Indonesia President Rejects Rebel Demand

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member had received the same instructions to abandon Sastroamidjojo and that the Catholic and Protestant parties were prepared to follow suit.

The premier presumably still had the backing of his own big leftist nationalist party, the PNI. The Orthodox Moslem Party—third largest in the cabinet coalition—so far has not shown its hand. The executive of the Orthodox Moslems now is meeting in Medan, rebel-held capital of North Sumatra.

Observers described the cabinet meeting as a "last desperate attempt to find a solution to the present crisis and save the coalition."

Earlier a naval spokesman reported that all leave for members of the Indonesian armed forces had been canceled effective Wednesday. All men on leave were asked to return to their units.

After six days of "independence," the rebels in the two provinces of North and Central Sumatra appeared to be consolidating their position. Army leaders in the provinces, two of the 10 in the Indonesian republic, rebelled against the central government last week. The civilian administration was taken over and replaced by an army junta.

The dissidents have declared they are loyal to Sukarno and have asserted their military takeover is temporary until Sastroamidjojo's government resigns. They also want the president to make peace with former Vice President Mohammad Hatta and to give Sumatra a larger voice in the control of Indonesia's politics and economy.

There previously had been no sign the central government would try to employ force against the rebels. Government sources said the "army won't fight the army."

Sukarno, chief hero of the revolution which won Indonesia's independence from the Dutch, earlier apparently was relying on his great popularity to cope with the situation. He was doing his best to keep Sastroamidjojo in office.

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Florida Vacation Areas Colder Than Montana

Florida's winter vacationland recorded colder temperatures Wednesday than Montana.

Temperatures dipped below freezing in crowded winter resort areas. The mercury sagged to 31 at Daytona Beach. It was 28 at Cross City, Fla., early Wednesday. At the same time in Great Falls, Mont., it was 47.

In the southern part of the unshiny state, Miami reported a low of 32 and Fort Myers 43.

The Weather Bureau said a thrust of cold, dry air sweeping across the eastern half of the nation caused temperatures to tumble throughout the Southeast.

Temperatures in the 80s continued in the dry areas of Southern California.

A pattern of generally fair weather fell over the rest of the nation.

A few snow flurries in scattered areas of the Midwest and Northeast and fog in the Northwest were the only precipitation reported.

Coldest weather was reported in northern New York state with temperatures in the teens. A warming trend was indicated in parts of the Southern Plains and most of the Mississippi Valley. Little change was indicated for other areas.

Egypt No Longer To Negotiate Suez Dispute On Terms

CAIRO, Egypt — An authoritative Egyptian source said Wednesday Egypt will no longer consider negotiating a settlement of the Suez Canal dispute with Britain and France on the basis of the six principles agreed upon through United Nations mediation.

One of these principles was that the canal should be insulated from the political policies of any one nation. The six points were accepted by the U.N. Security Council as a basis of negotiations last October.

The informant said Egypt would no longer accept them because of the British-French attack on Egypt. He said Egypt will never negotiate with Britain and France, and will discuss the matter only with the United Nations.

Though a spokesman for Egypt's Suez Canal Authority only Tuesday night reported Egypt had raised a new obstacle to speedy clearance of the canal, the Cairo informant said the Egyptian government has reached an agreement with U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld to begin the clearance as a result of meetings between Foreign Minister Fawzi and Hammarskjöld in New York.

"The necessary instructions have been given regarding this," he said, without revealing any details.

The Canal Authority spokesman had said President Nasser's government ruled out any work to clear the waterway of wrecked ships and debris until all Israeli forces get out of Egyptian territory.

It may be weeks before Israeli forces complete their withdrawal from the Sinai Peninsula and Israel's government has announced its intention to hold onto another captured territory, the Gaza Strip.

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official of the World Bank said in Washington that Hungary was not a member of the organization and therefore not eligible for a loan of any amount.

Any aid from Western Europe also appeared unlikely. Most of those countries, themselves, are facing grave economic problems as a result of the oil shortage resulting from the closing of the Suez Canal.

That leaves only the United States, but there seemed no chance for funds from America unless the Kremlin permits Kadar's replacement by a government more acceptable to the Hungarian people and gives Hungary at least as much freedom from Moscow control as the Soviets have conceded to Poland.

The U. S. government has indicated it might extend economic aid to Poland's new regime and Secretary of State Dulles told a news conference Nov. 2 that discussion of this was under way with the Poles. But Dulles said there is not yet satisfactory evidence that American aid to Kadar's government in Hungary would be profitable.

Heavy Snowfall Strikes Many Parts Of Britain

LONDON — Heavy snowfalls brought a white Boxing Day — the traditional day after Christmas — to many parts of Britain Wednesday.

Drifts of six feet and more disrupted road and rail traffic in Scotland, Wales and the English midlands. Six of seven scheduled race meetings were either abandoned or postponed and many football matches were called off. Birmingham, England's second largest city, had seven inches of snow in 12 hours, its heaviest fall for six years. A light powdering fell in London but quickly melted.

Allen Dulles Told Soviet Students As Red As Ever

MOSCOW — A group of Soviet youths told Allen Dulles Wednesday Russian students are just as Red as ever.

They attacked as "lies and slanders" a speech made by the chief of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) at Princeton University Dec. 12.

Dulles said he had well substantiated reports that Soviet students are becoming restive and are demanding a critical examination into the "infallibility" of the Soviet system.

A letter published in Komsomol Pravda from students of the Moscow Power Institute suggested Dulles "should make a better analysis of things concerning people's psychology."

"We must disappoint you," it said. "We are just as Red as we ever were and all our striving, as hitherto, are connected with a wish to improve life in our socialist land."

Written in bantering tone, the letter said: "Yes, Mr. Dulles, you were not mistaken. We have many anxieties and we will not conceal this fact. We hold meetings, story gatherings."

The students said they had recently been worried by the "lack of higher education," and added: "As you see, our uneasiness is like the desire of people who love their home and want to improve it and make it more comfortable."

"It is not by any means a sign of the discontent that you wish for. You allege that we doubt the infallibility of our socialist system. How you would like to represent wishful thinking as reality."

"But, Mr. Dulles, do not invent things, do not slander us. To

In the Senate, the front seats will go to Lowell Steen, (R), Milton-Freewater; Philip B. Lowry, (R), Medford; C. E. Cameron, (R), Grants Pass; Warren Gill, (R), Lebanon; Carl Francis, (R), Dayton; and Walter J. Pearson, (D), Portland.

Steen plans to resign soon after the session opens, so his No. 1 seat will go to his successor.

Gill and Pearson are the two candidates for president of the Senate.

In the House, the front seats will go to Al Flegel, (D), Roseburg; John D. Goss, (R), Portland; Joe Rogers, (D), Independence; Keith D. Skelton, (D), Eugene; George Layman, (R), Newberg; and Pat Dooley, (D), Portland.

Dooley will be speaker of the House.

The Senate seats were assigned by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry.

A committee headed by Rep. Rogers made the House assignments.

Nixon To Discuss Refugee Problem With Eisenhower

WASHINGTON — Vice President Nixon planned to tell President Eisenhower today that "we must do more" to help freedom-seeking refugees from Hungary.

Nixon declined to say in advance of a White House appointment what specific recommendations he would make to Eisenhower. Other officials arranged to accompany him.

Informed officials said Nixon had in mind an increase in the present 21,500 quota for Hungarian escapees entering this country and a boost in U. S. financial aid to Austria. Both recommendations would be in line with what Nixon said on a nationwide radio-television show last night.

The Vice President returned Monday from a six-day flying inspection trip to Austria, the first haven for an estimated 175,000 or more fleeing Hungarians so far.

Nixon said on the Hungarian relief radio-TV show in which a number of professional entertainers joined:

"What they (the Hungarians) did in Hungary really marks the beginning of the end for international communism. . . . And everywhere I go I find people who say, 'We want to do something; what can we do; what do they need?'"

"Well, they need care in the camps in Austria and in Germany."

"They need countries to which they can go. They need transportation which will take them to their new homes, and they need resettlement in the new positions which they must obtain in order to make a living."

"Our government, for example, has taken 21,000 refugees and we must do more."

Officer Shot By Rookie Policeman Succumbs

DALTON, Ga. — Maurice William Phillips Sr., 31, a Dalton policeman, who was accidentally shot Saturday by a rookie officer after a pistol-drawing session, died in a hospital Tuesday.

Police Chief L. L. Vining gave this account of the shooting:

"Phillips, seven years on the force, was showing William Gibson, who became a policeman three months ago, some of the art of fast drawing. Both pistols were unloaded.

Gibson left the room and Phillips reloaded the weapons. Gibson returned, and not knowing the pistols had been reloaded, picked up his and went through the motions of fast drawing. The .38 caliber pistol discharged and the bullet hit Phillips in the chest.

Gibson has been confined to his home in a state of shock since the accident, Vining said.

Mad Bomber At Work Again In New York

NEW YORK — A flurry of telephoned bomb threats has spurred police to an intensified campaign to find New York's "Mad Bomber."

Five bomb threats were telephoned last night. Police searched but found no bombs in two Manhattan theaters, a Bronx theater, a Manhattan YMCA and a Brooklyn tin can corporation.

Police termed the latest flurry of bomb scares the work of crackpots other than the Mad Bomber, the man who has plagued this city's police with more than 30 bombings.

Only once before, as far as police records indicate, has the authentic Mad Bomber telephoned an advance warning. That was last May 2 at Manhattan's Radio City Music Hall when one of his bombs was found unexploded after a telephone call.

The Mad Bomber left his latest calling card Monday at the New York Public Library, 42nd Street and 5th Avenue.

No one was hurt or injured as police removed the device and later transported it to Ft. Tilden, Queens. Army ordnance experts are to detonate it Thursday.

Police have labeled the device a dud—the seventh dud planted by the Mad Bomber during his career. They said the inexpensive watch used for the timing device, rather than any defect in the explosive or fuse, was probably responsible for its failure to explode.

Bus Driver, Girl Killed In Shooting Escapade

The driver went to the rear to talk to the man and order him off.

The man grabbed his bags, and when he reached the front of the bus, turned and fired at Almerice. Then he shot the girl.

Emmett Jefferson, a porter at the bus depot, which was crowded with holiday travelers, said that after the shootings on the bus the assailant came "whooping and hollering" through the terminal.

Fatrolman Barrett happened to be coming in the door at the same time. He shouted to bystanders to "fall on the floor."

The assailant, described by police as a Negro, about 32, fired several times with his automatic pistol, but Barrett held his fire for fear of hitting others in the terminal, firing only one shot in the direction of the door.

Barrett chased the man from the terminal to a nearby church where he fell on the sidewalk under a hail of police bullets.

Passengers said they thought the man was just getting on at Cleveland.

Police said there was no type of identification to be found on the man's body. They were checking fingerprints.
