Coaches are Don White for the jayvees, Bunny Easter for the sophomores and George Ferrell Jr., who will guide the freshman reins.

White's JV crew already has two games under its belt and has won one while losing the other on a close decision. They defeated Reedsport and lost to Douglas High.

Several of the lads have previous jayvee or freshman experience. One lad, Gene Endicott, who is only a freshman, has been moved up to the faster unit because of his fine ability.

The Douglas High Jayvees jumped off to a 13-8 first period lead against the Camas Valley Hornets Wednesday night, but lost out in the second period when Coach Bob Williams inserted his No. 2 platoon, consisting of sophomores, and dropped behind 31-25 at halftime.

The Trojan Jayvees were never able to recover. Both teams played on even terms during the third period and the visiting Hornets sailed the game away in the final period by outscoring the host quint 16-9 for the 59-45 victory.

It was forward Bob McClellan who led the second frame surge by the Hornets. The flashy playmaker counted 12 of the 22 Camas Valley points. Teammate Byron Baker aided the cause with several fantastic howitzers from the outside during the drive.

In the second half of play it was Mack McClellan who sparked the Camas Valley scoring parade. The diminutive guard totaled 12 counters for the night's action with 10 of them coming in the second half of play.

Bob McClellan captured high scoring honors for the session with his 19-point output. Guard Terry Counts was top point maker for the losers with 11.

The Douglas junior varsity, lost the ball 21 times on either bad passes or from floor violations which could have made a big difference in the final score.

Next game for the Trojan juniors will be Saturday night when they host the Cottage Grove counterparts in a 5:30 p.m. billing.

Three plays later UCLA had its first touchdown and was on the way to a 13-9 victory.

Like to hear some more? Well, there was the punt in the Catawba-Appalachian game that bounced down field, was touched by a member of the kicking team but never was blown dead. Willie Campagna of Catawba watched the Appalachian men walk away, then picked up the ball and started to walk away himself.

Pretty soon he started to run. Before he stopped he had run 70 yards for a touchdown that won the game 14-7.

The two quarterbacks who crashed the club are Tommy Gilmer of Pacific Lutheran and Jimmy Johnson of Lewis and Clark, both capable of operating as halfbacks. Johnson was a slick deceiver in the split-T, able to run and pass as well as direct his team's attack.

The same goes for Gilmer, one of the nation's finest passers. Along with his other abilities is the left-footed dropkick which brought the Lutes their placement points.
