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ICC Postpones Raise

In Railway Express Rates
WASHINGTON — The Interstate Commerce Commission said Tuesday the Railway Express Agency has voluntarily put off an authorized 4 per cent increase in charges on less than carload traffic, pending further study of the hike by ICC.
A three-man ICC division last Friday announced it had voted not to interfere with the increase and would permit it to become effective Monday, Dec. 17.
However, shipper organizations and the Agriculture Department which had sought to block the increase, requested reconsideration by the full 11-man commission. The express agency then said it would postpone the effective date to Dec. 27 to allow time for the full commission to act.

Firm Restrained From Using Ike's Name In Selling

NEW YORK — A federal judge has restrained a brokerage firm from linking President Eisenhower's name with a food company headed by his former mess sergeant, Marty Snyder.
Federal Judge Edmund L. Palmieri issued a temporary restraining order against the Burd, Jacquin and Costa, Inc., brokerage firm. Palmieri acted after the Securities and Exchange Commission alleged that salesmen of the firm promoted stock by telephone, using the President's name.
"President Eisenhower would do everything in his power to see that Sgt. Marty Snyder's beef stew would be used by the armed services," was typical, the SEC said, of the telephoned sales pitches used.
The SEC alleged also that purchasers of stock in the Sergeant Marty Snyder Foods, Inc. firm were deceived and defrauded by claims that Eisenhower endorsed the product and that the firm's products were being sold to the government.

Pan America Gets Permit From L.A. Great Circle Route

WASHINGTON — A Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) examiner Tuesday recommended that Pan American World Airways be authorized to fly nonstop over the Great Circle route from Los Angeles and San Francisco to Tokyo.
Both the CAB and President Eisenhower must approve the recommendation before it becomes effective.
Examiner William F. Cusick denied Pan American's application to fly the Great Circle route to Tokyo from Portland and Seattle. Northwest Airlines now flies this route and is the only line flying the Great Circle.
Pan American currently flies from Los Angeles and San Francisco to Tokyo over the longer southern route via Honolulu.
Cusick recommended that Pan American's certificate extend until April 10, 1962, with authorization to carry mail, passengers and freight.
CAB has turned down one application by Pan American for a Great Circle certificate. This year, however, Eisenhower asked the board for a new ruling in the light of "recent developments." This was taken as a reference to Pan American's acquisition of DC7 planes which could fly nonstop over the shorter route.
At San Francisco, executive vice president Clarence M. Young said Pan American was "most unhappy" about the examiner's denial of the application to fly the Great Circle Route out of Portland and Seattle.
"Assuredly we will continue to seek full traffic rights on the North Pacific route to the Orient at Seattle, which is the obvious gateway to all such Great Circle operations," Young said.

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American Professor, Wife Give Up U. S. Citizenship To Make Home In Russia

MOSCOW — Tass announced Tuesday a St. Louis University professor and his wife have renounced their American citizenship to live and work in the Soviet Union.
They were identified as Prof. O. S. Makar, 47, a specialist in geodesy and photogrammetry, the science of photographic map-making, and his wife, Alexandra. Makar was born in the Russian Ukraine.
Quoting the Stockholm Communist newspaper Ny Dag, the Soviet news agency said the couple announced their decision to abandon their American citizenship and seek Soviet citizenship in a letter mailed to the U.S. embassy in Stockholm before they boarded a plane for Moscow Saturday.
"He was reported to have said 'the best conditions for scientific research exist in the Soviet Union, and that is why I want to continue my work there.'"

Irish Official Tells Of Attack By Army Of IRA

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — An unscheduled drama was added last night to a television address Northern Ireland's Prime Minister made against attacks by the Irish Republican Army.
As the official, Lord Brookeborough, stepped before the cameras in London he was handed an urgent telegram. He read the message and then told his TV audience: "An attack on a patrol car is going on at the very moment I speak to you."
The engagement between police and Irish Republican extremists was fought near Lisnakea, only a few miles from the Prime Minister's home. A short time later a bomb exploded beside a police station at Newtown Butler, also near the Brookeborough home. It caused little damage.
The attacks were the latest in a fresh series of raids blamed on the outlawed IRA. In the ambush on the patrol car, one policeman suffered two bullet wounds in the leg. Two of about a dozen face-blackened raiders were captured.

Board Again Rules Communist Party Under Moscow Rule

WASHINGTON — The Subversive Activities Control Board (SACB) ruled for a second time Tuesday that the U.S. Communist Party is under control of Moscow.
After the board's first ruling in 1953, a Supreme Court decision last April sent the case back to the board for further proceedings.
In accordance with the Supreme Court decision, the board eliminated from the record the testimony of three government witnesses. Then it decided the evidence still supported its original finding of April 30, 1953.
The expunged testimony was given by the late Paul Crough, Harvey Matusow and Manning Johnson.
In sending the case back, the Supreme Court said it wanted to be sure the board did not rely on "tainted" evidence.
It directed the board to either eliminate the testimony of Crough, Matusow and Johnson or to give Communist Party attorneys a chance to seek to discredit it.

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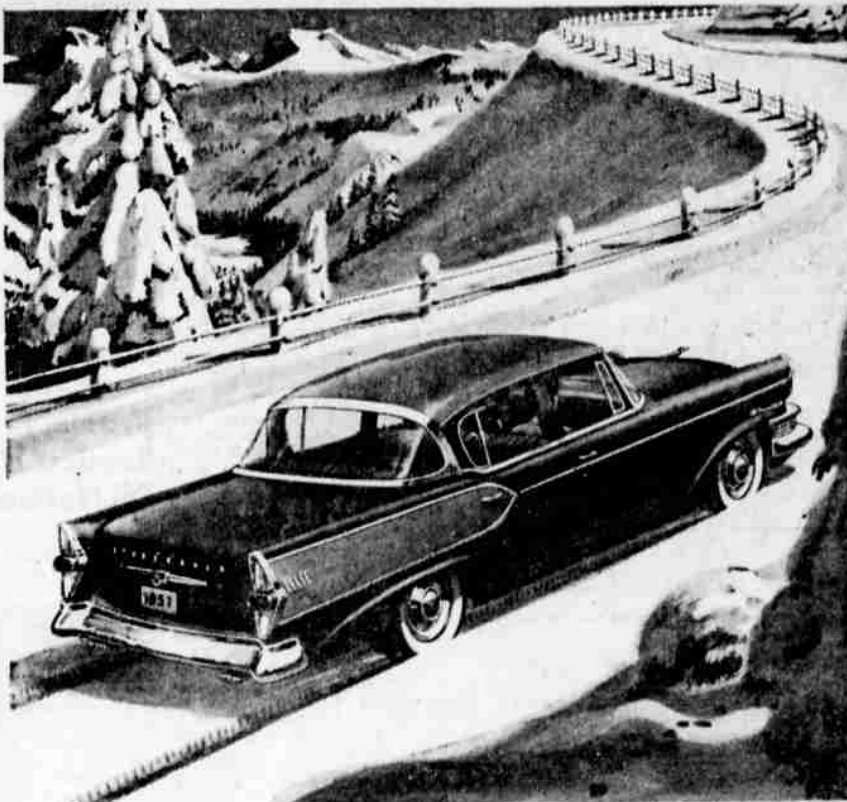
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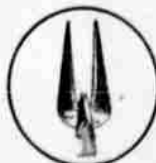
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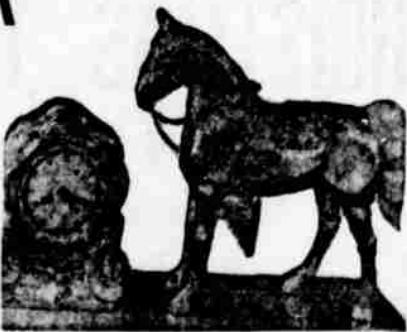
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
