Unemployment Increased During November, Report

WASHINGTON — The government reported Monday that the number of Americans holding jobs in November declined by 900,000 and that the number of unemployed increased by 550,000.

A joint report by the Commerce and Labor departments said the decline in employment and increase in unemployment were due to a cold weather lag in farming and other outdoor work.

But the report added that non-farm employment "failed to show its usual November pick up." There had been a sizable non-farm jobs jump in October.

The combined report gave this picture: Employment—The number of November job holders was 65,368,900, down 906,000 from October. This is still a record for the month of November and 461,000 more than were employed in November last year.

Unemployment—The jobless total was 2,463,000, an increase of 554,000 from October and 65,000 more than in November last year. The employment decline and unemployment rise were the largest November changes in both categories in at least 10 years.

Further Boost In Prices Among Trade Forecasts

WASHINGTON — Cautious predictions of a "moderately" better 1957 business year — and further price increases — emerged from a weekend meeting of National Trade Assn. executives here.

But a summarizing statement said, "Serious inflation is wholly improbable — unless the international situation deteriorates materially."

The appraisals were made at a business outlook forum held by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber's chief economist, Dr. Emerson Schmidt, said the combined viewpoint is one of "mild, cautious optimism."

Almost all the speakers predicted further price increases and some foresaw softness in their own economic picture.

Schmidt said it is possible that "certain stresses and strains may begin to develop" in 1957 and "a look ahead must be more guarded than usually."

He said the American business boom which began in 1954 is "getting older but not necessarily tired."

Meat, Dumplings Win Grand Prize For Trapper's Wife

NEW YORK — Old-fashioned meat and dumplings won a \$25,000 grand prize and the title of Mrs. Hildreth H. Hatheway of Santa Barbara, Calif., wife of a government trapper.

Second prize of \$5,000 in the eighth annual Pillsbury "bakeoff" went to a junior contestant, Natalie R. Riggin, 15-year-old farm girl of Olympia, Wash., for her original "Hoot-Owl Cookies."

Top award in the bride's division went to Mrs. Raymond E. Myers of Milan, Ill., for "Easy Cheesy Buns," a no-knead roll flavored with American cheese. She won \$3,000 for her recipe.

Top junior prize of \$3,000 went to the youngest contestant in the recipe and baking contest, Irene Korrell, 12-year-old seventh grader of Frederick, Md., for her "Maple-Hi-Light Fudge Cake," featuring a fluffy frosting made with ample syrup.

Leading senior contestant, also winning \$3,000, was Mrs. Leland E. Ross of Roscommon, Mich. Her winning entry was a recipe for "Starlight Sugar Crisp," an original cookie recipe.

The \$25,000 prize-winning recipe is called "California Casserole." It is made by browning floured veal or beef, adding an easy soup gravy and baking it in the oven with herb-seasoned dumplings on top. It is served with a sauce made from sour cream and chicken soup.

This is the first time in the eight-year history of the bakeoffs that a main dish has won the grand prize. In other years the top money went to cakes, pies or desserts.

Storm Crumples Block Building

BEVERLY, Wash. — Winds estimated by residents at 80 miles an hour crumpled concrete block buildings Sunday night and Monday at Beverly and Priest Rapids, causing damage estimated at \$100,000.

The wind demolished a concrete block apartment building here, unroofed a combination and overturned six trailers.

At the Priest Rapids damsite, 8 miles down the Columbia River from Beverly, the wind collapsed a recreation hall and motel and wrecked the top story of a barracks building.

The storm stopped all work Monday by several hundred employees of Merritt-Chapman & Scott, the contractor building Priest Rapids Dam.

No injuries were reported, but some persons had narrow escapes. Some residents spent Sunday night in cars and trucks after buildings were demolished.
