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Farmers' Rejection Of Corn Control Program Opens Door For Broad Review Of Plans

WASHINGTON — Farmers' rejection of a new corn control program favored by Secretary of Agriculture Benson appeared today to have opened the door for a broad and political - studied congressional review of federal farm programs.

In one of five separate crop referendums this week, corn growers in an designated commercial area voted in effect to stick with an old program authorized in 1938 — even with its widely admitted shortcomings.

Some doubtless voted against the new Benson proposal on the basis of promises of Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), a sharp critic of the secretary, that he would sponsor new legislation next year to eliminate weaknesses of the old plan.

False Hopes Fed To Hungary, Says Sen. Neuberger

HERMISTON, Ore. — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) called Monday for a congressional investigation of the role of American propaganda in what he termed "feeding false hopes" to Hungary's fight for freedom from Soviet domination.

In a speech prepared for delivery here, Neuberger said the Voice of America and privately-owned Radio Free Europe have broadcast to the satellite states for four years "statements of our top leaders about 'liberation' and 'rollbacks.'"

"It should hardly come as a surprise if brave and desperate anti-Communists in Hungary took these statements to reflect an actual American policy, not merely words," he said, "and if so, our phrase-makers must assume a share of responsibility for the terrible bloodshed and tragedies of the Hungarians' battle for national liberation."

Neuberger didn't criticize the decision not to intervene militarily, saying it couldn't have been done without facing war with Russia.

"But our national spokesmen must have known all along that we could not support such revolts against Soviet military repression," he said, "and should have bent over backward to avoid giving false impressions to brave people behind the Iron Curtain."

Six Identified As Communist Party Members

SAN FRANCISCO — In two days of San Francisco hearings, a House subcommittee on un-American activities identified six leaders of the American Committee for Protection of the Foreign Born as Communist party members.

Rep. Clyde Doyle (D-Calif.), subcommittee chairman, said the ACPFB's purpose was to wipe out the safeguards against Communist conspiracy operations provided by the nation's security laws.

The subcommittee recommended at the close of the hearings here last night that the Department of Justice start denaturalization action against Victor Arnautoff, Stanford University art professor since 1937, on the ground that he has been identified as a Communist. The artist, who said he is on sabbatical leave, was identified as an active sponsor of the foreign born group.

Arnautoff muttered, "I still resent the pumpkin papers" when a photograph of his painting of Vice President Nixon holding a pumpkin and titled "Dick McSmear" was entered in evidence.

Indictments Against Five Policemen Dropped

PORTLAND — Perjury indictments were dismissed Tuesday against five Portland policemen named by last summer's grand jury in its vice investigation.

The men were re-indicted last week on misdemeanor counts of swearing falsely. The state attorney general's office, handling the vice investigation, moved for dismissal of the perjury charges which had stemmed from an investigation of reports of bribery.

NAMES ASSISTANT

PORTLAND — Gov.-elect Robert D. Holmes Tuesday named Miss Margaret (Peg) Clarke as a research assistant for his office.

Miss Clarke, now an English instructor at Portland State College, formerly was executive secretary of the Democratic Party of Oregon.

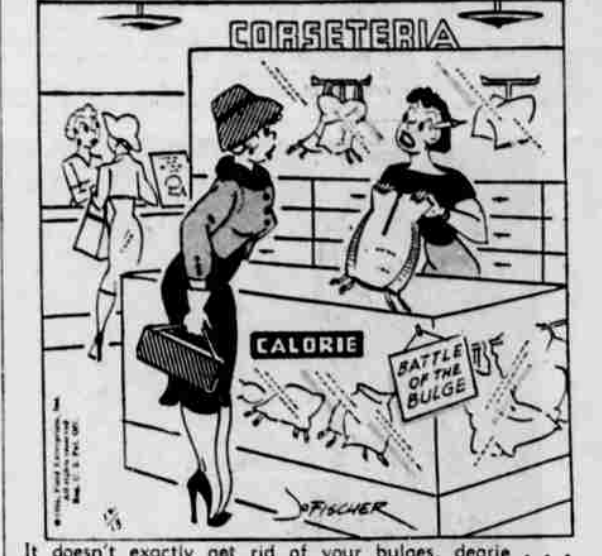
