

Missing Curtin Girl Located, Returned Home

Marilyn Elwood, the 13-year-old girl who has been missing from her home at Curtin since Saturday, was returned home about 7:30 p.m. today, state police learned.

In a call to the Roseburg office of the state police, S. E. Elwood, the girl's father, said that he had brought her home from friends at Smith River a short time before.

Marilyn left home Saturday night, state police Sgt. F. A. Holley said, after an alleged disagreement with her parents about going to a movie. When she left, he added, she took her clothes with her along with a sleeping bag.

The search got underway for the girl on Sunday. Dallas J. Bennett, Dixonville, went to the Curtin area Sunday night with two bloodhounds to track Marilyn's course through the woods in the Curtin area.

According to Bennett the girl's path was traced through the woods and hills to a point where it came back to a road. There it ended.

Monday a group of loggers "beat the brush" for the girl and a state police investigation got underway in earnest. The search covered a large wooded area near Curtin.

A check was begun, Sgt. Holley said, to see if the girl had gone to stay with relatives living in Lebanon, Reedsport and other points. Other calls were made to try to locate the girl, he added.

The girl was finally located at a spot about eight miles from Curtin at the home of a friend.

Fate Of Dr. Otto John Up To Federal Judges

KARLSRUHE, Germany — Five federal judges — four men and a woman — Tuesday began pondering the fate of Dr. Otto John, accused of defecting to the Communist East.

The court recessed to consider the case after defense counsel asked that the former West German security chief be found innocent.

John, formally charged with having treasonable relations with the Communists and revealing state secrets maintained he was innocent throughout the six-week trial.

The court announced that it would reconvene on Saturday when a verdict is expected.

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and Lookingglass. (In its general survey, the bureau listed Olalla Creek for a possible dam site.)

"We had in mind a preliminary study of the Olalla area from the standpoint of irrigation and any flood control benefits which might accrue," McAllister said.

He asked for reactions of the people in the area to the survey, which might lead eventually to a storage. Those people from the area in attendance were unanimous in favor of the survey. Leo Meyer summed it up: "I'd like to see them go right ahead," he said.

J. Roland Parker, Douglas County agricultural agent said: "It will improve the possibilities of the area 1,000 per cent."

The committee then adopted a recommendation to urge the bureau to go ahead with the study. It was also recommended that farm organizations of the area and the State Water Resources Board send letters of approval to the bureau.

In the letter to the committee from the bureau, McAllister reported that if interest warrants, the study will begin by February and be completed by November of 1957, if it is approved by the Washington office.

Ben B. Irving, chairman of the committee, announced that a second study for water conservation was also in the contemplation stage.

He said the city of Sutherlin is making plans to ask for a survey of the Sutherlin Creek basin under the terms of the Small Watershed Act for protection and flood prevention.

Masters Elwin King of Fair Oaks Grange and Mrs. Leonard Haslam of the Sutherlin Grange said their granges were going to co-sponsor a project request with the city of Sutherlin. On request from the two, the advisory committee also added its strength in sponsoring the survey.

Under the terms of the act, the Soil Conservation Survey would handle the survey. Feasibility studies could follow and, if they were found acceptable, the federal government could build impoundments and take care of stream clearance.

However, residents of the area must make local arrangements for easements and rights-of-way and for maintenance of the system after construction is completed, according to Parker.

As a final action of council business the finance committee with councilman George Louma as spokesman posed several questions to City Manager George Farrell about bills facing the city. The council then voted the bills be paid as recommended.

In other council action the committee for assessments reported and five liquor licenses were renewed. See other stories.

Three persons were appointed as budget board members by the Days Creek School Board Monday night.

Persons appointed to serve three-year terms were Lyle Jones, Francis Lynn and Roy Matthews. They will serve on the board with Carl Hill and Earl Ashebaugh. Next budget board meetings are set for Jan. 18 and 21.

Recommendations were made to the budget board concerning salaries for the positions of clerk, custodian, office secretary and bus drivers. The board decided to keep teachers on the present salary schedule. A new salary schedule was put into effect by the school district last year.

The school board offered the present superintendent — principal, Marlen D. Yoder, a three-year contract with a salary to be determined annually. Yoder was authorized to sign statements for government surplus purchases.

Among other business transacted by the board was the approval of a teaching contract for Mrs. Gert Moore, who is teaching the fourth grade in place of Tom Bell. He resigned to take a position at the Hanna Nickel Mine, Mrs. Moore, who resides at Days Creek with her husband, Bill, and their four children, has been acting as a substitute teacher in the grade school for several years.

Egyptian Police Detachment Due In Port Said

PORT SAID, Egypt — A 350-man Egyptian police detachment was due in Port Said today to help U.N. troops keep order during the departure of the last British and French forces.

The Egyptians are the vanguard of more than 1,000 police coming to place the Suez Canal's northern gateway once more under the rule of President Nasser's Cairo government.

The U.N. Emergency Force intends to pull out as soon as possible after the British and French, leaving Port Said's administration strictly to the Egyptians.

Indications pointed to the complete withdrawal of British and French troops by tomorrow or Thursday. The rapidly dwindling garrison was barricaded behind barbed wire at the docks. The Egyptians underground kept up its harassment, killing a French Foreign Legionnaire as he boarded ship.

A wrangle over who would do the job threatened to delay clearing the debris - blocked canal. The salvage fleet of the British and French have massed at Port Said apparently will sail with the last of the British-French troops unless their crews are guaranteed protection by U.N. forces.

He was one of two trustees who escaped from the prison farm Sunday. The other, Benjamin T. Gaul, 47, was captured by prison guards Monday morning in the same area where Simonsen gave himself up.

Gaul was sentenced in Marion County to 2½ years for burglary. Simonsen, who was serving three years for forgery in Umatilla County, had been granted a parole three months ago, and was waiting for a job before being released.

European Army Will Not Be Reduced, Says Dulles

pose, Dulles said. The implication was that the invitation would go out soon.

2. The United States stands by its offer of Aug. 26, 1955, to underwrite a permanent peace settlement between Israel and the Arab states but tensions over the Suez situation and the British-French and Israeli clashes with Egypt have dimmed the prospects for any early peace settlement.

3. A reply from President Eisenhower to disarmament proposals put forth by Soviet Premier Bulganin on Nov. 17 is now being considered by a NATO committee. The indication is that the message will be sent soon.

4. Cooperation among the United States, Britain and France was much improved by last week's NATO meeting at Paris but scars remain as a result of the split over the Middle East. The best way to cover them over now is to work together on future problems, he said.

5. The United States remains firmly opposed to admitting Communist China to the United Nations. Dulles made this comment when asked about Soviet proposals for getting Communist China into the U.N.

6. The United States is interested in seeing whether any mutually acceptable program to assist the growing independence of Poland can be worked out with the Polish government. But Dulles said he is unaware of any project for what a questionnaire called "a little Marshall Plan" for Western Europe.

Wave Of Arctic Air Rolls Over Midwest Areas

A wave of arctic air rolled into the Midwest Tuesday and spread out into the East.

Temperatures plunged to lows of 31 below zero at Hibbing, Minn., to -20 at Duluth, Minn., to -13 at Fargo, N.D., to -11 at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., and to -5 at Green Bay and Madison, Wis.

As the cold front moved eastward rain changed to snow in an area that extended from Pennsylvania northward across New York into parts of New England.

But a heavy fog that had enveloped much of the Northeast began to thin out.

Forecasters issued cold wave warnings for northern New England and upstate New York. The Weather Bureau said "zero or lower" temperatures are expected Tuesday night and early Wednesday in those sections, and it added that freezing conditions will reach southward into Virginia.

A mixture of rain, snow and freezing rain slicked highways in Texas along a line that stretched from the Fort Worth-Dallas region to El Paso. Heavy rains hit the Texas coast.
