council Studies Franchise With Water Company

The Roseburg City Council, acting as a committee of the whole, went over the proposal of the Oregon Water Corp. Wednesday night in negotiations to arrive at a franchise agreement between the city and company.

The company, according to City Manager George Farrell, has indicated an offer to pay the city 1 per cent on gross receipts within the city. The city has yet to make an official counter proposal, although it was indicated that the city will attempt a higher assessment against the company.

The council decided in its meeting to keep its 10-year limit on franchises of this type. The company, Farrell said, had sought a 20-year franchise.

Other points of disagreement, such as the fire plugs which the city wants to return to the company and fees charged for fire service, were discussed.

The matter has been referred to City Attorney Paul E. Geddes. Farrell said, for him to arrange a meeting with company attorneys on the franchise.

Eisenhower Will Write Bulganin Note On Hungary

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower probably will write to Russian Premier Bulganin shortly urging action on withdrawal of Soviet troops from Hungary as a step toward brightening prospects for talks on arms reduction.

U.S. officials say the use of Russian troops to smash anti-Moscow revolts in Hungary has created a bad climate for disarmament talks expected to begin in the United Nations early next year.

Foreign policy matters are prominent on the list of problems facing Eisenhower on his scheduled return to the capital late today from a vacation at Atlanta, Ga.

Current attention focuses on his talks beginning Sunday with Prime Minister Nehru of India. The climate for those talks appeared to have been improved by the disclosure yesterday that Ambassador V. K. Krishna Menon will not be a member of Nehru's official party.

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handle the Green sewer discharge.

Tentatively, he said, it's contemplated that the district would pay the city a minimum of \$3,000 a year, including \$2,000 as a flat usage fee. Over the \$2,000, he said, the district would pay the city \$15 per million gallons of effluent with the first \$1,000 charged automatically.

Attorneys for the district are still going over fine points of the proposed contract. English pointed out that the contract would have to be approved by the City Council and sanitary district board of directors before becoming effective.

The district's consulting engineers have approved the proposal.

Engdahl also revealed that the district has applied for \$13,000 in federal aid in construction of the sewer system. The money is administered through the State Dept. of Health. He pointed out that if the district is granted the money, the proposed bond issue would be reduced by that amount.

Nehru Reports 25,000 Hungarians Were Killed

NEW DELHI, India — Prime Minister Nehru said today Indian diplomats who recently visited Hungary reported that about 25,000 Hungarians and 7,000 Russians were killed in the anti-Soviet revolt.

This was the first estimate of Russian casualties in the Soviet tank and troop action to crush the Hungarian rebellion against communism. Previous unofficial estimates of Hungarians killed have ranged between 20,000 and 30,000.

Reporting to Parliament on Hungary, Nehru said J. N. Khowla, Indian minister to Czechoslovakia, and K. P. S. Menon, ambassador to Moscow and Budapest, reported to him that what happened was a "revolution and a national one." He added that Russian intervention "was not justified."

Winter Storms Blanket Midwest With Snow

In a preliminary report made about 10:45 a.m. the deputies did not state the probable cause of death.

The body was located on the road leading up to Mr. Scott's camp and was initially reported to the state police by Bob Weaver.

A second death was reported Thursday morning. Coroner L. L. Powers said that a coroner's deputy and a sheriff's deputy were investigating the reported death of a month-old baby at Idlewild Park. No further information was available immediately.

that the county is studying feasibility of running a sewer line some 1,800 feet from the county shops at Rifle Range Road down Diamond Lake Boulevard to intercept a city sewer.

Davis said that by pumping, the school district may be able to connect to the sewer spur near the county shops. It would take a 2,500 line to connect. But he pointed out that the ground near Eastwood is unsuited for installation of a drain field and septic tank. The new school is located on a plot of ground near the southeast corner of Ramp Road and Douglas Avenue.

There was no estimate of cost. Davis pointed out that the county's plans haven't yet jelled with the city, which would have to authorize the connection.

The subject of the sewer line came up while the board was questioning Architect Lyle Glenn on plans for the school building. Some changes in the building were discussed. M. E. Myers, consulting mechanical and electrical engineer from Eugene, also talked with the board regarding school plans.
