

Kadar Accuses Nixon Of Staging Theatrical Visit

BUDAPEST — The newspaper of Premier Janos Kadar's Communist Party accused Vice President Richard M. Nixon Saturday of making a "theatrical staged" visit to Austria to encourage refugees to flee Hungary.

At the same time the paper, *Nepszabas*, charged Austria violated its neutrality by permitting Nixon to visit refugee camps while it allegedly refused the same permission to Hungarian government representatives.

The new attack on Nixon came as most of Budapest's 1½ million people appeared to be downtown in the throes of Christmas shopping. Public transport was so crowded some persons rode on the roofs of buses.

A ban on the sale of alcoholic liquor, imposed during last week's general strike, was partly lifted. Hungarians were permitted to buy bottles to take home. Drinking in bars and restaurants still was forbidden.

lems next Wednesday or Thursday somewhere in the vicinity of Camp Kilmer, N.J., the principal reception center. This meeting will complete the investigation and the report will be placed in Eisenhower's hands before he meets with congressional leaders at the end of the month.

Eisenhower has promised Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab the United States will do everything in its power to help solve the problem created by the movement of refugees into Austria. A high official source said Wednesday Nixon believes the United States should admit more than the 21,500 it has agreed to receive.

The vice president is flying home via Iceland, where the big U.S. air base was a recent political issue.

Nixon is expected to return to Washington Monday morning.

In Washington, Rep. Omar Burleson (D-Tex.) protested reports that the United States would double the number of Hungarian refugees to be admitted. He declared it was a serious mistake to admit any.

Burleson, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, added he had reports that many of the refugees admitted are young men "who should remain in their homeland to fight for its freedom."

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California Girl Suffers Injuries In Upset Of Auto

A California girl was taken to the Cottage Grove Hospital Friday morning for possible injuries received in an accident on U. S. Highway 99 near the Scotts Valley overpass.

Miss Joanne Jackson, 21, Sherman Oaks, Calif., was driving north on the highway when her car left the pavement and plunged 25 feet into a water-filled ditch, state police said Friday.

The Fred Burris family, living across the highway from the scene, aided a passenger in the car, Ray Loren Riley, 26, Los Angeles, Calif., in pulling Miss Jackson from the water onto dry ground.

Burris told the state police the car apparently skidded on an icy spot in the road. Miss Jackson complained of pain in her back.

Later, at 9:30 a.m., Frank Elmer Dittmer, 66, Seattle, Wash., was taken to Douglas Community Hospital after a collision on U. S. Highway 99 at the garbage dump road junction. State police said that Dittmer had slowed down as he drove north on the highway and that Emory Hobbs, Seminole, Tex., collided into the rear of Dittmer's car.

Another rear end collision on U.S. Highway 99 south of Myrtle Creek resulted in damages to three cars at 2:25 p.m. Friday.

State police said John Wesley Hartman, Turlock, Calif., had stopped for a vehicle in front of him when a car driven by John Milton Flory, DeLake, struck the rear end of Hartman's car. The third car, driven by Chester Emery Hatter, San Pablo, Calif., plowed into the rear end of Flory's vehicle.

Flory and Hatter were cited by state police for following too closely.

Another minor collision took place in the 600 block of Southeast Main Street, Roseburg.

Roseburg police said that Robert V. Triplett, 1790 NW Goetz Rd., Roseburg, was backing his car into a parking space when it collided with a car driven by Miss Marcia Alice Wheeler, Camas Valley Rd., Box 432, Winston.

Miss Wheeler was cited by police for following too closely.

Northern Ireland Police Strike Surprise Blows

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — Northern Ireland police struck swift surprise blows at dawn Saturday against political extremists, rounding up 32 suspects in raids in half a dozen communities.

Raids were continuing through the day, one police officer remarking "there will be 70 or more by the time we have everyone we want."

The action was a drive to stamp out violence along the border separating Northern Ireland from the independent Irish Republic.

The men rounded up were taken to local jails and Belfast prison. A police spokesman said they will be held indefinitely under a special powers act which permits police to arrest and intern suspects without warrants or trials. A home office official said that after inquiries many will be released within 24 hours.

There have been 14 acts of violence in Northern Ireland since last weekend.

Cooled Romance Blamed For Fatal Shootings; 3 Die

CINCINNATI — A cooled-off romance was blamed by Hamilton County authorities for the fatal shooting Friday of a prominent Cincinnati business man, his 17-year-old daughter and a 19-year-old youth.

The boy, Gordon Pape, Jr., also a member of a prominent family here, died Saturday without regaining consciousness.

Lester Aue, 34, vice president of a chemical firm, and his daughter, Susan, were killed instantly in their fashionable home. The girl's mother, Mrs. Helen Aue, 30, was wounded critically and has not regained consciousness. Young Aue's body was found in Miss Aue's room.

Sheriff Dan Tehan, referring to an unmailed letter to Miss Aue which was found in Pape's automobile and two conversations with friends of the young couple at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, where they were students, theorized Pape was angered because Miss Aue had quit "going steady" with him.

The young couple had steady dates while they attended suburban Indian Hill high school but that after they entered Miami the girl returned Pape's high school and began having dates with other boys.

6 Greek Cypriots Get Life Terms

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Six members of the Greek Cypriot underground organization EOKA were sentenced to life imprisonment Saturday on charges of plotting to overthrow the government.

EOKA is the fighting arm of the movement for union of this British island with Greece.

The six were arrested Oct. 4. They were accused of possessing arms, ammunition and EOKA literature.

The six men were discovered in a secret hideout when a paratrooper picked up a coat hanging on a stable wall at an isolated farm. He saw a pair of eyes staring at him through a hole the coat had covered.

The paratrooper immediately opened fire. From behind the wall the men shouted: "Don't shoot. We surrender."

The six then climbed out of an elaborately built hideout in the stable. Later one of the men admitted an arms cache was buried in the farmyard.
